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ARGUMENT RAINED ON HIM FROM BALLOON

"ALL LONG-HAIRED MEN AND SHORT-HAIRED WOMEN WILL BE UP IN ARMS"

SHOUTED IT FROM THE HOUSE-TOPS

Women With Megaphones Drown Premier Asquith's Speech with Battle Cry We Want

"VOTES FOR WOMEN"

SENT UP BALLOON AND DROPPED EQUAL SUFFRAGE LITERATURE ON HIM FROM SKIES—SURGING CROWD BESIEGED HIM WITH TONS OF PETITIONS.

[United Press Leased Wire.] London, July 20.—Bombed with literature dropped from a balloon, assailed by an attacking force of women with petitions, and annoyed by the din of female orators armed with megaphones, Premier Asquith was defeated by the suffragettes today.

The premier was delivering an address at the unveiling of a statue of Sir Wilfrid Lawson at the Thames embankment gardens, when the women started the battle. So successful were the suffragettes' tactics that Asquith became badly confused and was compelled to cut short his address.

The first move made by the women was to send "sharpshooters" armed with megaphones to the tops of buildings adjoining the gardens. These women waited until the speaker reached a climax in his oration and then with one accord screamed through their paper mache horns: "We want votes for women!"

This shout arose each time the premier reached a particularly dramatic point in his speech and completely drowned out the sound of the orator's voice.

Simultaneously with the shouting of the megaphone squad a force of "infantry" charged the crowd surrounding the speaker's stand in an attempt to force its way to Asquith and present petitions demanding equal suffrage. The police checked the rush of the women but only after strenuous efforts.

As a final volley the suffragettes sent up a huge balloon which hovered over the head of the premier while its occupants showered suffragette literature down upon his head.

This was the last straw, and Asquith was compelled to withdraw from the stand.

STORY OF CRIME IN FAR NORTH

Killed Two Men, Then Drowned Two Girls When Chased by American Revenue Officers.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Mare Island, Cal., July 20.—After eluding for two months the pursuit of United States Marshal J. P. Hubrick and his deputies, Mike McDonald, seaman, star witness for the government in its case against the captain, mate and five sailors of the whaling schooner Belvedere, who are accused of the murder of four Esquimaux, is in custody here today and will be taken to sitka to appear at the trial.

The sailors are accused of plying with liquor the entire population of a native village at the mouth of the Mackenzie river last summer and of shanghaiing two men and two girls of the village. It is alleged that the men were kept aboard the Belvedere until the approach of a revenue cutter caused the crew to drown them. When

the cutter's crew searched the Belvedere for contraband the story of the alleged murders was told by two of the sailors.

Hubrick was a friend of Jack London when that writer was searching the north for story material. His case of McDonald led through six states and was ended at Grass Valley.

JURY DECIDES THAT EVERYBODY LIED

[United Press Leased Wire.] Chicago, July 20.—Ella Gingles, the pretty Irish lacemaker, who was last night acquitted of a charge of stealing from Miss Agnes Barrette, will be sent to her home in Ireland, according to an announcement made by her attorney today.

Miss Gingles said today that she would not consider an offer made by theatrical managers to put her on the stage.

The jury, in acquitting the girl of a charge of theft, returned a verdict discrediting the sensational story told by her on the witness stand. This story was to the effect that Miss Barrette, for whom she formerly worked, instigated two brutal attacks upon her last winter, and attempted to sell her as a "white slave" to an unnamed man at French Lick Springs, Ind.

MARYHILL THE LATEST TOWNSITE

Hill's Son-in-Law Will Build an Up-to-Date City in Klickitat County, Washington.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Seattle, Wash., July 20.—Maryhill, which will be located on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad, in Klickitat county, Washington, by Samuel Hill, son-in-law of J. J. Hill, the railroad magnate, will be the most model city in the state, if the present plans are carried out.

It will be in the midst of a farming community, with all the modern urban conveniences, such as daily mail delivery, daily newspapers, telephones, water and sewer system, on a scale never before attempted on the Pacific coast.

The tract of 6000 acres cost Mr. Hill more than \$300,000, and it lies in a particularly favored spot in Klickitat county. It is to be known to fame hereafter as the Maryhill tract, and the railway station where the traveler alights from his car to reach the tract has already been named Maryhill.

Why Maryhill? the question might be asked.

Simply because Mrs. Hill's mother-in-law was christened Mary, and his wife, the daughter of James J. Hill was likewise christened Mary and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Hill was named Mary, so all three of the Mary Hills shared in the honor.

Mr. Hill has a number of Eastern investors associated with him in the scheme of improving and planting the tract. Small farmers will eventually become the rule, and a hotel, school house and other improvements have already been provided. A systematic effort will be made to enlist the support of Pennsylvania Quakers in the Maryhill enterprise, Mr. Hill being an old member of that faith.

WILL RUN MARATHON RACES AT SEATTLE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Seattle, Wash., July 20.—Tim McGrath, of San Francisco, announced today that a \$20,000 derby Marathon with such stars as St. Yves, Longboat, Dorando, Marsh and Shrubbs entered, will be pulled off in Seattle within a month. McGrath is the Marathon dictator of the coast, having under his control by contract the majority of the California professionals. He is also in close touch with Pat Powers and Harry Pollock, who control the Eastern fliers. The proposed race will be the biggest ever pulled off outside of New York, according to the Californian.

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PROGRESS OF BRINGING IN MOUNTAIN WATER

Will Tax Best Abilities of Business Men and Resources of Engineers of High Order of Talent.

The great undertaking of bringing in mountain water for the state institutions and the Capital City has reached a pretty definite stage. The report of Engineer Culver as to the cost of piping a supply from the Breitenbush has been completed and is in the hands of the mayor. Mayor Rodgers also has in his hands the report of the three engineers representing the state, the city and the water company on the inventory and estimated value of the present plant. The mayor is studying reports from other cities. A committee of the state board of health will visit the Breitenbush in company with the mayor and mountain water committee of the city council and make analyses of the water on the ground where the samples are taken. When all the data are in hand the papers in the case will all be placed before the mountain water commission of fifteen that has charge of the whole proposition.

It is understood that the city of Salem alone could not bring mountain water fifty miles and also buy out the present plant of the Salem Water Company. But the Capital City could get along with its present supply and is a secondary consideration to the interests of the state and the eight state institutions located here. To give those institutions an adequate supply of pure mountain water from a forest reserve stream that is beyond pollution is the real problem that is being worked out, and to which the best men in this city are bending their best energies. It is a herculean task and means an expenditure of a million to a million and a quarter dollars. It will take all of this year and next to bring it to a successful conclusion and will take the best thought and wisdom and experience of able business men and scientific engineering to bring it safely to a proper conclusion.

GENERAL WEAVER'S OPINION

Man Who Was Twice Candidate for the Presidency Says Congress Will Not Keep Faith.

MINORITY IS HONEST

"MR. TAFT WOULD LIKE TO KEEP PLEDGES BUT MAY CONSIDER HIS FIRST DUTY IS TO HIS PARTY RATHER THAN TO THE COUNTRY."

[United Press Leased Wire.] Seattle, July 20.—In an interview today General James B. Weaver, twice candidate for president of the United States and prominent in the affairs of the country, who is visiting at the home of his daughter in this city, discussed the present political situation with regard to the tariff question, and when asked whether he believed President Taft to be sincere in his threat to kill the pending tariff bill, replied:

"I think Mr. Taft would like very much to keep the pledges he made in the campaign, but if he is compelled to make choice between his obligations to keep the pledges and his conclusion that it was his duty to keep the Republican party from falling to pieces, he will serve his party rather than his country, and in doing that, will make the great mistake of his life, and will both break his pledges and shiver his party into atoms."

General Weaver said that the Republican party had entertained the campaign with distinct pledges of tariff revision, and it was universally understood by the people to mean

such a revision as would relieve them of the burden of taxation, and to that extent free them from the clutch of combinations and trusts. The struggle now going on at Washington, he said, between the minority, which desires to honestly keep the campaign pledges, and those who intend to deceive the people and who are determined to break faith with them, is a complete demonstration of the lawless character of the rings and cliques that are now controlling the country in the interest of the predatory classes.

"There cannot and will not be any substantial revision of the tariff at the hands of the present congress," he said. "There are brave and good men—Republicans—in the senate, who are making heroic efforts in behalf of the people, but they are powerless and the machine will grind them to powder."

Street Car Men—

Those bookkeepers in the Twilight Baseball League were again defeated last night by a score of 7 to 5 by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company team, in the same league. The street car men had the bookkeeping bunch on their easy list in the game last night, and, notwithstanding the bookkeepers swiped the ball considerably, the car operators turned the game about their way in fine shape. TWO MILES PAVING ORDERED

Bitulithic on East State Street Must Be of Standard Variety.

The Salem city council by an unanimous vote on every proposition adopted a number of resolutions, and also passed ordinances to grade and pave a number of streets.

It would take 500 men and teams to do all the street work that has been ordered, and this city will be a very busy place for the next six months.

1. A resolution was put through to improve Broadway.
2. To improve Kearney from High to Commercial.
3. To grade and macadamize Asylum avenue from Mill creek to the Savage grove.
4. To improve Pine street 18 feet wide with six inches of compressed gravel.
5. Same improvement on North Fifth street between Market and Highland.
6. Advertisements ordered for the improvement of North Front street.
7. North Twenty-first street ordered opened through pasture lot on North Nineteenth street.

Hitch on State Street.
The specifications for bitulithic pavement on State street from Twelfth to Mill creek provide for a 40-foot roadway, less seven feet for the street car line. Plans and specifications adopted. On motion of Mr. Stolz reconsidered for purpose of changing specifications for special feature to same as bitulithic on lower State street—the standard pavement so far put down on all streets. Mr. Stolz suggested that it would be a mistake to put down the lighter form of this pavement on this street, as it had the heaviest travel of any street in the city, and should be uniform with the rest of that street, especially as it was to have only a 40-foot roadway. It was sent to the street committee to be reported on at next Monday night meeting. Total cost, as reported last night, \$25,407.72.

RICH GOLD STRIKE IN CALIFORNIA

OBJECTS TO WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Dr. Buchtel, ex-Governor of Colorado, Tells of Woman's Part in Politics of That State.

"ONLY DREGS VOTE"

SAYS EXPERIENCE TEACHES HIM THAT "WHEN WOMAN SEEKS POWER IT IS A GREAT CALAMITY NOT ONLY TO HER BUT TO THE MEN AS WELL."

[United Press Leased Wire.] New York, July 20.—Although the Rev. Dr. Henry A. Buchtel, former governor of Colorado, announced that he disliked the discussion and outbursts that would follow his remarks on "woman's suffrage," it is probable, from the attitude of several suffragette leaders that the pastor will be a target for criticism for several days.

Dr. Buchtel, who is chancellor of Denver university, discussed woman's suffrage from the standpoint of one who has experienced the effects of women's use of a franchise.

"Only the dregs of womanhood vote in Colorado, the mothers have to be practically clubbed to the polls," said the minister.

"It is a hateful subject to me," he continued, "for once I make any statement regarding it all the long haired men and short haired women will be up in arms to argue about it. I dislike to incur any unnecessary outbursts, but New York is taking woman suffrage far more seriously now than Colorado, where the women have full rights."

"Chivalry was the motive that promoted equal suffrage in Colorado and the woman legislators have been suffered to put forth their claims out of deference to their sex. There have been few who did not demand the most absurd and unreasonable laws. The only trouble about the women legislators is that they will not listen to arguments—no woman will. Logic does not appeal to them."

"I remember that once a minister took to advising the women of his flock to interest themselves in a cer-

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ALL JUST BECAUSE HE KISSED HER

Secretary of Navy Thinks It Beneath Naval Officers' Dignity to Notice a Little Smack.

Vallejo, Cal., July 20.—Lieutenant Franklin Wayne (Boy) Osburn, party with the wife of Lieutenant Commander Holden A. Evans, to an alleged osculatory performance enacted in the Evans home Christmas morning that set navy circles gossiping and figured in the divorce of Evans and his wife, is to be reprimanded by his superior officers, according to advices from Secretary of the Navy Meyer, which reached here today.

Subsequent to Boy Osburn's indiscretion he was called before a naval court of inquiry. Secretary Meyer yesterday announced his findings upon the report of the court and the young lieutenant will not be tried before a court-martial.

Lieutenant Commander Evans also is to be subjected to an official reprimand, according to the same advices. He is to be reprimanded for giving undue publicity to his domestic infelicities.
