BURNED TO DEATH IN LIGHTING FIRE

THE WOMEN NOT GUILTY, SAYS JURY

Newspaper Man Not Expert on Beer — Witnesses Would Not Swear It Was Malt Liquor.

Still another case has been decided in favor of the women who conduct houses on Ferry street, a verdict of guilty not being returned by the jury in the police court, after an hour's deliberation over the evidence and the arguments of Attorneys Keyes and Heltzel and Carson and Kaiser, on the complaint alleging the women were guilty of selling malt liquors without a license.

Attorney Kaiser made the opening statement to the jury. Objections were made by the counsel for the defense time after time, the greater part of them being sustained by Judge Moore, and, after an extensive argument concerning the ordinance and the city charter, G. Kellogg, a Salem newspaper man, was called to the stand. Mr. Kellogg testified that he had purchased beer in the houses, but when it came to cross questioning some other witnesses they could not swear whether beer was malt liquor or not. The counsel for the defense based their grounds for a verdict of not guilty principally on these witnesses' inability to swear whether the beer purchased was termed malt or not, as alleged in the complaint to be what the women were selling.

A fairly large crowd of spectators was in the court room last night when the case came up, and considerable interest was manifested.

warehouse to make delivery of the hops, and receive payment for them. In the lower court on the first trial Jones had testified that he was not at the warehouse at any time in the afternoon on October 10, 1904. After the cause was remanded to the lower court, it came on for trial again before a jury, and upon the re-trial the jury disagreed. Then in July, 1907, the cause came on for a third trial before the circuit court for this county, and at this trial Judge Burnett non-suited the plaintiffs chiefly upon the ground that plaintiffs' agent, Mr. Race, did not have upon his person on October 10, 1904, the actual money required to buy the hops from Jones. The plaintiffs proved that Mr. Race had his draft book with him and had authority to draw upon their account in the bank of Ladd & Bush, but Judge Burnett ruled that that would not be sufficient. He held that it was incumbent upon the plaintiffs to have the actual money, coin or currency, present at the time and place specified for the delivery of the hops. From this decision the plaintiffs again appealed to the supreme court and that court speaking through Hon. Robert Eakin, decided again in favor of the plaintiffs and reversed the judgment of the lower court and directed the cause to be tried anew. Upon the second appeal the supreme court held that it would be sufficient for the plaintiffs to show that they had the financial ability to perform their part of the contract and that they could have procured and produced the money at the time and place mentioned in the contract upon short notice. If Jones had been there to deliver the hops and receive payment, on Monday afternoon last the cause came on for the fourth trial before the circuit court. Judge Burnett requested Hon. J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg, judge of the circuit court for the second district, to preside at this last trial. The trial began on Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock and let 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon Judge Hamilton submitted the cause to the jury for their consideration and after a short deliberation of half an hour, or thereabouts, the jury returned into court a verdict for the plaintiffs, Cash & Linn for \$1501.51, being the full amount they demanded, which was the difference between the contract price 17 1/2

cents per pound, on the total amount, 14,086 pounds, and the market price, 31 cents per pound, on October 10, 1904.

Throughout this protracted litigation extending over nearly five years, plaintiffs have been represented by their attorney Mr. Carson and his former partner, Mr. Cannon, and his present partner, Mr. Thos. Brown. The defendant appeared at the different trials by Messrs. W. H. Holmes and George G. Bligham of this city and Judge Pipes of Portland.

WESTON ENDS JOURNEY; PUBLIC IS GLAD OF IT

Benicia, Cal., July 14.—Edward Payson Weston, the aged pedestrian who is walking from New York to San Francisco, left Benicia at 10 o'clock this morning. He will arrive at Oakland at 5 o'clock this evening and remain there over night.

Early tomorrow morning he will cross the bay and proceed to the San Francisco postoffice, where he will deliver a letter entrusted to him by the postmaster of New York city. Weston is making the last lap of his long journey by easy stages as the heat has had a telling effect upon him and he is afraid to make too much haste.

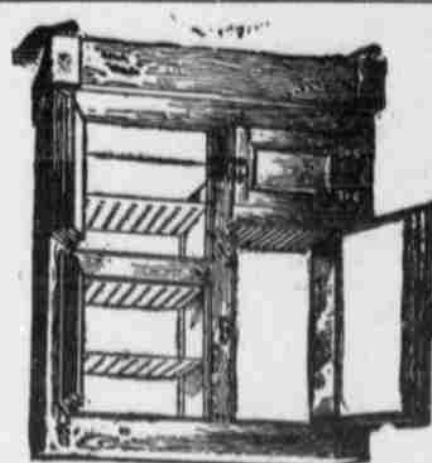
