GINGLES TRIAL TAKES
ANOTHER BAD TURN

Chicago, July 12.—Threats against the life of Assistant State's Attorney Shortz, who has been prosecuting Ella Gingle, since the trial of the pretty lace maker began were made. Shortz stated that he had received a letter, in which the writer said:

"If you do not let up on the Gingles girl there will be need of an undertaker in your home."

The prosecution today introduced testimony tending to disprove the story told by Gingles about an alleged attack upon her by Miss Agnes Barrette, her former employer, and the prosecuting witness in the present case.

Edna Wolf, a matron in the La-salle street railway station, was the first witness called. She testified that Ella told her that she had not been assaulted on the night of January 4, when, according to the story she told in court, she was enticed to the Wellington Hotel and attacked by Miss Barrette and her friends. Miss Wolf also said that Ella denied that an effort had been made to compel her to become a "white slave."

ough home, and had spent the entire day without food or water. Cunningham stayed the entire morning, with the intention of getting enough supplies from the manor house to last the party until such time as more provisions could be sent from here.

Taking his porters, he set out across the desert, expecting to arrive at the manor long before noon. The distance was much greater than he judged, and it was late at night when he finally reached his destination.

The naval officer said that he did not think that Colonel Roosevelt and his companions were in a serious condition, only having underestimated the supply of food necessary for their march across the country to Attendborough manor.

As soon as Cunningham had been cared for and fed, he gathered up a small supply of food and started back across the desert to meet Roosevelt. He took along enough provisions to feed the hunters until they reach Attendborough's, where their commissary will be restocked with supplies purchased here today by the commander. The retired British officer started for his palatial home in the hills, where he expects to find the American ex-president, as soon as the supplies were loaded on his launch. Before his departure he said he expected Colonel Roosevelt and his party to reach the manor some time this afternoon.

W. H. Attendborough, the commander's brother, who for 20 years was a resident of San Francisco, Cal., remained at the manor to welcome Colonel Roosevelt.

The colonel and Kermit will remain at the Attendborough estate for several days, and then go to Lord Dalamer's estate, near Njoro. The scientists in the party will remain at the Attendborough place while Roosevelt and his son make the visit.

Major Edgar A. Mearns, U. S. A., a member of the Roosevelt party, now shares the laurels of the American ex-president in the eyes of the hero-worshipping natives. He won his place in the affection of the blacks by riding 40 miles across the desert recently, and saving the life of a native who had been injured by a lion.

While on the Attendborough estate Roosevelt hopes to kill some fine bush bucks, baboons and rare dyker hoks.
