WRITES ABOUT MODESTY

Mrs. Woodhill Writes Letter Expressing Her Acts to Herself.

Baltimore, Md., June 29.—A remarkable letter, found in the pocket of Robert E. Eastman, slayer of Mrs. Edith Thompson Woodhill, when he committed suicide at McDaniel Monday, was made public today. The letter, which is signed "Edith," was presumably written to Eastman by his victim. The letter reads:

"Is iron immodest when it creeps to a lodestone and clings to its side? Is a seed immodest when it sinks into the ground with budding life? Is a cloud bold when it softens into rain and falls to earth because it has not other choice, or is it brazen when it nestles in the bosom of heaven's arched dome and sinking into blue black infinity ceases to be itself?"
"Is the human soul immodest when drawn by a force it cannot resist, it seeks a stronger soul, which absorbs its ego, as the blue sky absorbs the floating cloud, the warm air wells the sea, and the magnet draws the iron?"
On the same paper, in Eastman's writing, is the following:
"Little Dear: I cannot live after our—of bliss, with the parting ever before me. If we meet in the unknown let us continue the blissful times we spent here. I am with you in every thought."

FEELING GROWS THAT EASTMAN WAS GUILTY

St. Michaels, Md., June 29.—Vinnie Bradcome, widow of Robert E. Eastman, slayer of Mrs. Edith Thompson Woodhill, left for New York today saying that she never wanted to see this place again. She said that her dead husband's bungalow only meant to her a story of blood and shame.

"I am going back to my boy and my own life," she said, "and try to forget this nightmare."

STOPPED AUTO AND ROBBED OCCUPANTS

Seattle, Wash., June 29.—Stopped on the Lake Washington boulevard by a barricade erected across the roadway, an automobile containing a party of prominent Seattle people, was held up and robbed by two masked men of money and jewelry to the value of \$500 late last night. The robbery was kept secret by the police in the hope that they would be able to effect the arrest of the bandits.
In the automobile were Harry Watson and L. W. Bonney, of the local undertaking firm of Bonney-Watson. Mrs. A. Preskey, her son and daughter, Walter Evans and Miss Maude Turnington, of Tacoma.

When nearing Madison street, Watson, who was driving, noticed an obstruction and got out to remove it. As he did so, two masked men rushed from the bushes beside the road and thrust a revolver in his face. They then proceeded to search Watson and the other members of the party and after securing their plunder the hold-up men disappeared in the darkness.

CHICAGO DYNAMITER MAKES BOLD THREATS

Chicago, June 29.—A postal card purporting to have been written by the person responsible for Sunday night's dynamite outrage was printed today in a local paper. The card threatens that the next explosion will be a double-header.

Some of the local authorities are inclined to believe that the explosion Sunday night, when property valued at \$125,000 was destroyed, and the entire series of dynamite outrages here recently, were the result of an attempt to arouse sentiment against the poolroom and handbook gamblers. Others feel sure that they are the outcome of labor troubles.

Other than the postcard printed today, no clue to the identity of the dynamiter has been found. The police are thoroughly aroused by the threat on the card, and announced today that they would not quit the trail until the author was found. They are determined to learn whether or not it was the work of a practical joker, and if so to have him punished.

WOMEN CAN WEAR ANY- THING OR NOTHING

San Diego, Cal., June 29.—Unless the bathing suit ordinance, which is effective today, is changed, women bathers at La Jolla beach may wear anything or nothing in the way of beach garb.

The ordinance begins with "Every person who in the city limits," etc., clad only in trunks, and then says, "In such a manner as to expose to view any part of his body below his neck or any part of his legs above the knees, is guilty of a misdemeanor," etc. The repetition of "his" leaves no doubt as to the requirements laid upon poor men whose anatomy is thus safeguarded from undue exposure to the sun.

Members of the council artfully side-stepped the issue raised by the men by saying that no one had complained of what lovely women wore, or didn't wear, so that it was not deemed necessary to establish a bathing suit censorship for her.
