FLATHEAD'S
FAREWELL
SUN DANCE

Disband the Tribe With Spec-
 tacular Ceremonials of
 Their Ancient Sun
 Worship.

 Missoula, Mont., July 3.—For the
 last time in history, the Flathead
 tribe of Indians, 1000 strong, will
 celebrate the sun worship festival of
 thanksgiving and dance of death at
 the big pow wow, to be held at Saint
 Ignace mission, on the Flathead
 reservation, on Monday. Thus, by a
 curious trick of fate, will the red-
 skins sing their own swan song on
 the anniversary of the signing of the
 Declaration of Independence by their
 palefaced conquerors.

For centuries the Indians have ob-
 served the worship of the sun, the
 ceremony occupying several days. On
 Monday the last dance will be given,
 the ten chiefs of the tribe having
 met in solemn conclave today and
 decided that, with the opening of
 their hunting grounds to the white
 homesteaders by the government this
 summer, they will abolish the tribe
 intact.

More wonderful in barbaric splen-
 dor is the sun dance of the Flat-
 heads, eclipsing the famous cere-
 monies of the Sioux and Apache. The
 significance of the decision of the
 chiefs' council today is history-
 making. It is the first time in the
 history of the white man's occupa-
 tion of North America that an Indi-
 an tribe has acknowledged the hope-
 lessness of tribal government.

HIS POCKETS AND MAN
WERE BOTH FULL

 Yuma, July 3.—Papers found in
 the pockets of an aged man who was
 found dead in the conductors' room
 of the Southern Pacific station here
 late yesterday, are thought to estab-
 lish the fact that the man was Sir
 Arthur Cowell Stepeny, English bar-
 onet and scientist of international
 reputation. The verdict found by the
 coroner attributes his death to ex-
 cessive indulgence in alcoholic drink.
 In the dead man's pockets were
 bank notes and gold coin to the

amount of several hundred dollars.
 A pass book on a Los Angeles bank
 showed deposits aggregating \$13,-
 000. A firm of London solicitors,
 whose address was found among
 Stepeny's papers, was cabled for
 instructions concerning the disposal
 of the body.

Stepeny several years ago re-
 nounced his inherited titles and
 came to the United States. Although
 many Englishmen have dropped their
 titles of nobility, upon coming to
 this country, Stepeny is thought to
 be the first who ever adjured his hon-
 ors through legal channels.

Stepeny was divorced from his
 wife in London in 1903. The case
 was one of the most unusual ever
 heard in the British courts. He was
 married in 1875, but soon after the
 birth of a daughter he left his home.
 He was examined because of mental
 delusions he suffered by several Eng-
 lish specialists, but was never ad-
 judged mentally unsound.

A peculiar feature of his mental
 condition was a belief that improper
 pictures of his young daughter were
 being produced in England. He is
 said to have written several implor-
 ing letters to Lady Stepeny regarding
 this subject.

In this country Stepeny's scientific
 reputation grew rapidly. He was a
 fellow in the English Royal Geo-
 graphical society. He also was a
 member of the Brooks and the Trav-
 elers' club, of London. The Stepeny
 baronetcy was created in 1871 by the
 late Queen Victoria. He registered
 at a local hotel from Seattle.

THE INSANE FOURTH
CLAIMS ITS VICTIMS

 New York, July 3.—Reports of
 Independence Day celebration vic-
 tims are beginning to appear today.
 Edward Warren, a 17-year-old boy,
 at Harrison, N. J., was the first vic-
 tim, having killed himself with an
 "unloaded" revolver.

Several boys in New Jersey towns
 have lost fingers, and injured their
 hands while playing with firecrack-
 ers.

MAY BE THIRTY DEAD
UNDER WRECKED DOCK

 Newport, Wales, July 3.—Four
 dead bodies and 14 injured men have
 been removed from the ruins of the
 Alexandria dock wall, which col-
 lapsed yesterday, and it is estimated
 this afternoon that the total death
 list will number at least 30.
 Rescuers are working on the ruins
 and expect to recover more bodies
 before night. Several corpses have
 been sighted beneath the debris, but
 they have not been reached as yet.

 Picnic dinner at 12 o'clock. Tables

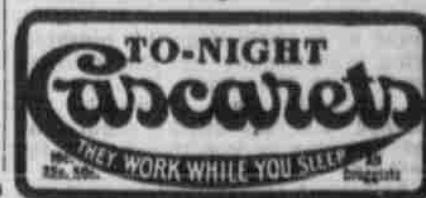
have been provided with long ben-

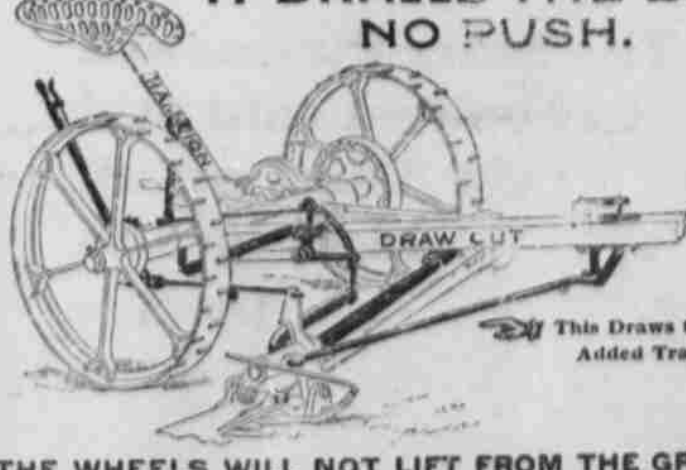
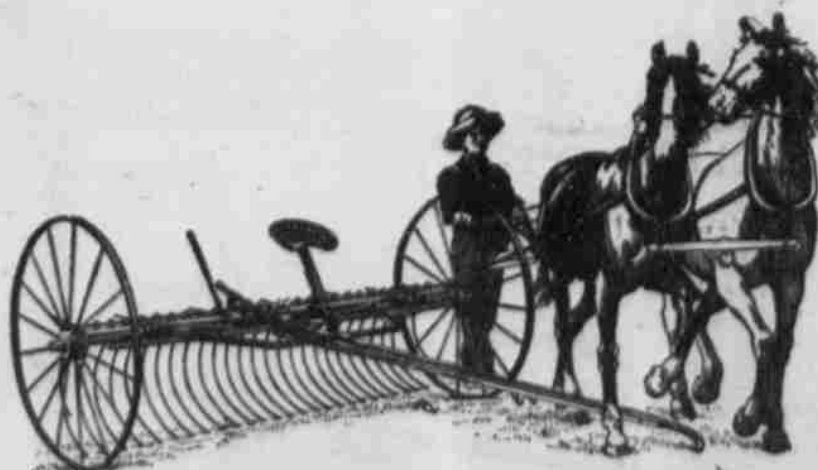
