UNCLE SAM WANTS LOTS FOR HIS MONEY

A Washington dispatch says: Either it is difficult to find men willing to accept the appointment as watchman at the Chemawa Indian school, near Salem, Ore., or else few who are willing are capable of passing the civil service examination. The civil service commission is sending out notices that an examination will be held at upwards of 100 cities in the United States on July 8, with a view of finding a suitable man to replace the late watchman at Chemawa. Whether the former applicant died or resigned is not stated, but the position is open, and can only be filled by the civil service. It pays the magnificent salary of \$500 per annum.

The circular issued by the commission schedules an examination covering seven subjects. The successful applicant must be proficient in spelling, and arithmetic; must be an accomplished letter writer and write a good hand; he must, as well, be a copyist and have had experience as a watchman. Moreover, he must be physically sound and of good muscular strength. And he must be 20 years of age or over.
