NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN TO MEET

Seattle, Wash., July 12.—President Mary Wood Smith, of Berkeley, Cal., has arrived in this city to take charge of final arrangements for the sixth triennial of the annual convention of the National Council of Women, which will be held in Seattle on Thursday and Friday of this week.

Several prominent members of the national council are already here, having attended other conventions already held.

Among these are Rev. Anna Shaw, of Pennsylvania; Rachel Foster Avery, of New York, who attended the suffrage convention, and Mrs. Nellie E. Merriman, of Oklahoma, who attended the convention of Pythian Sisters. Eighty delegates from the convention of the International Council of Women, recently held in Toronto, will arrive in Seattle this evening on the steamer Princess Charlotte, from Victoria. These women will be given a reception on their arrival, after which they will be escorted to their special train, where they will occupy the cars, instead of stopping at hotels.

A feature of the entertainment of Wednesday will be an automobile ride about the city, at the conclusion of which a luncheon will be served in the New York building on the exposition grounds by the Seattle Federation of Women's Clubs.

The several foreign consuls of the city will be present and address the guests.

FARM SOLD FOR \$200 PER ACRE

Benjamin Butler Cronk, Who Was Formerly a Salem Blacksmith.

B. B. Cronk has sold his 60 acres south of this city for \$200 an acre to W. J. White, of Dallas. He bought it ten years ago. For 30 acres he paid \$100 an acre, and the other 30 cost him about \$35 an acre. He spent on improvements about \$4000. He dug out seven or eight hundred stumps. He has now bought a lot of Fred Ellis, on South Winter street, and let the contract for a \$1400 cottage. The crops in 10 years have paid for the place and all improvements. He says he is sorry now he sold, but is glad to come to town to live.

Mr. Cronk came to Oregon in 1892 and for a number of years he ran a blacksmith shop. He has followed blacksmithing more or less for 52 years. He is a veteran of the Civil War, having served four years in the Western division under Generals Sherman and Schofield. He has enjoyed fairly good health all his life, and especially in Oregon. The Capital Journal joins many in welcoming Mr. Cronk back to the Capital City.

PROMINENT RANCHMEN ARRESTED FOR THEFT

Colfax, Wash., July 12.—Charged with horse stealing, Ralph Carter and Press Connors, two of the wealthiest stockmen of Central Washington, are under arrest. Carter was taken yesterday at Garfield, while Connors was arrested at Euphrata.

The arrests were made after the filing of charges by Henry Gable, a rancher, who claimed to have suffered from the operations of an organized gang of cattle rustlers, of which he alleged Carter and Connors were members.

Gable is said to have accused other prominent stock men with being implicated in the gang's depredations, and it is rumored that more arrests are to follow.
