YALE IS BEATEN

serve. Yale was hopelessly beaten, floundering across in ragged form.

Official time was: Harvard, 13:14; Yale, 13:23.

Harvard followed up with another victory in the freshman eight-oared race. The crimson babies literally crushed the Yale crew, leading from the start and finishing easily fifteen lengths in the van.

Official time in the freshman event was: Harvard, 11:32; Yale, 12:09.

Weather conditions were almost ideal for the annual Harvard-Yale regatta today. A light southwest breeze that ruffled the surface of the Thames threatened to make rather rough going for the frail racing craft but an hour before the variety race it was apparent that washboards on the shells would be unnecessary. Coaches Wray and Kennedy went over the course in launches early in the morning.

New London began to fill up with Harvard and Yale men and visitors from surrounding cities early yesterday. The city is crowded and it is estimated that fully 40,000 persons crowded the excursion trains and the launches that followed the racers or found vantage points along the shore.

Despite the fact that Yale money was plentiful, Harvard varsity eight ruled a 5-to-4 favorite in the betting. The crews had shown almost equal ability in trials against time and the supporters of each appear confident.

Harvard's victory last year, coupled with the fact that within the last 25 years the crimson has not won two successive races, was pointed out as an argument for a Yale victory.

FOUND DEAD IN HIS TUB

New York, July 1.—His throat bound with a silken cord, Young Yow, a Chinese laundryman, was found dead in one of his own tubs today, and the police believe the crime has some bearing on the murder of Elsie Sigel.

Yow had been strangled to death and cast into the tub by the assassins, according to all appearances. Chinatown detectives are trying to discover a motive for the murder, and are convinced that they will unearth a connection with the Sigel case. It is their theory that Young Yow knew the facts connected with the murder of the Sigel girl, and the disappearance of Leon Ling, supposed to be the leader of the six Orientals involved in the crime.

New hope of capturing the Sigel murderers has sprung up in the breasts of the officers working on that case today. They believe that the fresh trail of the Yow murder will lead them directly to the solution of the other mystery.
