

SAMMIS ELECTED BY ELKS

Hermann's Supporters Can Not Understand It—Coast Vote Went Solid for Coast Man.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 14.—August (Garry) Herrmann, the popular baseball magnate, of Cincinnati, awoke today one of the most disappointed of men of the Elks gathered in the City of Angels. By a narrow margin of 63 votes to the bad, Garry went down to defeat last night in the annual election for exalted ruler of the Elk tribes. J. U. Sammis, of Lemars, Iowa, carried away the coveted honor from under the nose of Herrmann and his supporters.

For more than a week the Southern California welkin has rung with the name of the honorable Garry. It was Herrmann with a walk-in, Sammis with not a look-in. It was three men on bases, one out and Home Run Hitter Herrmann at the bat. Like Casey, of diamond fame, the Cincinnati struck out.

At that Garry made a plucky fight against the overwhelming odds of perfect organization work by his opponents and a preponderance of representatives from the parts of the country near about the home of Sammis.

The defeat of Herrmann was because of the strong vote polled for him by grand lodge members from Texas, Arkansas, Arizona, Washington, Nevada and Kansas.

The backers of Herrmann were confident up to the time the result was announced, and offered heavy odds that their man would win.

Detroit was chosen as the meeting place for the grand lodge by a unanimous vote, St. Louis having withdrawn from the fight.

WHEAT IS JUMPED UP BY PATTEN

Chicago, July 14.—James Patten cunningly perfected a coup on the bears today that brought out an advance of 7 cents a bushel in the July option of wheat here today, the sharpest advance noted for many a year.

The leader who so successfully engineered the big deal in the May option the past season has never quit the pit despite all utterances to the contrary and quietly has been buying up all the available spot wheat in sight.

With no cash wheat to deliver upon the contracts they had sold short sellers of the July were quick to discover the trap they had been led into today and their struggles to cover were on a scale heretofore unknown even in this wild and sometimes exciting market.

In the struggle to get from under the price July wheat went to \$1.27 a bushel and the close was within several fractions of that price.

from the British and Russian legations.

The Russians have been asked why the flag was flown from the barricade, and the English why they permitted it to be flown.

Charging that their followers were killed by loyalists sheltered behind the Russian flag, the rebel leaders declared this afternoon that they believed the foreign legations were trying to cause international complications, which would prove beneficial to the shah.

VON BUELOW NO LONGER CHANCELLOR

Berlin, July 14.—Chancellor Von Buelow today formally tendered his resignation to the kaiser, who promptly accepted it, and appointed Baron Von Bothmer Holweg, present vice-chancellor, as his successor.

Tears streamed down the chancellor's face as he entered the imperial audience room, and handed his resignation to his ruler. The emperor, dressed in the full uniform of a field marshal, broke convention, and grasped Von Buelow by the hand, exclaiming:

"Bernard, you have always served me faithfully. You and I will always remain friends."

The emperor arrived here early this morning from Kiel. The city took a holiday, and the streets were thronged with people eager to get a glimpse of Von Buelow as he drove from his residence to the palace.

The chancellor was escorted by the first court chamberlain, three under chamberlains and three gentlemen ushers into an ante-chamber, near the audience room. The functionaries then escorted him into the audience chamber, and left him alone to await the coming of the emperor.

The emperor's first chamberlain then appeared and tapped on the floor three times, the official signal of the approach of the kaiser.

Attired in a gold decorated uniform, the kaiser appeared in the chamber, and Von Buelow handed him an official report of the situation throughout the empire, together with his written resignation.

Then the chancellor explained that, having pledged himself to fulfill certain reforms, he felt unable to retain his office after the reichstag had rejected the main features of his scheme.

Emperor William accepted the resignation, and both stood silent.

Then Von Buelow exclaimed: "It has been said, your majesty, that I acted contrary to Prussian tradition of devotion to the emperor, and that I deserted you and my country during the crisis of last November. It has even been said that I helped to direct public opinion against your majesty at that time."

"All of these charges are false. I have been unwavering in my loyalty to your majesty throughout."

Both kaiser and chancellor were shaken by emotion, and unable to speak. Finally the emperor assured Von Buelow that they would always be friends.

The emperor then asked Von Buelow's advice as to the appointment of his successor, and the chancellor recommended Holweg. Von Buelow then kissed the emperor's hand and retired.

Holweg was escorted into the presence of the emperor, Von Buelow having by another door, so they did not meet.

The emperor took the new chancellor into the garden, and the crowd which had gathered across the river could see them pacing up and down the paths. The kaiser was gesticulating and Holweg nodded occasionally.

Von Buelow explained this afternoon that he would divide his further years between Italy and his wife's home in Germany. He said that he would live as a country gentleman on his estate.

LOCATORS GATHER AT MISSOULA

Five Hundred on Ground and Trains Loaded—Town Has Become a City of Tents.

Missoula, Mont., July 14.—At least 500 strangers are lodged in the hotels and rooming houses of this city today, in anticipation of the opening to filing on the Flathead Indian reservation lands tomorrow. It is expected that at least 50,000 persons will register for the lands, which comprise 750,000 acres all told.

After the registration the drawing will be conducted by a committee named by the governor, and Miss Christie Bonlan, 12-year-old daughter of Senator Bonlan, has been officially chosen to draw the allotment.

Every train brings hundreds of persons, and already tents are being pitched in vacant lots, and on Monday the place will resemble an army encampment. Temporary buildings are being erected to be used as sleeping quarters for the transients.

By special order the city administration has issued a mandate restricting the operation of fakers during the registration periods. Special deputies have been added to the force under Sheriff Graham, and law and order will be maintained.
