## TAFT GOES TO LAKE CHAMPLAIN

Will Take Part in Ter-Centennial Celebration of the Discovery of the Lake.

[United Press Leased Wire.]  
 Washington, July 3.—President Taft left today for Beverly, Mass., where the president's family is established in their summer home, to spend a day before going to the Lake Champlain cities to participate in the ter-centennial celebration of the discovery of the lake by the French explorer, Champlain, in 108.

Tomorrow evening the president will go to Norwich, Conn., which city will celebrate the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of its founding. He will be the guest of honor at the celebration and will deliver an address.

The Champlain ter-centennial will be participated in by the several Vermont and New York cities situated on the lake. The president will go to historic Fort Ticonderoga, at the foot of the lake, Tuesday. Here the first formal exercises of the celebration will be held. In addition to the president's speech addresses will be delivered by Vice President Sherman, Ambassadors Bryce and Jusserand, Speaker Cannon, Senator Root and Governors Hughes and Prouty.

The celebration will be continued Wednesday and Thursday at Plattsburg, N. Y. A reception will be tendered the president at Hotel Champlain and he will deliver another address. An unique Indian pageant will form a feature of the Plattsburg festivities.

Late Thursday the scene of the anniversary celebrations will shift to Burlington, Vt. Here again the president will be the guest of honor and will make his final speech before departing for Washington in the evening.

## ARTIST'S IDEA OF CLOTHES

 Berkeley, Cal., July 3.—Clothes are only of value in art so far as they convey an impression of what is beneath them. In other words, they are an impediment to art," is the defense of nude artistic expression by Professor Frederick Mortimer Clapp, of the University of Chicago. His assertion created unlimited discussion in university circles here, and is a live topic of conversation today.

Professor Clapp, who has spent years in the study of art in the European centers, is staff lecturer at the Rockefeller university, and is delivering a special series of art dissertations at the University of California's summer session. His defense of art in the nude, following closely upon the discussion that has been rife in San Francisco art circles during the last week was made during the course of a lecture.

"The human body in painting," he said, "gives the opportunity of conveying the most direct message from the master artist to the spectator.

"We are human beings, and our bodies are all important, from the artistic standpoint, since they, in their mobility, portray quickest and sincerely the stream of emotion."

No Tax on Tea or Coffee.

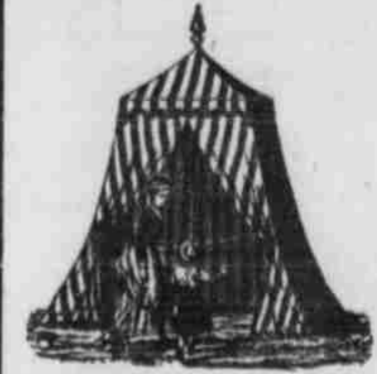

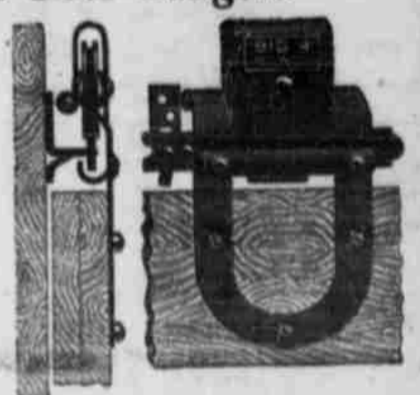
