ARE STILL LOOKING FOR LING

[United Press Leased Wire.]
New York, June 29.—The police today practically admitted that Leon Ling, slayer of Elsie Sigel, the American missionary, had outwitted them.

The officers are still following every possible clue, but practically conceded today that they had little hope of capturing the young Chinese. Whether the apparent surrender of the authorities is a ruse to make Ling careless, so that he may be more easily captured, is a mere conjecture today in certain quarters. The police, however, declare that they are sincere in their belief that the Chinese has at least left the East.

The story that the police were not so dependent as they would have the public believe was given color of truth this afternoon when an officer suddenly took up the search for Ling with renewed energy, although they declined to give any explanation.

The city was combed for the fugitive Chinese, and 45 detectives detailed to search the Oriental habitations of nearby counties in New Jersey.

May Be in San Francisco.

San Francisco, June 29.—Patrolmen and detectives along the waterfront today are making a thorough search of every possible hiding place in an effort to discover the whereabouts of Leon Ling, the Chinese accused of slaying Elsie Sigel.

News from New York that the police there are convinced that the Chinese is not in the east has left the capture of the fugitive practically alone in the hands of the local authorities.

It was thought that Ling would try to leave the country on the China Maru today but search of the vessel failed to reveal him. It is now supposed to be hiding him, thought the chances of escape on the liner were too slim to be worth the hazard and advised the fugitive to remain in hiding.

Although it has been thought that Leon might be working among the Alameda clam diggers detectives who watched the Oriental at work yesterday failed to discover him.

AND THEN SHOW WHAT YOU CAN DO TOWARDS WINNING THEM

In looking at the premium list for the Cherry Fair, three new classes will be observed, which should be especially noticed. Of these, class 3, for the best exhibit of 10 or more boxes, packed by exhibitor, has four prizes of a silver fruit tray value \$10, \$5, \$2.50 and a diploma. This class, like No. 7, which is also new, is calculated to encourage better packing. Indeed, the most important feature about, not only cherries, but of all kinds of fruits, unless it be their growing, is the putting them in attractive shape on the market. This is one thing that Hood River discovered early, and it has had almost as much to do with her reputation as the excellent quality of her fruit. Oregon fruit is nearly all large, plump, highly colored and delicately flavored. It can speak for itself that way, but it must also be made presentable to the eye. It must attract the attention and create desire to taste, from its appearance, and this is done in the packing. Note the difference between a box of strawberries unpacked and the same berries put up neatly and nicely "faced." Note also the difference between a lot of prunes in a sack and the same prunes put up in a box, with a quarter of a cent's worth of fancy paper, and the box "faced." The prize in class 7 is offered by the Salem Grange, and is for the best packed box of cherries, by person under 16 years of age—the prize is \$3, \$2 and \$1, and in order to have absolute fairness it is required that the cherries be taken to the Salem Fruit Union and packed there, where there can be no doubt as to who does the work.

Class 11 is another new one, and is for the best display of 10 or more quart jars of canned cherries. Economy jars being used in order to have all exhibits alike. The prizes are a very fine silver cup, \$2.50 and a diploma.

The committee in charge is especially anxious to have a warm, friendly contest for all these prizes, for it realizes that the only possible fault that can be found with valley fruit is the packing.

ST. LOUIS SUFFERS FROM HEAT WAVE

St. Louis, Mo., June 29.—There has been 17 deaths in the city hospital in the past three days as the result of the extreme heat, which shows no sign of abatement. The doctors at the hospital say the weather lessens the vitality of the patients.

Scores of prostrations were reported today, and many more deaths are expected unless there is an immediate change in the weather.

WHERE WORLD'S WORKS OF ART WILL BE HOUSED AT A-Y-Y EXPOSITION, SEATTLE.

In this building will be exhibited many priceless paintings. The display will represent the art galleries of the world, for many of these pictures will be the work of the old masters, including rare art exhibits from the Corcoran in Washington, the Art Museum in New York, the Chicago Art Institute and from a large number of private galleries of wealthy men in the United States and Europe, who have for years made the collection of famous old paintings their hobby. Paris and London have made large loans.

At the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition the selection of pictures will be limited to the works of men who have been recognized in the great art competitions in all parts of the world. Many American artists will be represented in the display in the Fine Arts Palace at the Exposition and arrangements have already been made for the shipping of these valuable paintings from art institutes of this country to Seattle.

G. L. Berg, art director of the Exposition, has visited all of the leading galleries of the United States, collecting the pictures suitable for display at Seattle, and writes that the pictures already loaned will constitute one of the greatest art displays assembled for international exhibition.

The Fine Arts Building is a fireproof structure and was one of the first buildings completed on the Exposition Grounds. It cost more than \$200,000 to erect the building.

READY FOR THE CARNIVAL

Arrangements for the Cherry Fair are rapidly nearing completion, the big building on Liberty street has been put in shape, and racks and shelves for the fruit display are in place. In fact the building is now ready for the busy hand and artistic tastes of those in charge to apply the decorations. Across the street a big platform is being laid, and here the flower and cherry dances will take place, and also the free open air shows. The floats are also all arranged for, and Judge Galloway has been measured for a director's robe that will make Eddie Egan or Alphonso of Spain's royal gowns look like a kitchen apron at a church wedding. The Happy Hooligans, Buster Browns and Fluffy Ruffles, who will take part in the comic parade, are laying awake of nights laughing at themselves, and the queen, not the good old Royal Ann, but the gaudiest queen in the deck, has consented to ornament the special float provided for her gracious majesty. She will also have the gayest collection of subjects and followers that ever came down the pike, or went a fishing before the license law went into effect. Intense interest is manifested all over the country, and the crowd will be the biggest and most enthusiastic ever seen in Salem.

"HENRY" HAAS DEAD

J. Henry Haas died at his home, 195 Front street, in this city at 12:20 this (Tuesday) morning. He had been a resident of Salem for nearly 50 of the 68 years of his life, and was known by nearly every person in Salem. His wife and three children were all with him during his last hours, the latter are Frank of this city, Ida of Oakland, Cal., and Mrs. J. L. Lambert of Eugene.

He was born in Baden Baden, Germany, in 1841, and came with his parents to America when about eight years of age, they locating in Cincinnati, Ohio. In the early 60's he went to Corvallis and a short time later moved to Salem, where he married Mary E. Pratt, and where he has made his home ever since.

He was an energetic and progressive citizen and did much toward the earlier development of Salem. He organized and was leader of the first band in Salem. Was fire chief and did much toward building up the department, being in office at the time of the big fire in Portland. He was also city treasurer, and it was his hands that put in place the big clock in the court house tower in 1893, and that took care of it ever since.

Henry Haas was not a great man as humanity measures greatness, but he was more than great in that he was a good man, with a kindly word for all, and never an unkind word for any, his genial disposition and pleasant smile won a way into the hearts of all who knew him and he leaves many a friend who will long hold in kindly recollection the memory of "Henry" Haas.

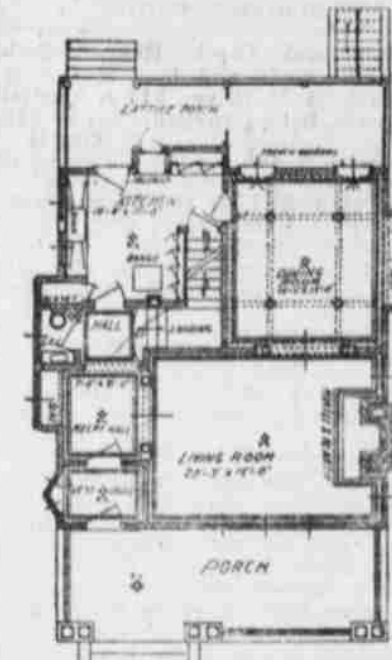
A Frame and Cement House.

Foundation of Brick, With Hard Wood Floors—Estimated Cost, About \$5,000.

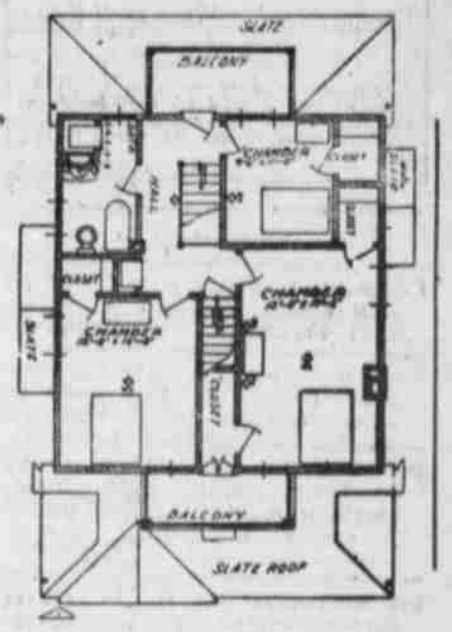

This plan has been built from on a fifty foot front and can be accommodated to a forty-five foot plot. The house shown in the photograph is frame, with the second story covered with cement plastered panels. Dining room is finished in Finnish oak, beamed ceiling, living room in birch, stained mahogany. Entrance hall, vestibule and stairway finished in golden oak and kitchen in Georgia pine, natural. First story doors parquet except the kitchen, which is in maple. READY FOR RACES ON LAKE WASHINGTON

Seattle, June 29.—Captain P. D. Hughes, chairman of the athletic committee of the North Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen, has about completed arrangements for the annual regatta to be held on Lake Washington on July 10 and 11. Vancouver, Victoria, Nelson, Portland, San Diego and Seattle will be represented in the singles, doubles and four-oared races. The races will start from the entrance to Union Bay, and will finish off the exposition wharf. The junior singles, double and four-oared races will be pulled off on Friday, July 10, while the senior events will come off the following day.

The winner of the four-oared will pull against the San Diego four, the champions of California, on Monday following the races.

UNCLE SAMUEL IS SHY \$94,000,000

Washington, June 29.—With but one more day remaining in the fiscal year, the government today found that its deficit was a little over \$94,000,000 instead of \$110,000,000, as figured by experts last fall.
