GOVERNOR APPOINTS A JUDGE

Judge Coke, of the Second District, Will Try Condemnation Proceedings in Jackson Co.

For the first time in the history of the constitutional affairs in this state, a circuit judge has been appointed by the governor to try a case outside of that judge's designated district, it being the case of the City of Medford against M. F. Hanley, who is alleged to be holding up the City of Medford by refusing to negotiate on reasonable terms regarding certain land the plaintiffs wish to purchase for the purpose of laying a pipe-line to furnish water to the citizens of Medford, and, so far, Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna, of Jackson county, declines to call a special term of court to try the case which resulted in a petition being filed with the secretary of state requesting the governor to appoint a judge to set in the case and the governor has selected Hon. J. S. Coke, of the second judicial district, to act in that capacity.

In the petition filed today, the county court of Jackson county claims that Hanley is the owner of certain lands lying between Medford and the location of the source of the city's water, and that he (Hanley) after being offered \$2,000 for the property refused and will not sell now under \$25,000, which amount the county court calls unreasonable and unjust. It is also alleged that Judge H. K. Hanna, of Jackson county, has failed to call a special term of court and a special term is requested by the citizens of Medford in order to expedite the construction of the pipe-line and prevent sickness from the present water supply. There is no reason cited in the petition for Judge Hanna's failure to hold a special term with the exception that it being his vacation.

Chapter 65, Section 5, of the General Laws of Oregon, enacted in the last legislature, are the grounds upon which the Medford citizens base their petition and request for the appointment of an extra judge, which reads as follows:

The duties and judicial labors of the judge provided for by this act, in addition to those already enumerated in Section 3 hereof, shall be to hold such terms of court and perform such other judicial duties in any of the judicial districts of this state, other than the second, as may be required of him, by the governor of this state; provided, that when such duties are required of him in any judicial district, the county judge of the county wherein such duties are required, shall make application of the governor stating the reason and necessity of such duties, and the governor may, in his discretion thereon, direct the said judge to go and perform the same.

The petition also deals on Chapter 137, Section 1, in which it is provided that the chief justice of the supreme court can assign a judge from another district to act in time of congested condition of the court work in the county in which the appointed judge shall act; provided, however, that no judge shall be required to sit in any other district when it appears to the chief justice that the business in his own district requires his presence there. It is claimed that the chief justice has not selected a judge to act and that being the case the only recourse is to appeal to the governor, which was done, and the governor granted the request. Governor Benson, in acting in his official performance of duty concerning the matter, is in no discord with Judge Hanna, of Jackson county, and as far as he is concerned the matter is being harmoniously settled.

MILLIONAIRE HAS A NARROW ESCAPE

St. Louis, Mo., July 15.—Thomas Benoit, millionaire manufacturer and club man of this city, was shot at three times by an unknown man early today.

The gun was held so close to Benoit's head that his face was burned and blackened by the discharge. Two bullets passed through the crown of his hat, but he escaped injury.

According to the story he told the police Benoit was motoring in the outskirts of the city early today. He was stopped by a man who wanted to use the car to carry an injured friend to a hospital. Benoit turned the car into a wooded path, at the direction of the man, and was attacked by some one, who leaped into the tonneau with a drawn revolver.

FLYNN HAS BEST OF THE CONTEST

Papke's Showing Not What It Was in the Fierce Battle With Young Ketchel

HENEY HAS PULL AT TREASURY

Has Drawn Down \$70,000 and Has Always Had a Chance at Public Teat

Washington, D. C., July 15.—Fees paid Francis J. Heney for work done for the government came under the attention today of the house committee, which has charge of the general deficiency bill.

That Heney received almost \$70,000 from the department of justice, from the time of first appointment as special assistant to the attorney-general, in November, 1903, to January 21, 1909, was made public at the hearing.

Chairman Tawney, of the committee questioned one sum of \$23,000, which it was shown had been paid to the prosecutor during 1908, when Heney held an appointment as special assistant to the attorney-general. Tawney alleged that Heney had not rendered any service to the government at that time, but Chief Clerk Field explained that this sum covered services performed in prior years.

Field testified that Heney had held eight or ten appointments since 1903. In this connection he mentioned that Heney had been paid \$4025 for ten months' service in Oregon in 1905, when he was acting as United States attorney.

MRS. RUIZ PROPERTY MISSING

Her Brother Discovers That Jewels and Money Were Spirited Away.

London, July 15.—With the announcement that Frank O'Brien, brother of Mrs. Agnes Ruiz, with whose suicide the name of a well-known American millionaire was linked, is here today seeking her estate: it was learned that Mrs. Ruiz left money, clothing and jewels of greater value than was at first supposed.

O'Brien informed his London attorney that Antonio Ruiz, her father-in-law, gave Mrs. Ruiz \$130,000 in cash, and that this sum was transferred to her London account. Since the day that Mrs. Ruiz shot herself, supposedly because she was jilted by her rich American admirer, no trace of the money, clothing or jewels, beyond her immediate effects in her apartments, has been found. From investigation it appears that money and possessions all vanished simultaneously, and it is rumored that a friend of the American took them to Paris.

It is predicted that litigation will follow O'Brien's investigation, and that servants of Mrs. Ruiz will be called as witnesses.

GREAT CROWDS ATTEND

Five Thousand Register at Missoula—Railroad Is Running Crowded Excursion Trains

Missoula, Mont., July 15.—Precisely at 12:01 o'clock this morning, the Flathead Indian reservation, comprising 750,000 acres of land, was thrown open to registration, and before 9 o'clock 13 notaries, who had kept their offices open to take care of the rush had recorded 2500 names. Before nightfall it is expected that the number will be increased to 5000. Hermann Rossi, former mayor of Wallace, Idaho, was one of the first to register. The two railroads that are running excursion trains into the city are handling immense crowds, as every one is jammed to the doors. The throngs swarming about the registration booths are kept in good spirits by a street band that furnishes plenty of music.

Those who can register and catch the same train on which they arrived do so. This relieves the congestion to a great extent. It is estimated that fully 50,000 will have registered before August 9, the last day of registration. Hundreds are also registered at Spokane, Wash., and Couer d'Alene, Idaho, in the hope of being lucky enough to draw homesteads, but the best and most land is in the Flathead reservation.
