The senate finance committee today decided to postpone until the next session of congress the question of authorizing an additional issue of bonds to meet the cost of construction of the Panama canal, together with the proposition of increasing to \$250,000,000 the amount of certificates of indebtedness which may be issued by the government. This amount is now limited by law to \$100,000,000.

PLENTY OF COMPLAINTS BEFORE COMMISSION

The Railroad Commission received several complaints this morning from different parts of the state. Dr. Thomas W. Ross, of Astoria, complains that the train service on the A. & C. railroad is defective.

The residents of Edenbower, a little place in Washington county, have complained to the Railroad Commission against the Southern Pacific Company for not installing at least a spur at Edenbower, to accommodate the shippers of fruit and other farming produce. In a letter written to the commission, it is claimed, and the petition was attached, that the S. P. Co. turned down a petition signed by all the people in the vicinity of Edenbower for a station or a spur.

The Salem Fruit Union has complained about the freight service on fruits from this city to Seattle. In a letter received this morning from C. L. Dick, manager of the Fruit Union, it is stated that it (the Fruit Union) has several claims against the railroad companies for fruit which has been destroyed or badly damaged when unloaded at Seattle. Mr. Dick writes that such fruits as loganberries, raspberries and currants have arrived in very damaged condition, and asks the commission to look into the matter.

The matter of the reduction of rates asked for by the Chamber of Commerce, of Portland, over the O. R. & N. lines is again revived by the transportation company in a plea of abatement of further action on the part of the commission regarding the rates. Some time ago the Chamber of Commerce took action against the O. R. & N. Company to reduce the rates, but the railroad company was sustained in the United States courts when the matter was brought into the courts by the Railroad Commission, and the Chamber of Commerce again attempted to obtain a still lower rate. The railroad company contends in their plea of abatement that the commission would be in contempt of court should they try to enforce an order calling for lower rates, as the higher courts have once enjoined them from demanding any reduction in the rates.

SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN TWO OPINIONS

The supreme court handed down two opinions this morning as follows:

Della Kennady, respondent, vs. W. J. Hawkins, Alfred J. Bingham and Joseph McClelland, appellants; appealed from the circuit court of Multnomah county; Thomas O'Day, judge judgment reversed; opinion by Justice Slater. This is a suit brought by the respondent in which she recovered partial damage for household goods which were destroyed as the result of a building wall collapsing, but the supreme court holds that the respondent's principal ground, negligence, was not proven, and therefore reversed the lower court's decree.

Ezra S. Brasel, appellant, vs. The Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, respondent; appealed from the circuit court of Union county; J. W. Knowles, judge; affirmed; opinion written by McBride. This was also a damage suit, the appellant being injured by one of the railroad company's locomotives.

NINE MEN KILLED BY GAS EXPLOSION

Trinidad, Colo., July 6.—Nine men were instantly killed by a gas explosion at a coal mine of the Cedar Hill Coal Company near here today. They were descending into the mine when the explosion occurred. Their bodies were blown into bits.

MILLIONAIRE BENSON MUST SERVE SENTENCE

San Francisco, July 6.—John A. Benson, a millionaire land owner who has figured in various land fraud trials in recent years, was today ordered to the Alameda county jail to serve a sentence of one year, imposed after his conviction of having defrauded the government out of valuable timber in northern California. The order was issued by United States Circuit Judge Van Fleet.

Benson was convicted three years ago but by making a hard legal fight was able to remain out of jail until today. Thirty days ago Benson was granted a stay of execution on the understanding that he was to file a writ of review in the supreme court. Today when he appeared in court and informed Judge Van Fleet that the writ had not been filed an order for execution of judgment was issued.

Besides spending a year in jail, Benson is assessed a fine of \$1000.

SUICIDE OR MURDER

not to touch it. Turning his back to her for a moment, Hanford heard a shot and saw his hostess topple over, fatally wounded.

Dr. Lewis W. Allen of the St. Francis hotel was summoned and said that the woman could not live. An ambulance was called and while it was on the way Whittemore and Hanford returned to the hotel.

Next morning they sought Coroner T. B. W. Leland and described the whole affair to him. None of the four men—Hanford, Whittemore, Leland or Allen—let the facts escape, allowing the police to yolk on the blind theory obtained from Mrs. Patton, who told them that her friend had committed suicide and denied steadfastly that any men were present at the time of her death. When the matter was finally found out by reporters, Coroner Leland admitted that he had made a mistake, saying: "It is true that Mr. Whittemore and Mr. Hanford came to me late Saturday afternoon and told me the facts surrounding the death of Mrs. De La Montanya. I was in a hurry, as I was making preparations to go to Santa Cruz, and I guess I overlooked the importance of the case."

Both Mr. Whittemore and Mr. Hanford assured me, however, that they would make the facts public. I recognize now that I should have insisted upon publicity at once. They promised they would be present at the inquest and I accepted their word."

"They expressed the belief in talking to me that Mrs. Montanya had committed suicide. The autopsy, I think, showed that. They could assign no motive for suicide but held the opinion that she killed herself. I guess I am to blame in not having made the information public at the time."

Mrs. Patton accepts the blame for Hanford and Whittemore leaving the apartment before the arrival of the ambulance.

"Why the men left after the shooting I cannot say," she said. "I see now that they have placed me in a terrible position; but it was I who suggested that they leave and say nothing about it. I thought that would be the easiest way. In times of excitement it takes a hero to do the right thing. I invented the story that Mrs. Montanya had the revolver for some time and had warned the maid not to handle it. There had to be some explanation for the weapon being there."

"I feel sure that Mrs. Montanya shot herself by accident. She often played revolvers at her head and jokingly threatened to commit suicide. This gun was light on the trigger and it must have been discharged accidentally."

"I told the story about the men not being present because I thought there would be less said in connection with the case. I made a mistake and am glad to tell the whole truth now. Anyway I would have told the truth at the inquest. I don't want to go to prison for seventeen years for perjury."

Mrs. Patton told practically the same story of the shooting as Hanford, differing with him only in his theory that it was a case of suicide. Mrs. Patton was summoned to police headquarters today and repeated her story to the police.

Hanford was "sweated" last night by the police and it is understood will be summoned again late this afternoon.

Watters rushed into the street to prevent the boy from removing the bombs, and failed to see an approaching car. He was knocked down and ground to pieces by the car.

South Bend, Ind., July 6.—With the woman laughing and talking gaily, the man smoking a cigarette, a small rowboat containing the couple plunged over a high fall on the St. Joe river near here yesterday afternoon, and a search is being made for their bodies. It is believed that the couple met death after an agreement to end their lives. Both seemed conscious of the danger ahead of them, but smiled and waved their hands in response to warning cries from the shore.
