

ATTORNEY HOLMES RETURNS

Chats With Journal Reporter, and Tells of His Visit and Impressions of Washington and Congress.

Hon. Wm. H. Holmes, a prominent attorney of this city, has just returned from a three weeks' trip east, where he visited the cities of New York and Washington on professional business. Mr. Holmes represented some clients in land cases, appearing before commissioners of the general land office. While in the national capital Mr. Holmes took a look in on the special session of congress and met the Oregon representatives and senators. His impression gained on the ground is that Oregon is well represented both in the house and senate. He found the two Oregon senators well intrenched with the administration. "Senator Chamberlain is a tremendous worker, and his great political and legal experience are being placed at the service of his constituents. Senator Bourne is undoubtedly pretty close to the president and right next to the powers that are shaping legislation in the upper house of congress. The immediate response to the demand of the Oregon senators for a duty of 20 cents a pound on hops, if that is worth anything to the hopgrowers, ought certainly to be appreciated by them." "By the courtesy of our delegation I was privileged to meet Senator Perkins of California. Being informed that I was from Oregon, he wanted to know what had become of J. H. D. Gray, a former Salemite, his reason for this being that Gray had assisted him in making jettison of a cargo wrecked at Astoria in a ship owned by his company.

"I met Senator Jones of Washington, also, a people's senator, who impressed me as a strong but unassuming gentleman. I also met Senator Jeff Davis of Arkansas and Senator Bailey of Texas, both leaders on the democratic side. "I had the pleasure of hearing Senator Bourne deliver his speech on the corporation tax amendment. It was a pretty strong legal argument, and he also handled the subject well from the standpoint of political economy. The Washington Herald and other newspapers gave the senator from Oregon the credit of being the champion of the people, but expressed the opinion editorially that he more closely reflected the views of the administration, on the great subject of securing governmental control and regulation than did even Senator Aldrich himself. I also heard two great speeches delivered by Senator Cummins of Iowa and Senator Borah of Idaho.

"I did not meet Senator Guggenheim of Colorado, but saw him. He is easily described because he is of the size and perfect likeness of McKinley Mitchell, formerly of this county. "I also saw ex-Secretary of War and now United States Senator Root of New York. In personal appearance he very much resembles the Hon. P. H. D'Arcy of Salem, but of course he has not the commanding presence nor legal acumen of the Salem statesman.

"The business situation in the east is growing better with the promise of a return to the full tide of prosperity. All kinds of crops across the entire breadth of the United States look remarkably well. There has been abundance of rain. "The entire country has a season of tremendous production ahead of it. I found many people inquiring about Oregon, and there is evidently an increasing interest in this state. Oregon apples were served on the trains and in the hotels and very ordinary ones, too, for 25 cents for two."

FOREST FIRES START IN MINNESOTA WOODS

Duluth, Minn., July 10.—Cooler weather on the Mesaba iron range this afternoon quieted fears of disastrous forest fires, which were entertained here.

No large settlement is believed to be in danger today, but is feared that the places of some individual settlers north of Virginia have been destroyed by flames.

Several fires are reported along the Canadian Pacific railroad, but the damage is not very heavy as yet. Men were sent today to Leader, 20 miles north of Virginia, to fight a fire which now surrounds several million feet of logs.

JOHNSON CAPTURED PICK POCKET

Owing to the quick work of Walter Johnson yesterday afternoon, a pick-pocket now languishes in the city jail awaiting an examination on the charge of attempting to snatch a purse from the hands of Mrs. Gardner, a resident of North Salem.

The attempted theft occurred late yesterday afternoon on Commercial street where the races and Cherry Fair sports were being held. The would-be pick-pocket, giving his name as Hugh McDonald, made a grab at Mrs. Gardner's purse, but the latter succeeded in catching his coat sleeve, pulling the garment from the man's back. McDonald then scurried through the crowd, and some one called to Johnson to catch him. Johnson, who was on his horse, jumped to the street, and, after playing tag with the hatless and coatless man for a few minutes caught him. McDonald was very desirous of being released, claiming he had done nothing, but Johnson, failing to see it that way, held on. The fellow made a few attempts to get away, but Dave Yantis collared him, and, assisted by Johnson, got him into James Linn's automobile, who took him to the police station, where he was locked up.

The police are busy gathering more information regarding the attempted theft, and McDonald will probably be given a hearing either this afternoon or Monday morning.

For a time it was thought that a regular riot would be started over the affair, as the crowd pushed close up around Johnson and Yantis and their prisoner, and would not abate until he had been removed.

MOORS AND SPANIARDS FIGHTING

Madrid, Spain, July 10.—Plans to quell an uprising of the tribesmen at Melilla, Morocco, where forty Spanish soldiers were killed or wounded in a battle yesterday, are being rushed to the scene and further fighting is expected.

The uprising is more general than at first supposed, according to advice received there today. The tribesmen are encouraged by their successful resistance of the troops yesterday and despite their heavy losses are recruiting a strong force to combat the soldiers.

The battle yesterday started when troops were sent out to punish tribesmen who had tortured four Spanish women to death. The workmen were bound and thrown alive into a fire. Their charred bodies were recovered today.

General Marnia, governor of Melilla ordered out the troops and when he heard of their defeat sent a message asking that reinforcements be sent without delay.

CONFETTI AND BALLS ARE BARRED

Chief Gibson Issues Orders to Arrest Anyone Throwing Confetti or Using Return Balls.

The general public is warned "that no confetti or rubber returning balls are to be allowed on the streets today or tonight in any form, and those not heeding this warning will be dealt with according to the laws of Salem and prosecuted to the fullest extent."

Chief of Police Gibson has instructed his men to keep a close watch for any display of the annoying bits of paper and the rubber ball and to arrest anyone found handling the stuff. The police are compelled to act strictly this year owing to the fact that all their efforts were strained last Cherry Fair to avert a regular riot on the last night of the event, due to the confetti and rubber returning balls. One man received a broken jaw as the result of a row over the paper throwing "fun;" a lady was hit in the face by one of the careless men and several rough and tumble fights were indulged in during the evening, all on account of the tiny pieces of colored paper and the balls.

The city officers are perfectly willing that the public should have unlimited liberty in their amusements, but all rowdiness must be omitted.

Chief of Police Gibson said this morning: "If those who desire to throw confetti and rubber balls would use a little precaution there would be no harm done to any extent, but they fail to take consideration of people who do not wish to be imposed upon in this manner and last Cherry Fair there were several instances where little pieces of rock and dirt had struck someone in the face, mixed with confetti, and one lady was nearly blinded by the stuff. The rubber ball is another source of annoyance. Men and boys will throw these balls with all their might sometimes and wherever they hit there is going to be a sore spot. I absolutely refuse to permit any of this today or tonight."

Land Is Restored.

Washington, July 10.—Announcement was made today that 60,000 acres of land formerly withdrawn from entry in connection with the Yakima project in Washington had been restored.

BROKEN-DOWN ARCH OR FLATFOOT

BREAKING DOWN of the Arch, which is commonly called Flatfoot, is becoming quite common in these days, simply because people are wearing shoes for their looks, rather than their fit.

The number of people, young and old, male and female, afflicted, is large, though many are not aware of the difficulty. Constantly standing or moving about on the feet helps to cause it, and heavy persons are more likely to have this trouble than those of light weight, but as the bony structure and ligaments are often weak, they too do not escape.

Women obliged to be on their feet a great deal usually wear slippers, which afford little or no support. The ligaments, becoming stretched under the arch, relax, and the bones of the arch collapse, which makes the foot tender and causes pain which is almost unbearable, and is often attributed to rheumatism. WANTS CONSUMERS TO HAVE A CHANCE

A dispatch from Washington, dated June 28, says:

W. K. Newell, of Gaston, representing the Oregon Horticultural Society, who has been traveling through the east studying the apple situation, both as to production and market, had a conference today with Secretary Wilson and other Agricultural Department officials. He was assured on every hand that there is no danger of overproduction of apples in Oregon; that the eastern market is almost unlimited, but before the trade can assume large proportions means must be devised for getting Oregon apples into the eastern market at less cost to the consumer.

They are in great demand for their quality, but the price is almost prohibitive. Mr. Newell says after weeks of study that higher prices in the east arise from the fact that apples pass through too many hands before reaching the consumer and therefore pay too many profits. He believes this can be overcome.
