[United Press Lensed Wire." Seattle, July 13 .- On an official our for the purpose of investigating matters connected with the interior department, Secretary Richard A. Ballinger is in this city today. ecretary is devoting particular attention to the work of the reclama-tion service in the several projects. The conditions existing in the na ional parks will receive much of his attention, especially the Yellow-stone and Yosemite parks. The In-dian agencies will also be included in his itinerary of inspection.

"The conditions in certain Indian agencies," said Secretary Ballinger today, "are far from satisfactory to he department and they require the nost rigid investigation." - .

With reference to the reclamation of arid lands he said:
