REMARKABLE GROWTH OF WALLA WALLA.

The county has 34,000 population and the tax levy is 12 1/2 mills on a valuation of \$19,000,000.

That county has the Northern Pacific and the O. R. and N. railroads, with 69 shipping stations, four and a half miles apart.

Salem has the advantage of Walla Walla in being a state capital, and with modern methods can become as fine a city.

MURDERER O'NEAL IS CAPTURED

Leavenworth, Kan., July 21.—Private Charles O'Neal, who killed Minnie Sharbena, with whom he was in love, near Fort Leavenworth, is in custody today. He was captured late yesterday in Lake Merritt, where he threatened to drown himself, by Private William Oosterhuysen of the Fifteenth cavalry.

Miss Sharbena was employed as a maid in the home of Captain Charles Murphy. Jealousy is said to have been the motive for O'Neal's crime.

After the killing O'Neal fled from the post, going in the direction of Lake Merritt. When discovered by Oosterhuysen he waded to his neck in the water and threatened to drown himself. Oosterhuysen persuaded him to give himself up and brought him to this city.

For the capture Oosterhuysen was promoted to the rank of corporal.

GOVERNOR ROGERS' WIDOW IS DEAD

Seattle, July 21.—Mrs. Sarah L. Rogers, widow of John R. Rogers, governor of the state of Washington at the time of his death, is dead at the home of Mrs. R. Wentz, on Fifteenth avenue Northeast, Seattle, after an illness of more than a year.

Three sons and two daughters survive: Fred J. Rogers, professor of physics at Stanford university, California; Albert R. Rogers, editor of a newspaper at Santa Barbara, Cal.; Edwin R. Rogers, head of a manufacturing concern at Tacoma; Mrs. William Blackman, a resident of Spokane, and Miss Helen Rogers of Tacoma.

Interment will be at Puyallup, where Governor Rogers is buried.

PRIEST'S SISTER SHOT TWO OF HIS ASSAILANTS

Alpena, Mich., July 21.—Two wounded men are in hiding today from officers of the law, who, armed with warrants, seek them on complaint of Father Nowakowski, of St. Mary's Roman Catholic church here, who, in company with several others, they attacked last Sunday. The priest was saved from serious injury by his sister, Miss Mary Nowakowski, who shot the two men and dispersed their companions.

Feeling against Father Nowakowski has been high for some time, and Bishop Richter has been asked to remove him. This the bishop refused to do, and a committee called upon the priest to persuade him to leave. Bishop Richter was present. A quarrel followed, which was ended by the valiant sister using a revolver. The girl was arrested, but later released on bail.

Following the miniature riot the unpopular priest was transferred by the bishop.
