DOUBLE MURDER IN LONDON

Thought to Be the Result of Political Intrigue—Sir Leslie Probyn Is Severely Wounded.

London, July 2.—News leaked out today that Sir Leslie Probyn, a prominent Indian official, was wounded last night at the Imperial Institute when Nadar Lal Dhangra, an Indian student, shot and killed Colonel Sir William Curzon Wylie and Dr. Calas Lallean, a practicing physician of Shanghai. Sir Leslie was wounded in the scuffle which followed the assassination, and was taken home by friends, who said nothing of his injury until today. It is thought that he will recover.

Detectives are investigating the double tragedy of last night, and are of the opinion that it was the result of a political intrigue. Sir William has been prominent in Indian affairs, and it is known that many secret enemies have desired his death. Dhangra, the murderer, refuses to talk, and sits quietly in his cell, apparently unmoved by the thought of his crime.

His case was called today before a magistrate who set the preliminary hearing for July 10.

The double murder happened last night at a reception tendered the Indian students at the Imperial Institute. Dhangra was talking to Sir William and then suddenly whipped out a revolver and shot the Englishman through the head. He fired several more shots and a stray bullet hit and killed Dr. Lallean who was standing near by. Half a dozen men threw them-

selves upon the assassin but he struggled with the strength of a maniac and it was only after a hard fight that he was overpowered. It was during this struggle in which several shots were fired that Sir Leslie was wounded.

Dhangra is a young man, apparently about 20 years of age. He has been a student at the University college of London. At the reception last night he was dressed in European clothes but wore a turban.

Lady Wylie is prostrated today by the terrible affair. She was in another part of the institute when the shooting took place but heard the shots and rushed to the scene. Failing to recognize the bloodstained features of her husband she knelt beside his dead body.

"Poor fellow," she said then for the first time realizing the identity of the victim, fell in a dead faint.

WISCONSIN WOMAN GIVES BIRTH TO FIVE CHILDREN AT ONCE

The relatives of the Irish family, most of whom live in Black River, Wis., are preparing to give "becoming presents" to the new born. The relatives include Mrs. H. J. Ormsby and Mrs. H. W. Northrup, of Black River.

EIGHT THOUSAND STRIKE

(United Press Special Wire.)
Pittsburgh, July 2.—Over 8000 men, including members of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, and unorganized day laborers, are idle today, as a result of the strike yesterday against the United States steel corporation. The officials of the big steel company apparently are making no efforts to fill the places of the strikers in any of its 15 mills, but give out the statement that they will not recede from their stand in favor of the "open shop."

There has been no violence in connection with the present strike, and none is expected unless the steel corporation attempts to resume work with strike-breakers.

The authorities are being petitioned by various business interests to take every possible means to prevent a repetition of any of the horrors of the famous Homestead strike of a decade ago, which was so bitterly fought by the Knights of Labor against the Carnegie companies.

"DESTROYERS" ARE VISITING SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., July 2.—The United States torpedo boat destroyers, Perry, Paul Jones, Truxton and Whipple are in Seattle harbor today, having arrived from the Mare Island navy yard last evening. They are moored at the city buoys, where they will remain at least until the beginning of next week. The destroyers Hull and Hopkins are expected from San Francisco in a few days.

It is not known at present what plans are in contemplation for the flotilla. It is expected, however, that the destroyers will spend the summer on Puget Sound, to engage in practice with the improved Whitehead torpedo.
