BALLINGER LOOKS AT IRRIGATION PLANTS

[United Press Leased Wire.]
Seattle, July 13.—On an official tour for the purpose of investigating matters connected with the interior department, Secretary Richard A. Ballinger is in this city today. The secretary is devoting particular attention to the work of the reclamation service in the several projects. The conditions existing in the national parks will receive much of his attention, especially the Yellowstone and Yosemite parks. The Indian agencies will also be included in his itinerary of inspection. "The conditions in certain Indian agencies," said Secretary Ballinger today, "are far from satisfactory to the department and they require the most rigid investigation."
With reference to the reclamation of arid lands he said:
"The government has spent something like fifty million dollars, the proceeds of the sales of public lands, and the investment has become so large and the work so important that the president said when I left Washington that he wanted me to investigate conditions and methods of this branch of the service and to become familiar with all of its phases, in the same way that he sent Secretary Dickinson to Panama to become personally familiar with the construction of the Panama canal."

MILLIONAIRE HAS TOO MUCH MATRIMONY

San Francisco, July 13.—James Clay Dunphy, the millionaire, whose matrimonial vicissitudes have occupied the local courts for many months, today withdrew his suit for annulment of his marriage to his latest wife, formerly Miss "Dodie" Valencia.
The withdrawal of the suit is considered a step towards his defense of an action commenced against him by his sister, Jennie C. Dunphy, who has petitioned for the appointment of a guardian for him, on the ground that he is incompetent to manage his own affairs.
Dunphy started suit to annul his latest marriage on the ground that he was intoxicated when the ceremony was performed. This admission will be used against him in the complaint filed by his sister.
The marriage of Dunphy to his present wife took a short time after his former wife, Mrs. Edith Sunderhaus Coffey Silverstone Dunphy-Panguelo secured a divorce from him and had been refused \$50,000 alimony on the ground that she had never legally been divorced from her former husband, Judge Silverstone, of Portland, Ore.

WHEAT PRICES STRONG; PRICE OUTLOOK GOOD

Chicago, July 13.—Wheat opened with a hesitating tone but gained strength after a period of early weakness. It closed $\frac{3}{4}$ @ $\frac{1}{2}$ above yesterday.
Foreigners kept their hands off the market as much as possible and while Liverpool closed with a fractional advance in some deliveries, the tone there could not be construed as decidedly bullish.
Cables from Argentina telling of a continuation of the drought there asserted the recovery made in all deliveries late in the day in the Chicago market.
The cash situation was mixed but generally hopeful, although Kansas City reported that hard wheat was selling there a cent lower with millers quite good buyers. They were said to be in a hurry to take wheat before it went to the tables.
At Minneapolis a few cars of No. 1 northern were sold at 3 cents over the July option with the demand fair.
Cables from Hungary report the weather there unfavorable for the harvest.
