

# A GREAT DAY AT EUGENE

The Continuous Rain Could Not Dampen Enthusiasm, and Parade and Games Went Off Well.

In spite of the perfect downpour of rain yesterday all day in Eugene, beginning at 9 o'clock in the morning, the people of that city did not allow the weather conditions to dampen their enthusiasm and patriotic spirit in the least, and through the rain the monster parade marched and the noisy firecrackers could not be drowned.

After the parade came the exercises in the Eugene city park, where orators of the day grew web-footedly eloquent, and the Eugene and Salem bands helped the occasion along with appropriate music. A general feeling of interest was manifested by the Eugene people in the coming Cherry Fair in this city, and a monster crowd is assured by the stator city down south on the three days of the big cherry show.

The parade which the Eugene Fourth of July committees arranged was the largest ever held in that city. It was made up of soldiers, floats bearing the Goddess of Liberty, Justice, etc. There was also the O. N. G. of Eugene, a long string of pretty horsewomen, representing the different states in the Union, the Salem and the Eugene bands, a large

collection of autos and many other interesting features introduced by the merchants of Eugene. Probably the most attractive float in the parade was that of a large Japanese tea garden. Swinging from the top of the frame were Eugene's prettiest girls, made up to resemble Japanese maidens, and swaying to and fro in small rope swings.

In the afternoon a small portion of the crowd, including over 50 Salem people, took the cars for the ball park to witness an exceedingly damp game of ball between the Fairmount club, of this city, and the Eugene baseball aggregation. It was a natural impossibility for the two teams to play a decent game under the conditions, but they made a brave attempt at it, notwithstanding the field was a muddy mass, and the Eugene team defeated Fairmount by a score of 4 to 0.

The race course, at Eugene, claimed a sprinkling of a crowd also, but that amusement was not what could be called a success, either, owing to the track being in bad shape.

It was a bedraggled crowd of patriotic celebrators who returned from the sporting fields late in the afternoon, and the Salem people, there being 150 of them, hied themselves for the depot, where they boarded the overland for home. On account of the heavy rain yesterday very few Salem people were expected by Eugene, but Salem did attend the celebration, and in good numbers, too, both surprising and pleasing the Eugene people, who did every thing possible to make the day enjoyable. Hotel and eating accommodations were good, and the Salem visitors received every attention possible.

There were no fatalities to mar the day and, the Fourth in Eugene could be termed a thorough success, outside of, and indeed in spite of the rain.

the fenders required by the state laws could be put on.

Councilman Elliott stated he had put in some time Sunday examining into the fenders, and that the trouble was not so much with them as with the brakes, which were inefficient and cars could not be controlled by them. The whole matter was finally referred back to the ordinance committee to report an ordinance regulating brakes and fenders.

On motion of Greenbaum, \$1500 now in the sewer fund was transferred to the street and labor fund, on account of the sewer bills having been paid from that fund.

The street committee was authorized to enter into a contract with the Warren Company for paving Commercial street from Trade to the bridge.

The matter of the bridges on Mission street near the railroad was referred to the city recorder to take up with the railroad company.

A liquor license was granted to Eckerlen for the Elite Hotel.

The bill of the Warren Company for Liberty street from Court to State, \$5328.18, and State from Commercial to Front, \$5642.58, were ordered paid.

A petition for opening Pine street was referred to the councilmen from the Fifth ward.

Special specifications for the improvement of Twelfth street, Ferry to Mill, and from Mill to Belevue, were held back for readjustment. Petitions and specifications for the improvement with gravel, Miller street from Commercial to Rock, were adopted. A resolution for assessment for the improvement of Ferry street from Front to Liberty streets was adopted. Resolutions for bids for the improvement of Broadway from Madison to Highland, adopted. For the opening of Pine street from Front to Fourth, a resolution was presented and adopted. Councilman Stockton made a motion which was carried that the city attorney draw up a form of petition for street improvements that will require at least two-thirds of property owners' signatures in order to avoid further remonstrances.

Bids for the improvement of Winter street from State street to the S. P. tracks \$2219.80. Winter, Mill to Oak \$2743.95 and Winter Trade to Mill \$1577.20 were received from Herron & Pugh, and referred to the street committee. An ordinance for the improvement by grading and gravel, Broadway street from Madison to Highland was passed. A bill offering gravel from Minto's island at 5 cents per square yard to any contractor passed. Ordinances for improvement and assessment for improvement of Miller street from Commercial to Rock and Commercial to High streets passed.

Council adjourned to meet Monday, April 12.

## PARALYZED, MAN LIES THREE DAYS, HELPLESS

San Francisco, July 6.—Suddenly stricken with paralysis and made unable to move a muscle below his waist Lee Kelly, a sheet metal worker, lay for three days and three nights without food or shelter in a vacant lot at Seventeenth and Valencia streets. Saturday morning while crossing the lot, which is surrounded by a high board fence, Kelly was stricken. At intervals during the afternoon he called for help, but his cries were unheard.

Saturday night he lay helpless on the ground unable even to drag himself to the fence. Sunday passed, and by Monday he was so exhausted and weakened by exposure and hunger that he gave up his efforts to attract attention and prepared to die.

Early today laborers going to work passed through the lot and found the unconscious man. He was hurried to the Mission emergency hospital where he lies in a critical condition.

## HARRY THAW IS EXAMINED AGAIN

Fishkill Landing, N. Y., July 6.—Harry Kendall Thaw, the slayer of Stanford White, was taken to White Plains early today to appear before Justice Mills. Thaw's counsel today will present an application for an examination to determine his client's mental condition.

Before leaving today, Thaw expressed the hope that the application would be successful, and that he would gain a speedy release.

Pending the result of the hearing, Thaw has been granted special privileges at Matteawan. In the future he will be permitted to sit up until 10 o'clock at night, and will be shown other favors. Thaw and his counsel appeared confident their attempt to secure an examination would be successful.

## BEAT HIM WITH A RAILROAD SPIKE

Yuma, Ariz., July 6.—Because he refused to interfere in the trial of two Mexicans accused of stabbing an Indian policeman, Enrique Comacho, Mexican consul here, is in a serious condition, following an attack made upon him yesterday. Comacho accused Frank Green, a half-breed Mexican, and a Mexican of being his assailants.

According to Comach, he was met by the men, who berated him for not taking the part of the executed Mexicans.

When he retorted that he would let justice take its course, they are said to have become enraged, and one of them struck him with a railroad spike, inflicting injuries that may result fatally.

## CAPTURE OF TEHERAN IS NOT VERIFIED

St. Petersburg, July 6.—The report that the rebel army captured Teheran yesterday cannot be confirmed today, as wire communication with the Persian capital has not yet been restored.

In some quarters it is thought that the report of the capture of the city was probably due to a premature announcement at headquarters of the rebels. Others believe that the report is true, and fear that a massacre is now in progress in Teheran.

## LITTLE SLOOP GJOA IS SAFELY BEACHED

San Francisco, July 6.—The sturdy little sloop Gjoa, in which Captain Amundsen negotiated the stubborn northwest passage, has made her last voyage. She is now resting on a bluff at Golden Gate Park, overlooking the great ocean which she conquered.

In the presence of thousands of persons the little ship was beached yesterday. She was presented formally to the park commission of San Francisco by the Norwegian consul at this city.

## SHERIFF SHOT A BOLD ROBBER

Butte, Mont., July 6.—In a duel with Deputy Sheriff M. R. Tracy an unknown bandit was shot and fatally wounded early today. The bandit attempted to hold up a street car on which the officer was riding shortly after midnight. A number of shots were exchanged but Tracy's marksmanship was the best and he wounded the outlaw. The bandit is not expected to survive his injuries.
