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COUNCIL PASSES PAVING ORDINANCE

Twelfth Street Will Have Ten Blocks of Bitulithic of the New Specifications.

All the aldermen were present except Hill and Moffitt.

Mr. Gid Sherwood was invited to address the council on the complaint that he was composting manure for a mushroom bed, to the detriment of the olfactory nerves of the neighbors.

The check of the Portland General Electric for \$1400, for its share of constructing the South Commercial street bridge, was received.

The bid of Herren & Pugh for improvement of South Winter street was accepted.

Street Commissioner Pooler reported expenses for streets for July, \$137,475. For sewers, \$703,75.

Mr. Hofer offered resolution for expediting books of city treasurer and city recorder at cost not to exceed \$5 per day. Adopted.

Mr. Elliott called attention to the bad condition of certain sidewalks above grade on South Commercial street. Referred to city attorney for action.

Resolution to provide space in south end of police court room for city treasurer. Referred to committee on public buildings to submit estimate as to cost.

W. J. Tolland and E. J. Dalley asked for liquor license at site of old Elkhead saloon. To committee on license.

Bids for improvement of Broadway between Jefferson and Highland avenue were received as follows: Stapleton and Minton, \$1313.97; Capital Improvement Co., \$1305.60; Pugh &

Herren, \$1432.70. Referred to committee on streets.

Petition of persons residing on block 37 for feed barn for George Payne.

Petition for sidewalks on Mission street, to street committee.

Petition for gravel improvement Fifth street and Current avenue.

Estimate for bitulithic pavement adopted for Twelfth street from Bellevue to Ferry street, \$12,116. Also from Court to Ferry. Total cost \$12,979.

Mr. Lauter offered a resolution declaring establishment of the paving plant a nuisance.

Mr. Stolz said it might be an inconvenience, but no health officer or court of equity would hold it to be a nuisance. Tabled.

Ordinance for bitulithic pavement on Twelfth street from north side of Court street to south side of Bellevue street passed.

Mr. Moores reported the gas ordinance at \$1.50 per 1000 feet. Mr. Hofer said the ordinance was crude, as other cities were getting gas at a graduated scale of prices from 75c to \$1.50 per 1000, in proportion to amount consumed.

Mayor Rodgers said that he believed gas could be made at a great deal less than \$1.50 per 1000 feet. Mr. Stolz said the bill was not properly drawn. It would not accomplish any result, as it did not even say what kind of gas. Referred to city attorney for amendment.

OSLER GAGS AT HIS OWN PRESCRIPTION

Baltimore, July 13.—The joke is on Dr. William Osler, the eminent professor of medicine at Oxford, for at the age of 60 he is hale and hearty and evidently does not intend to be true to his teachings by committing suicide.

Dr. Osler sprang into the limelight and remained there for a good length of time when he declared a few years ago that all men have outlived their usefulness at 40 and should be chloroformed when they reach the three-score mark. The physician was ridiculed in many parts of the country, but he stood his ground. But when it came time for him to try his own prescription he realized that the joke was on him and a few days ago departed for England. T. R. Ball, registrar of Johns Hopkins university, was one of the last men who saw him before he boarded the steamer. Mr. Ball said today that Dr. Osler was in the best of health apparently and was enthusiastic over his return to his duties at Oxford.

FAMILY IS PURSUED BY MADDENED COW

A dispatch from Walla Walla under date of July 10 says: "Crazed by the heat, a cow belonging to G. W. Bailey on Eckle mountain, went wild while the owner was away and for several hours ran amuck about the farm. It first cleared out the barnyard, scattering and injuring pigs, horses and cows.

Mrs. Bailey and the children fled to the house and barricaded the doors and windows. The maddened bovine pursued, and in its efforts to break in gouged its eyes out and fearfully lacerated its head. Mr. Bailey on returning was attacked and had to secure a gun to shoot the blinded creature. Mrs. Bailey was brought to town suffering from a nervous collapse.

"This is the third cow thus affected in that neighborhood and it is thought some new disease has broken out among the cattle."

LUMBERMEN ATTEND CUSHMAN FUNERAL

Seattle, July 13.—After convening this morning the delegates to the convention of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association immediately adjourned and boarded special cars for Tacoma, where they attend the funeral of Congressman Francis W. Cushman.

[United Press Lensed Wire.] Toronto, July 13.—"I have never faked the public, and I am not ready to begin doing it now," vehemently declared James J. Jeffries today, when he reiterated his denial that he intended to remain out of the ring, refusing to fight Jack Johnson.

"I am going to New York in two weeks, at the end of which time my theatrical contract will expire, and while there will post a forfeit for my fight with Johnson. I agreed with my theatrical manager, at the time I went on the stage, that I would not sign up for a fight before I terminated by engagement with them, and, therefore, I cannot negotiate with Johnson now. If it were not for that I would post my forfeit today, and go after the big smoke without a moment's delay. It surprises me that so many sporting men, claiming to be friends of mine, were willing to believe the rumor that I had decided not to re-enter the ring. They ought to know me better than that."

A MILLION PASS THE A.-Y.-P. GATES

[United Press Lensed Wire.] Seattle, Wash., July 13.—The attendance at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition has passed the million mark. When the gates closed tonight, 24 days after the opening of the fair, the total registration was 1,015,272. The record thus far beats that of the two most recent expositions, the Lewis and Clark, at Portland, and the Jamestown exposition.

The record of the local exposition also smashes that of the Trans-Mississippi show at Omaha in 1898.

The daily average attendance at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition up to the present time is 24,197.
