158 HORSES BURNED IN FRISCO

Body of Charles Howard, the
Stableman, Found in the
Ruins—Cause of Fire
Is Unknown.

LOSS IS \$300,000

HORSES BECAME FRANTIC WITH
FEAR AND COULD NOT BE LED
FROM STABLE—FIFTY MEN IN
A LODGING HOUSE ADJOINING
STABLE HAD NARROW ESCAPE

San Francisco, July 5.—The body of Charles Howard, a stable man, was recovered today in the ruins of the Warren Improvement Company stables, on Ninth street, near Howard, where 158 horses were burned to death early today. Lives of 50 men asleep in the Rainier lodging house, adjoining, which was also destroyed, were imperiled by the fire, but all escaped without serious injury. The property loss is estimated at \$300,000.

The origin of the fire is unknown. Flames were discovered in the rear of the stables shortly after midnight, and a general alarm turned in. Seven stablemen, who were asleep in the loft of the two-story wooden building, were awakened by a night watchman, and six of them fought their way through the flames to the street.

Howard was overcome just as he reached the threshold. Besides the stable and the lodging house, the junk shop of A. Fiedkins and E. B. Read's paint and oil shop were destroyed by the fire.

The fire started in a neighborhood of wooden buildings, and spread rapidly. The stables of the Standard Parcel Company and the Gillogy Special Delivery Company were threatened, and policemen rescued 60 horses from the two buildings.

Heroic efforts were made to take some of the horses from the Warren stables, but the animals were frantic with fear, and refused to leave their stalls. The flames spread so rapidly that the firemen had little time to devote to the horses, and they finally had to be abandoned.

Good Rain Falling—

Rains, heavier than any that have fallen for several months, started last night, after a stiff breeze from the west had blown up dark clouds. There was a slight electrical storm, but it was of short duration. The rain will do much good, and can do little damage. The grain and fruit needs rain, though some hay may be caught.

At the Dreamland—

Mr. A. P. Harris, manager of the Dreamland theatre, announces that the interest in the baby show is increasing daily, and that already 41 proud Salem mothers have listed their baby's photographs in the contest. A new stage has been built and many features are to be expected soon. The musicians are good.

Rain Stopped Many—

On account of the heavy rains that were falling this morning, only about a carload of people took the 10:36 train for Eugene. Many others had planned to go, but the inclement weather turned them back. Quite a number went on the early morning train. A number of Salem people visited Albany Saturday, others celebrated at Dallas, and a few went to Lebanon. A Salem ball team went to Eugene this morning, and will endeavor to wrest honors from the Lane county delegation, if the weather permits.

FOURTH'S HARVEST OF DISASTER

Only 15 Killed up to Sunday
Night But Today Being
Real Fourth the List
Grows.

EIGHT MADE BLIND

MANY FIRES STARTED BY FIRE-
WORKS AND THE LOSSES RE-
PORTED UP TO NOON TODAY
WILL RUN ABOVE \$1,000,000—
CANNON CRACKERS LEAD.

The deadly cannon cracker, as usual, leads the list, and closely following it is the innocent toy pistols. There were up to Sunday night, at various points in the country, eight

children blinded for life from this cause. At Goshen, Ind., a skyrocket fired a barn and burned to death a hired man, who was trying to get away from the confusion and find sleep. At Needosha, Kan., Tom Armour essayed to fire a giant cracker from a crowded excursion train, and fell off. He was ground to death. Bert Dillinger, of Sand Point, Idaho, played with a giant cracker and will go through life with but one hand as a result.

At Wilkesbarre, Pa., four boys were seriously injured by the explosion of a toy cannon, and one little girl was fatally burned when a firecracker was thrown into her clothes. Automobile and fishing accidents were reported as seven, with two fatalities due to carelessness and too much liquor.

Extraordinary precautions had been taken by police and fire departments everywhere and costly fires were prevented this year.

The real celebration today, however, may upset all the optimistic calculations based on two "sane" days.

One Killed, Fifty-Four Hurt.
St. Louis, July 5.—One boy is dead and 54 persons suffering serious injuries today as the result of this morning's Independence Day celebration. Several of the injured are expected to die.

Frank Dixon, aged 14 years, was the first victim of the celebration. His death was one of the most remarkable in the annals of Independence Day celebrations. The boy was seated on the shore of the river, when a huge cannon cracker exploded near him. He was so frightened by the noise that he fell into the river and was drowned.

Isadore Eckhart, a German, is among the most seriously injured. He was hurt last night when he mistook a cannon cracker for a Roman candle. Grasping the huge cracker in his right hand the German waved it about his head, expecting to see stars shooting skyward. The explosion of the cracker blew off his right arm, and he will probably die from his injuries.

No Fireworks There.
Washington, July 5.—A firecrackerless Independence Day celebration was held here today. The sale of fireworks was forbidden by the authorities today, and no explosives were allowed used within the city limits.

Pittsburg Furnishes Quota.
Pittsburg, Pa., July 5.—A firecracker thrown through the window of a tenement house today caused a fire which menaced the lives of many people, and which was only controlled after hours of hard work by the fire department.

One man was fatally injured today as the result of the Independence Day celebration. The delayed explosion of a giant cracker maimed Jos. Rablitz, aged 20 years, and he cannot survive.

Unusual Number in New York.
New York, July 5.—Independence Day celebration in New York opened today with two deaths, a dozen serious accidents, and 49 mishaps, as the result of explosives.

There were several accidents yesterday, but the merry-makers did not start their real celebration until today.

FIFTY YEARS MARRIED

George A. Young an Old-Time
Salem Man, and Wife
Celebrate Golden
Wedding.

The golden wedding of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Young was celebrated last week and attended by relatives and friends. Mr. and Mrs. Young were married in Brighton, Mass., June 12, 1859, and within a few days they sailed for Oregon by way of the isthmus, accompanied by Mr. Pratt, and together they built at Salem the first woolen mill on the Pacific coast. Mr. Young also owned and ran the first Union house in Salem, which was burned in 1863.

From Salem they left for Hannock, now called Idaho City, and in the fall of 1864 Mr. Young built the Overland hotel at Boise City. Later he ran the old Clarendon hotel in Portland with Mr. Hallie, who was also interested with him and Samuel Smith in the Occidental. In 1880 Mr. and Mrs. Young moved to eastern Oregon, where they remained until 1904. Mr. Young being engaged in raising sheep, Mr. and Mrs. Young have three children, Fred A. Young of Wheeler county, Mrs. Ames Soule of Billings, Mont., and Mrs. F. B. Shepherd of Cornelius. Mr. Young is a member of several lodges, the Masonic Pioneers and Elks and a member of the Multnomah exempt fire department No. 2.

MAY FIND CAUSE OF MURDER

Coroner Leland to Investigate
Murder of Miss Brasch
and May Place Blame
on Smith Co.

HOLDING OUT PAY

IS AN OLD GAME WITH COMPANIES EMPLOYING LABORERS
IGNORANT OF LANGUAGE—TESTIMONY CASTS SUSPICION ON CUNNINGHAM'S EMPLOYERS.

San Francisco, July 5.—Coroner Leland announced today that when he holds an inquest, the latter part of this week, into the death of Miss Caroline Brasch, who was shot and killed by James Edward Cunningham, in a dispute over a few cents difference in a pay check, he would call as witnesses everyone concerned in the affair.

He said that among others he would call Harry Gray, head of the contracting firm which employed Miss Brasch, and try to ascertain the conditions which led up to the shooting of the girl by the crazed laborer. "If the evils of the pay check system incited Cunningham to buy a revolver and slay Caroline Brasch," said Leland, "it is assuredly my duty to inquire into that system."

REBELS CAPTURE TEHERAN

Constantinople, July 5.—Late reports received here tonight from Teheran say that the rebel army, which has been besieging the city, has captured the town, and that the shah, in disguise, has fled from the palace. If the reports are true, it is believed there will be a great massacre of foreigners in Teheran, as the rebels have been very bitter against all outsiders since the Russian Cosacks went there recently.

LITTLE WAIF FROM MESSINA ARRIVES

San Francisco, July 5.—Pretty little Palma Cogliandro, aged six years, a survivor of the terrible earthquake that shattered the cities of Messina and Reggio last December, is in this city today. Alone and with small knowledge of English, the little Italian girl traveled from far-away Reggio to San Francisco, arriving late yesterday. She was met by Antonio Cogliandro, her uncle, with whom she will make her future home. Little Palma arrived in this city with a surprising store of wealth. She made friends on the Atlantic liner, and many of those bestowed upon her shining gold coins. These will be placed to her account in a local savings bank.

RUINS OF MESSINA SWEEP BY FIRE

Rome, July 5.—Following several severe earthquake shocks, fire broke out in the ruins of Messina today, and is raging unchecked, the people who have been living there having fled to places of safety.

It is reported here that the fire is spreading rapidly over the ruins and consuming temporary structures erected by survivors of the great temblor, which rased the city a few months ago.

WILLIAM HERVE IS DEAD

William Herve, who shot and killed Bill Sullivan at Gates in this county about six weeks ago in a sensational revolver duel, and who was being held here awaiting the action of the grand jury which meets tomorrow, will never be tried. He died at the Salem hospital yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

An operation had been performed upon him last Tuesday by Drs. W. H. Byrd of this city and Dr. George C. Wilson, consulting surgeon, of Portland. At the time little hope was held out by the physicians for his recovery. The cause of his death was a gangrenous affection that had set in as the result of wounds received in the duel from the shots fired by the pistol in the hands of his opponent, Sullivan.

Since having been brought to Salem Herve has been in the Salem hospital almost continually. The wound appeared to be healing and it was thought he would ultimately recover and he was placed in jail. An infection, however, soon set in internally, and after being in the county jail but two days it became necessary to remove him again to the hospital, where he became steadily worse, until last week it became necessary to operate on him.

Herve killed Sullivan in a duel over a woman to whom both had been paying attention. As Sullivan drew near in the stage from the Black Eagle mine Herve, who stood on the porch of a Gates hotel, opened fire. Sullivan died from the effects of the injuries received within a few hours. Herve was shot just beneath the stomach.

ALL READY FOR CHERRY CARNIVAL

Everything is in good shape for the Cherry Fair, and, from present indications, it will be a record-breaking crowd that is here to enjoy the three days' carnival. It is, of course, a good-natured take-off of the main parade, and the queen is a genuine lily of the valley, in that "Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like unto her." It will be a great old carnival, all right, and one that everybody will remember.
