ABANDONED HER BABY IN HOTEL

San Francisco, July 2.—Carrying a battered suitcase, a pretty young woman entered the Merritt Hotel late yesterday afternoon and engaged a room. She refused to let a bellboy relieve her of her burden, and bore it gingerly into the elevator when she was shown to her room. Ten minutes later she left her key at the office and walked into the streets.

Near midnight the crying of a baby attracted the attention of a night clerk. An investigation showed that the sound emanated from the room assigned to the woman. Hastily getting a key from the office, the clerk entered the room, and found a scantily clothed, week-old baby lying on the bed.

Policemen who were summoned took the little wail to the Central Emergency Hospital, where it was cared for.

KILLED HIS BABY IN DRUNKEN SPREE

Santa Cruz, Cal., July 2.—Daniel Fellman, a Russian laborer, today is recovering from a drunken debauch, during which he killed his one-year-old son by cutting his throat with a large clasp knife. Fellman then then slashed his own throat, but did not inflict a fatal wound. Unable to find work, the man attempted to forget his troubles in liquor. For more than a week he had been drinking heavily, and several times threatened to kill his wife and three children.

The attack on the life of the baby boy was made late yesterday in Glenwood, a mountain town, a short distance from this city.

WOMEN ARE ARRESTED ONCE MORE

Charged With Selling Liquors
in Violation of the Law
and City Ordinances
of Salem.

This morning complaints were sworn to against certain women on Ferry street by the following: Complaint against Emma Thomas sworn to by Mayor Rodgers; against Dolly Richie by W. M. Robinson; against Hattie McGinnis by W. H. Selleck and against Julia Downie by G. E. Kellogg. All of these women are charged with violating the city ordinance governing the sale of intoxicating liquors. The complaints allege that the women have been selling liquor not in accordance with the provision cited in the ordinance and the private prosecutors claim they have reasons to believe, and do believe the parties arrested are guilty of a violation of the city ordinance by selling liquor unlawfully. Chief of Police Gibson did not sign any of the complaints as private prosecutor.

This is the second arrest of the women, the one prior to this being on the charge of vagrancy, of which they were acquitted by Judge Moore on the grounds that the city ordinance under which the case was being prosecuted did not define a bawdy house.

SIR LIPTON WANTS TO CHALLENGE

London, July 2.—If the officials of the New York Yacht club will make moderate concessions to Sir Thomas Lipton desirous of a challenge for the American cup, it is more than possible that the veteran sportsman will make another attempt to lift the coveted trophy next year. The persistent rumors that Lipton intends to challenge again are said today by his private secretary, H. Westwood, to be feelers to learn whether or not these concessions would be granted.

Sir Thomas contends that it is practically impossible to construct a craft on sufficiently delicate lines to have a chance in the race, and at the same time make her strong enough to withstand the rigorous ocean trip to American waters.

It is said here that Lipton does not want to be embarrassed again by a refusal of his challenge and that he awaits an expression of opinion by the American yachtmen. If, it is thought, they evince a willingness to concede a few minor points in construction and size, the game Irishman will issue a challenge immediately.

ONE HUNDRED ARE ENTOMBED BY SLIDE

for the Chinese slayer of the white girl missionary begun.

The coroner and Captain Ward contend that the body is that of Leon and believe that he was slain at the same time as the girl. It has been learned that the trunk in which Elsie's body was found was taken from Leon's room and returned again some time before the discovery of her death. Heretofore it was thought that the girl's slayer had her body carted about the city in a vain effort to find a safe hiding place for it. Now it is believed that the first time the trunk was taken from the room it contained the body of Leon. According to this theory the trunk was taken out and emptied of its first gruesome load and then returned to the room to bear away the body of the girl. Intervention of the police prevented this plan from being carried out.

These officers think that connection of the Chinese secret societies and tongs with the murder will be established. It is their belief that Leon told the girl certain secrets of these organizations and that both were killed by agents of the societies to keep these matters from becoming known to outsiders.

The condition of the body precludes the positive identification of the features, and the police have failed to prove to a certainty that the corpse is that of Leon. Dr. Curtin, the coroner's physician, differs from his chief in the belief that it is Leon's body. He said this afternoon that the body might be that of a white boy about 15 years of age, as the complexion was too light for a Chinese.

Coroner McDonald refuses to change his mind regarding the identity of the body, and has issued a statement saying that he is certain that it is that of Leon Ling.

The autopsy report does not bear out his theory, and, besides the color of the skin, the physicians declared that the body showed that the person died from strangulation, evidently from drowning. It had been dead a week.

Edward Burn, a reporter on a Yonkers newspaper, was a witness at the inquest, and said that he was positive the body was Leon. Chinese friends of the missing Chinese were called, but their testimony was unsatisfactory, and did little to prove the identity of the corpse.
