Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Twelfth street in said city, with Warren Brothers' special bitulithic pavement, from the north line of Court street to the south line of Ferry street, in said city, including intersections.

Said portion of said street shall be improved by grading the roadway thereof; by establishing concrete curbs where not already established, and by paving said roadway in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder, and by doing all things required in said plans and specifications.

FRISCO PAPERS CUT CUTS

Engravers Locked Out and the Yellow Journals Short Picture Supply.

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, July 17.—For the first time in twenty years the morning papers of San Francisco appeared today without containing a single illustration. The evening papers belonging to the local Publishers' organization will follow the example this afternoon.

The engravers working for the local newspapers were locked out by the publishers recently as the result of a difference of opinion between the Engravers' organization and the Typographical Union over the jurisdiction of mounting cuts. For several days the papers have been relying upon "mats" and old cuts for their illustrations. Last night it was decided to quit using these.

WOMAN MURDERS HER BABY

[United Press Leased Wire.] Des Moines, Iowa, July 17.—Mrs. William Oliphant of West Branch was arrested today charged with killing her baby girl, attempting to poison three other daughters and attempting to commit suicide.

A letter found in Mrs. Oliphant's purse read:

"I have nothing to live for now. My name is blackened. Bury us all by my little angel Gladys for the little ones will soon be with her."

The motive which is believed to have caused the woman's action is found in a suit recently begun by her husband against R. E. Scully, whom he charges with alienation of Mrs. Oliphant's affections. The suit is for \$10,000. Scully was a roomer in the Oliphant home.

EMERY MAY HAVE DIED FROM FRIGHT

San Francisco, July 17.—Terrified screams heard in the vicinity of Bush and Franklin streets half an hour previous to the finding of the dead body of Harry Emery, a park employee, and a confusion over the man's right eye, have led the police to believe that he died a violent death.

Emery's body was found at three o'clock this morning by Charles Koester, a grocer, lying face downward in the street. Koester, who heard the cries, went out to investigate.

Detectives have been detailed on the mysterious case, and the man's stomach has been sent to the city's chemist. The theory has been advanced that Emery was held up and died of fright.

MORE STEEL WORKERS ON STRIKE

Three Thousand Standard Steel Car Company Men Quit. Money Raised for the Other Strikers.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Butler, Pa., July 17.—Three thousand employees of the Standard Steel Car company are on strike today and riots are threatened. Fearing violence the sheriff has sent a request to Harrisburg for a detachment of state constabulary to guard the company's plant.

A small riot occurred today when a big Hungarian defied the strikers' pickets and declared he intended to return to work. The man was stoned and clubbed into submission by was finally removed to the hospital.

Five hundred workmen quit work at the plant yesterday and 2,500 others followed the example today. Those who struck today refused to leave the shops yesterday, but were persuaded into striking by agitators who worked among them last night.

Money to Aid Strikers.

Pittsburgh, Pa., July 17.—Ten thousand dollars to assist in paying the expenses of the striking steel workers who are fighting the Pressed Steel Car company was raised at a mass meeting held at McKees Rocks today.

No disorders have been reported in the vicinity of the car company's plant today, the strikers declaring their intention to maintain peace.

It is reported here that 3,000 persons attended the mass meeting at which the money was raised.

CHICAGO WHEAT MARKET STEADY

Chicago, July 17.—Except for the lowering of the July price, which was natural in view of the cash wheat prices everywhere, there was no material change in the level of the market for the day. There was good trading in September wheat at times. A slightly lower market during the morning was followed by remarkably good buying of September and a swell in the price to \$1.11 1/2. From this there was a break of \$1.10 1/2 near the close, but support was excellent after the decline and the last price, \$1.11 1/2, less than 1/4 cent net decline for the day. At one time there was heavy buying of September and selling of December by a strong local house which caused a decided widening in the spread.

Bright weather which spread all over the country had a bearish effect on the trading generally. St. Louis reported a bad smash in cash wheat prices in anticipation of heavy receipts early next week. There was a sharp drop in cash prices here also. There was an estimate of 26 cars for the market Monday.

If there is considerable accumulation of wheat by Monday at the winter wheat markets some further break in cash prices may be recorded. On the other hand, a return of bad weather might easily cause a complete change of feeling and bring about a recovery as it did before. The biggest interests in the trade are friendly to the late months.

STILL MONKEYING WITH THE TARIFF

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, July 17.—The tariff conference today reached an agreement on the wool schedule.

Yarns, valued at 30 cents a pound or less, were reduced five per cent below the existing law.

Wool tops, meaning the stage of manufacturing between scoured wool and yarn, were materially reduced. A specific rate will be made.

The rest of the schedule remains the same as the existing law.

MURDERER'S EFFECTS BROUGHT BIG PRICES

Easton, Md., July 17.—The personal effects of "Lame Sam" Eastman, supposed slayer of Mrs. Edith Thompson Woodfill, wife of a prominent business man of Los Angeles, who was ward of former Secretary of the Treasury Lyman Gage, were sold today at public auction.
