Railroad Commission Busy—
Today's mail brought in another list of complaints to the state railroad commission. A letter from H. C. Stearns, which suggests a very worn out temper, was received today. Mr. Stearns is situated at Yoncalla, Or., a place a few miles south of Cottage Grove, and he states in his communication that the Southern Pacific Railroad Company is giving the people south of Cottage Grove "rotten" accommodations, and that they are running their road to suit themselves only and that it is a case of "damn the public." Mr. Stearns says that the railroad commission is the people's only recourse and that he hopes they will get busy soon. A communication was received from the state railroad commission of California in which that body wishes to know whether the Oregon commission has jurisdiction over river traffic, passenger or freight, and if so, what rules and regulations they have promulgated for them. The California legislature passed a law during its recent session giving the state railroad commission jurisdiction of water traffic within the state of California and it is evident that the commission from the sister state is undecided as just what rules it should prescribe governing water carriers. The Oregon commission, however, has no jurisdiction over river traffic. A supplement was sent to the commission today by the new Sumpter Valley Railway Company and a letter attached which said the railroad is now opened for business and trains are being operated over the part of the new road recently finished.
