JOHNSON
ARRESTED
FOR BIGAMY

Springfield, Mass., July 8.—Christian Johnson, arrested at San Francisco yesterday on a charge of bigamy, is thought by the police here to be the same man who married Mrs. Mary A. (Wiggins) Drown here December 5, 1904, and disappeared with \$500 of his bride's money. Mrs. Wiggins Drown Johnson secured an uncontested divorce and died from a broken heart.

A man named Johnson, who answered the description of the San Francisco man, married Mrs. Drown and took her to New York on a wedding trip. While in the metropolis he mysteriously disappeared and his bride never heard of him again.

She returned to Springfield and after a time gave up hope of finding her spouse. She filed suit for divorce and was granted a decree. She then went to live at the home of her daughter, but after a short time died, the physicians said, from a broken heart.

It is thought that she got acquainted with her faithless suitor through a matrimonial advertisement.

ARRESTED FOR THEFT
OF A WHOLE FLEET

Seattle, Wash., July 8.—Colonel Edward Shannon Kirkconnell, the man who is alleged to have stolen a whole fleet, is in the hands of the police today. He was brought from Vancouver early today by officers from New York, who will leave with him for the East tonight.

Kirkconnell's real name is said to be Francis J. Bailey. While an exploiter for the Export Shipping Company he is alleged to have appropriated a large ocean-going steamer, three motor launches and a cargo of electrical appliances, farm implements and equipment sufficient to start a town site, and to have sold it in Honduras. He was living on a farm near Vancouver when found by the officers.

MURDERED
THE WOMAN
FOR MONEY

Wilkeson, Wash., July 8.—Lured from her home at midnight by an unknown man who urged her to accompany him to Black Diamond, where he said her brother had just been killed, Mrs. George Bronzo, wife of a Black Diamond coal miner, was stoned to death within half mile of her home early this morning.

Robbery was evidently the sole motive for the crime, for the \$600 which the Bronzos had saved is missing. It is believed that under some pretext the stranger either induced the woman to take the money with her when he enticed her to take the midnight trip to Black Diamond or that he returned to the home after the crime was committed and found the money for himself.

The body of the murdered woman was discovered at 6 o'clock this morning by Mr. Bronzo, who started a search as soon as the woman started for the coal mine at 4 o'clock.

Neighbors told Bronzo that his wife had left hurriedly for Black Diamond at midnight with a stranger but when the husband found that their savings were missing he became suspicious and began to investigate.

SENATE PASSES
CORPORATION TAX

Washington, July 8.—The senate this morning passed the corporation tax amendments by a viva voce vote. There was but few scattering noes. The amendment was agreed to in the committee of the whole last Friday by a vote of 60 to 11.

An amendment offered by Senator Daniel is a substitute for the present tobacco tax and for the one in the Aldrich bill was defeated by a vote of 24 to 54.

A motion that the rule providing arbitrary adjournment of the senate at 7 o'clock in the evening be revoked was passed today. This clears the way for unlimited sessions to be terminated either by the passage of the tariff bill or a special vote to adjourn.

Section seven of the tariff bill was adopted. This section provides that when any country imposes a duty on goods shipped to the United States, the amount of the export duty shall be added to the tariff rate when the importations reach this country.

By a vote of 52 to 25 the complete tobacco schedule was adopted in the form originally presented by the finance committee. An amendment authorizing the selling of leaf tobacco to manufacturers by farmers with out payment of a tax was adopted.

This amendment was the so-called "night riders" provision.

POLISH IMMIGRANT
DANCED TO DEATH

New York, July 8.—Personal effects of Ignatz Druckowitz, who actually danced himself to death on the Hamburg-American liner Pennsylvania, were shipped today to relatives in Waraw, Poland.

Young Druckowitz, in company with a party of Poles, embarked at Hamburg on the Pennsylvania. They were on their way to a Polish settlement in Oklahoma. Each evening was spent by the second cabin passengers dancing to the strains of violins among the company.

Ignatz threw himself with zest into the entertainment and danced with every pretty girl in the cabin. To a friend he confided his intention of dancing a hundred sets before the ship entered New York harbor. Two days from port the ninety-ninth set was reeled dizzily off and the fiddlers put away their instruments for the night.

"Well, tomorrow, I'll make good my boast," cried Ignatz.
The next morning he was found dead in his berth. The ship's physician stated that an overworked heart had rebelled.

BENSON SPENDS
NIGHT IN JAIL

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—John A. Benson, convicted three years ago of conspiracy to defraud the government of timber lands in this state, and sentenced to a year's imprisonment and the payment of \$1000 fine, spent the night in the city and county jail. His attorneys, however, will attempt to secure his release tomorrow upon a writ of habeas corpus.

United States District Judge Van Fleet today granted a writ returnable tomorrow morning. A denial is anticipated, but Benson's attorneys state that they will at once appeal to the United States court on that ruling, and pending the decision of that body will secure the release of their client on bail.

Benson surrendered himself to the United States marshal late in the day. His attorneys asked that arrangements be made to keep him else where than in the county jail, but the marshal refused to do so.

Has a Day's Respite.

San Francisco, July 8.—Another day of respite before his term begins has been granted John A. Benson, millionaire land owner, who is now in jail under sentence of a year's imprisonment for defrauding the government of valuable timber lands.

Benson's attorneys communicated with United States District Attorney Robert Devlin and obtained his consent to a delay of one day, which was granted this morning, to permit the hearing of his motion for an appeal of the case.

BRANDENBURG IS
OUT ON BAIL

SAYS THE WORLD WILL
SOON BE BANKRUPT

Denver, July 8.—Predicting that the nations of the world will soon be involved in bankruptcy, James M. Greenwood of Kansas City in a speech before the National Educational Association today, condemned the practice of expending large sums for armament.

Greenwood said that a large amount of money was being expended by the powers in upbuilding their armies and navies and that they were rushing headlong into bankruptcy. Delegates to the convention are chiefly concerned today in the election of a president of the association. The convention ends tomorrow and officers will be elected late this afternoon or this evening.

STILL CELEBRATE

The President delivered the principal address at the formal exercises in City Hall park. The French and British ambassadors and Governor Hughes also spoke.

A majority of the celebrators who have attended the festivities about the lake swarmed into the city last evening and this morning. The festivities will be concluded tonight.

JOYNOR ELECTED
TO THE PRESIDENCY

Denver, Colo., July 8.—J. Y. Joynor, superintendent of schools, in North Carolina, was elected president of the National Educational Association at noon today.

Arthur H. Chamberlain, of Pasadena, Cal., was re-elected treasurer, and Dr. Irwin Shepard, of Winona, Wis., was re-elected secretary.

The officers elected were slated for the positions by the convention machine, which was completely victorious.

Four Fined for Killing Deer.
