

CHERRY CARNIVAL CLOSES

Lane County Captures Prize—Comic Parade Tonight Closes the Show.

Lane county captured the prize for the best county exhibit of cherries. There were thirty boxes and they were certainly about as near perfect as fruit could be, and also perfectly packed. Where all is perfect, a selection or choice is almost impossible. However, Lane deserved it, and so did the others.

He has a machine that is an economical labor saving device and states that with its use, money can be made in a flax factory. Mr. Bosse is an expert on flax and says no better soil can be found for the cultivation of that crop than in this county.
