PREPARING FOR THE CUSHMAN FUNERAL

[United Press Leased Wire.] Tacoma, Wash., July 8.—With the body of Congressman Frank W. Cushman on the way home, a committee of his friends met in his old office last night and arranged a tentative program for the obsequies in this city.

The body will be met at the state border by a legislative and military escort, and representatives of Tacoma civic, legal and official bodies. At the depot an escort from Troop B will accompany the remains to the Cushman home. On the following morning the body will be removed to the state armory, where it will lie in state until 1:30 in the afternoon, when a public funeral will be held, with Dr. Alfred Martin and Rev. M. A. Casey officiating. There will then be a private service for the family at the residence, and the casket will be conveyed from there to the cemetery.

The Masons will have charge of the interment, and many fraternal societies, of which Congressman Cushman was a member, will participate in the funeral cortege. Just when the body will arrive cannot be foretold yet, but the funeral will probably be on Monday or Tuesday. Judge E. E. Cushman is hastening back from Alaska to join his mother and the widow of his dead brother here.

SOLDIERS SENT TO SCENE OF TROUBLE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Halifax, N. S., July 8.—Five hundred regular soldiers were sent today to Glace Bay, the scene of yesterday's riots, started by American members of the United Mine Workers, employed in the mines of the Dominion Commercial Company. The strikers have made no disturbances today, and it is thought that there is little danger of further trouble. The troops will remain on the scene until the differences between the Commercial Company and the striking miners are settled.

The soldiers sent to the mines today are under the command of Colonel Wadmore, of the Royal Canadian regiment, which is stationed here.

LUMBERMEN WANT TRADE PROTECTION

[United Press Leased Wire.] Spokane, Wash., July 8.—The Spokane Lumbermen's Club today started a campaign against the use of pulp paper for fibre boxes and packages. It is estimated that fully 30 per cent of the lumber manufactured in the United States is used by the box factories, and the distribution of pulp has made serious inroads. Resolutions will be sent to every manufacturer in the United States, and to all lumber organizations. It is ascertained that the lumber for boxes will be sold at the same price as pulp paper or fibre.

GENERAL MANS TO TAKE COMMAND

BOOSTERS MADE THE DIRT FLY

Frank Star, Del Dinsmore and Charley Galloway All in Line for Next Street Job Open.

If one had been sauntering along in the vicinity of the intersection of Church and Court streets this morning about 11 o'clock, they would have seen Frank Star, Del Dinsmore and Charley Galloway, three high officials of the Cherry Fair, making the dirt fly in great style. The long Cherry Fair parade had reached the end of the pavement on State street, and were on their return back to the city, and, as the three dextrous gentlemen supposed, would turn down Church street to Court, as was scheduled on the program. It happened, however, that the men working on the Court street paving had dug out the crossing at the intersection of Church and Court streets, leaving a deep ditch, and into this ditch the three gentlemen began to fling dirt furiously, for the purpose of lessening the jolt as the parade passed over it. After nearly 20 minutes of vicious shovelling and clawing of dirt the well-intending fair officers looked up with moist brows and a "tired feeling" look in their eyes, to see the parade continue merrily down State to High, where it turned, in blissful ignorance of the hard licks Messrs. Galloway, Star and Densmore had put in attempting to make the road passable. The three workers received abundance of thanks, however, from one of the workmen, who had been instructed to fill up the cavity with dirt, and who was both surprised and pleased to think that three of the most prominent boosters in the city would be so kind as to lend a hand in the task of shovelling.

GRAND JURY RETURNS THREE TRUE BILLS

This morning at 9 o'clock the grand jury handed down three indictments and two not true bills. A. C. Smith was indicted charged with assault and robbery, being armed with a dangerous weapon. Smith was the man who made the bold attempt at robbery of the Hinges jewelry store in this city. He is confined to a bed in the Salem hospital at present, being ill with kidney trouble, and it is said he is in a feeble condition.

Ed Dupuis was indicted for selling liquor to a minor by the name of Ramp.

The grand jury failed to find a true bill against Chas. E. Brown, George L. Brown, for the alleged crime of permitting and casting sawdust and other lumber waste in the waters flowing into the Columbia river. A like charge against A. D. Gardner was dismissed.

In the case of State vs. Charles Thomas, in which Thomas was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon a true bill was found this morning and Thomas was arraigned before Judge Burnett and pleaded not guilty to the indictment. He was released on bonds to appear during the October term of court. Thomas was arrested by Constable Ira Hamilton several months ago on the complaint of several Greek workmen near Jefferson, who alleged that he (Thomas) fired several shots through their cabin. In the justice court here Thomas denied shooting at the Greeks, but the evidence tended to show that he should be held for an investigation of the grand jury.

CONTRACT FOR STATE WORK LET

Two Salem Firms Are Successful Bidders—One Will Repair Capitol, Other Concrete Work.

Bids have been opened and awarded for the improvements of the buildings and grounds of the state asylum farm and the general and special repairs of the state capitol building, there being two Salem firms awarded contracts.

POOR HARRIMAN HAS RHEUMATISM NOW

Vienna, July 8.—E. H. Harriman, the American railroad magnate who is now suffering from rheumatism, has decided to leave Saturday for Gaston, where the thermal springs, it was recently discovered, contain radium. His original intention was to leave for that resort a week hence.

However, since the physicians informed Harriman that he would benefit greatly at Gaston he has decided to lose no time in going there. He was told that the baths were especially beneficial to victims of rheumatism, which disease has slightly stiffened his legs. Otherwise the millionaire is said to be enjoying fairly good health.

ATTACKED BY BIG CALIFORNIA LION

San Jose, Cal., July 8.—Miss Isola Kennedy, daughter of John Kennedy of Morgan Hill, was attacked and terribly mangled Tuesday by a California lion 1-1/2 miles south of this city, while she was on an outing with two young men. The lion first sprang on one of the men, then attacked Miss Kennedy, who fought as best she could with a long hatpin.

The boys ran to the camp of the Bay Cities Water company nearby and gave the alarm. John Conlon and M. Fletcher hastened to the girl's aid.

The former fired four times at the animal with a shotgun, and Fletcher fired three shots.

The girl's left arm was terribly mangled and her entire body lacerated. Her condition is serious. One of the boys was badly scratched.

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Dennison & McKiernan were awarded the contract for the repairs of the asylum farm buildings, they being the lowest bidders at \$9646. The improvements will consist of the enlarging of the kitchen, an extension to the amusement hall and the re-roofing of the main building. These contractors are from this city.

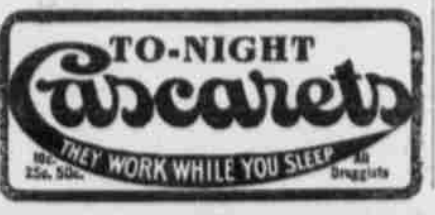
Bids were awarded for the general repairs of the capitol building, consisting of flooring, tiling, painting, marble bases and concrete work throughout the building and grounds. The Empire Tile and Metal Company was awarded the contract to furnish the floor tiling, their bid being \$5470. A. F. Peterson was awarded the contract for general repairs, being the lowest bidder at \$8897. M. E. Ornes of Portland was awarded the contract for the painting of the building, bidding \$2750. Viesko & Kennon, two Salem men, were awarded the contract to furnish the concrete work about the grounds and building. Their bid was \$5950.75. The marble base work was awarded to Buchanan & Blair, contractors. They bid \$1190.

OLD PLOW USED BY GENERAL SHERIDAN AT GRAND RONDE

One of the most interesting exhibits of the day is in the window of the Standard Liquor Company's rooms. It is the old plow used by Phil Sheridan when he was in charge of the Grand Ronde Indian agency, or rather used by those under him in plowing the soil for the aborigines. It has an iron point but the moldboard is a heavy piece of good Oregon oak from two to four inches thick. The plow was fastened together with wooden pins, most of which are still in the moldboard and some of them reasonably sound. When one considers that it is nearly 60 years ago that this old plow was doing business in Oregon real estate and has not had the best of care, its preservation is remarkable.
