Washington, July 3.—The recurrent problem of Central America still confronts Secretary Knox's administration like the ghost of the white man's burden, and the state department, which is of a mind to wind up and take a demolishing whack at it, is pausing to know just how to whack.

Secretary Root's policy of benevolent education conducted on the diplomatic settlement work plan has not had the desired effect. The little brown—or are they white?—brothers down on the tropical end of North America are cutting up worse than ever. There are rumors of revolution, riots, disturbances and every variety of civil unrest, which come to Washington in telegrams from consular and diplomatic officers and the banana route from Mobile.

Honduras is in the habitual state

Guatemala is in the hands of a despot. Salvador and Costa Rica are in constant fear of being swallowed up by the neighboring tyrants.

The state department files are full of the claims of American citizens. The condition is so unequivocally bad that it seems the question is not now how it is going to end, but when?

Next November the new home of the Bureau of American Republics, which represents \$750,000 worth of effort on the part of Andrew Carne-

de to induce the Central Americans to enter into the grand movement for peace, will be dedicated to this high mission. It is a nice, marble palace and we may be sure that John Barrett will make a great occasion of the dedication, as he invariably does, but the people down in the revolution belt, civil employees and insurgents and the few plain people, don't seem to care much about it. It is a safe bet that when the Costa Rican, Nicaraguan, Salvadoran and Honduranian ministers arrive they will float in the breeze, the folks down home will be awaiting a chance to start a revolution in their neighbors' back yard while they keep an eye on the front door.

This Central American burden is costing the United States a pretty penny every year. At the present time five naval vessels are required to do patrol duty along that tropical and perpetually disturbed coast. These are the Dubuque, Albany, Vicksburg, Paducah and Marquette—with 923 men in the combined crews. These draw in pay alone about \$40,000 a month. There are besides the officers, the cost of maintaining the vessels, coal and other items. Considering everything, it costs the United States about \$1,500,000 a year to watch over Central America—which doesn't include the upkeep of Andrew Carnegie's \$750,000 peace institution in Washington. The net result has been a lot of claims against the governments, continued disorder down there and increasing disgust and despair here in Washington.

There is a growing disposition to rearrange things to make the game pay for this very expensive candle. Secretary Knox is reaching out for Chinese and South American business. There are opportunities for the investment of American capital in Central America, which is comparatively a virgin field. All that is necessary is a few more gunboats to see that the rapacious presidents—who are not presidents at all, but despots of the deepest double-dyed sort—keep their hands off the American interests that have the hardihood to attempt to develop that rich region. Secretary Root tried the renegade idea, and there is not the slightest indication that it will succeed. All the time, it has been necessary to keep warships in close touch to make the governments, such as they are, behave civilly toward each other.

The philanthropic policy hasn't done anything for the republics nor for the world at large. Business is practically controlled by monopolies controlled in turn by the president in power. Instead of developing commerce, these institutions have suppressed it. Rich regions are untapped by railroads. Foreigners who have secured claims for their purpose have lost their capital in the

At the present rate of development the whole vast region will probably be no better off at the beginning of the next century than it is at the beginning of the present—unless Secretary Knox should succeed in establishing a new order of things.

New York, July 3.—Colonel Epea Randolph, Harriman's lieutenant in Arizona and Mexico, has been removed from the presidency of the Cananea, Rio Yaqui & Pacific railroads, according to an announcement made here today.

Randolph's official decapitation is said to be a step in a series of changes that will be made to ascertain where and how he has expended \$8,000,000 in the construction of the line. He has been made general manager of the road, and as his first official act in his new capacity, he appointed R. H. Ingram, formerly of Los Angeles, as the assistant general manager.

The Southern Pacific Company of Mexico, which will take over all Harriman interests, include lines built and under construction in the southern republic, has been formed in New Jersey, following the line of procedure that was determined upon, it is said, after Harriman's departure for Europe.

With Randolph Shorn of dictatorial power, the Southern Pacific directors believe they will be enabled to keep closer watch on the progress of the construction work on the new road.
