FIFTEEN MILLIONS THIS YEAR

Reports From Tanana Show a Heavy Increase in the Yearly Production of Gold.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., July 21.—According to advices brought by the steamer Victoria, which arrived in port early this morning from Nome and St. Michaels, the output of gold from the Tanana valley for the year will be between \$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000, an increase of between 35 and 50 per cent over last year. In the strong box of Purser Tracy was \$160,000 in bullion treasure, and a considerable amount of gold brought in private boxes. The Victoria brought 351 passengers, many of whom came out for the purpose of visiting the exposition.

HE KILLS ANOTHER "LARGEST"

"Bwana Tumbo" Shot Fero-cious Bull Hippo—Eleven Others Fled at Sight of Teddy.

(By Warrington Dawson, Staff Correspondent United Press.) Nalvasha, B. E. A., July 21.—(By messenger from Saigosol Camp.)—surrounded by 12 infuriated hippopotami while in a rowboat on Lake Nalvasha, pursuing a half hippo, Col. Roosevelt had a thrilling escape from death Tuesday.

Accompanied by two native boatmen, the former president followed the calf when it plunged into the lake. When a considerable distance from the shore several gigantic hippos suddenly appeared at the surface and surrounded the frail craft. Terrorized, the boatmen covered in the bottom of the boat while the great animals savagely rammed it. One great bull persistently dived and came up under the boat, often raising it almost clear of the water. Roosevelt gave his entire attention to this besieger and dispatched him with his express rifle. The other hippos fled precipitately, but not before a cow also had sunk beneath the surface with an express bullet in her eye.

The bull, which was secured by the native attendants and towed to the shore, was the largest yet taken by the ex-president's party.

It was only when he failed to return to camp that the rest of his party became alarmed and a launch was sent in search of him.

It was 3 o'clock in the morning before the searchers returned, bringing the colonel and his two worshipping boatmen.

The enormous bull and the cow were towed to the camp, making progress necessarily slow.

Roosevelt's escape from death when he was attacked by the angry animals undoubtedly was the narrowest he has experienced since his arrival at the hunting fields. The boatmen who were with him have not yet recovered from their fright, and attribute the fact that they are alive today to the coolness and unerring aim of the hunter statesman.

Owing to the time lost because of the necessity of sending out a searching party and the delay in towing the hippos to camp, the party will be delayed in starting to Nairobi. Camp will probably not be broken until tomorrow morning.

KILLED FOUR TO ROB ONE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Aberdeen, S. D., July 21.—Confessing that he killed four persons so that he might rob one, Emil E. Veithor told his story to the police today. Veithor has been held here since July 3 on suspicion of having murdered John Christie, his wife, daughter and a farm hand named Michael Roynane.

"I struck Christie over the head with a club, he said, 'intending to rob him. I didn't mean to kill him, my only motive being robbery. I must have hit harder than I intended, for he dropped dead under the blow."

Then the Roynane boy appeared, and I shot him. I saw then that my only chance of avoiding discovery was to make a clean sweep. I met Mrs. Christie and her daughter and killed them, to keep them from informing on me."

Veithor will be brought to trial within a short time.
