THIS IS TAFT'S BUSY DAY

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Norwich, Conn., July 5.—President Taft was the guest of honor at the celebration of the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the founding of this city today. Arriving at 10 o'clock this morning he was met at the station by a committee of officials and citizens of Norwich headed by Winslow Tracy Williams, who was his host during his stay here. At the formal exercises the president delivered the principal address. He confined his speech to matters of local interest and pertaining to the celebration. He praised the hardy settlers who founded the city, and was lavish in his commendation of the Norwich Indian fighters who for years guarded the struggling colony from the attacks of unfriendly redskins. After a reception at noon, tendered by the people of Norwich, the president left for Albany, from which place he will proceed to Fort Ticonderoga to attend the ter-centenary celebration.

THEY'LL PROTECT "BIG BILL"
