Miss Colts, who won the beautiful \$25 saddle, that was given as a prize for the best lady rider at the Cherry Fair, was mounted on the Richter saddle pony, and it was considered the most beautiful in the parade. The combination of a fine rider and saddle horse was too much for the judges.

Thirty Days for Joe—
Joe Rice, the man who was indicted by the grand jury on the charge of simple larceny for robbing a Southern Pacific box car, which was standing in the yards at Woodburn, pleaded guilty to the indictment this morning, and was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail.

Wants a Full Pardon—
Joe "Banco" Kelley, the author of the book entitled "Thirteen Years in the Oregon State Prison," is in the city, and is looking up matters concerning his pardon. Kelley is desirous of securing a full pardon, instead of a conditional one, and the matter will be taken up with Governor Benson. Kelley has been traveling considerably during the past three months through the western states.

Grand Improvement—
The bridge over South Mill creek, on Church street, built by Royal & Son, is a grand piece of work, and a credit to the city. The sidewalk on the east side of the bridge is also very much appreciated by the foot passengers, and the extension of that walk to Mill street by the kindness of Mr. A. Bush is not to be overlooked. It is understood that Mr. Freeland will continue the elevated walk to the top of the hill, and the flouring mills company will extend it across to Ferry street.

If Walter Johnson ever finds out who it was, Mr. Johnson was riding along in front of the crowd on Commercial street, keeping the space clear for the afternoon sports, when someone, both a brute and a coward, stuck a knife blade in the hind leg of the big bay horse Johnson was riding, and had the cut been a hair's breadth either way, the poor animal would have died, as one of the big arteries running down the inside of the leg would have been severed, as stated by Dr. Kornlieb. What reason a person could possibly have for doing such an act is beyond even guessing, as Mr. Johnson offended no one while acting as a marshal, and the horse he was riding was as gentle as a kitten.
