

ABSORBS EXPRESS BUSINESS

Harriman Will Control 60,000
Miles Railroad, 16,000
Miles of Other Lines.

San Francisco, July 22.—The departure of Andrew Christenson, general manager of the San Francisco department of the Wells-Fargo Express Company, for the City of Mexico has led to the circulation of a report that E. H. Harriman has arranged a merger of the express business of the Diaz republic with the companies he controls in this country.

According to the report here Christenson will be met at the City of Mexico by C. W. Stockton, of New York, general attorney for the Wells-Fargo Company, and Dudley Evans, president of the company, will go there a few days later.

Three big companies, the Mexican Express, National Express and Inter-oceanic Express, and a number of smaller concerns are to be absorbed by the Wells-Fargo. If the report here is true, the deal will run high into the millions of dollars.

It is understood that President Diaz has reached an understanding with the American railroad magnate whereby a certain percentage of the income of the combined companies will be paid into the treasury of the Mexican government.

Under the new arrangement Harriman will control the express business of over 10,000 miles of railroad in Mexico. This will give him the express business over about 60,000 miles of railroad; 1252 miles of stage lines; 1300 miles of inland steamship lines, and 14,000 miles of ocean steamship lines.

NEGRO BURGLAR SHOT AND CAPTURED

Los Angeles, Cal., July 22.—After being shot twice and eluding scores of pursuers nearly all night, Lon Goodman, a negro, is in the city prison today held on suspicion of attempting a burglary.

Shots aroused the residents in the vicinity of Bronson apartments on South Grand avenue shortly after 10 o'clock last night.

W. A. Frix, formerly of Atlanta, Ga., saw a negro peering into a room on the lower floor of the Bronson apartments. Frix seized a revolver and fired three times.

The shooting drew a crowd of pedestrians and others living in the neighborhood and with a trail of blood as a guide the chase began. Although fifty or more persons, including policemen and detectives, followed the trail, which crossed and recrossed itself a score of times, pursuit was abandoned practically until word came to police headquarters from a physician that the wounded negro had received treatment from him. Detectives followed the clew given by the physician and shortly before dawn came upon Goodman in a lodging house. He has two bullet holes in his left arm and the police believe him to be the man shot by Frix.

again severed by the storm, and nothing is known of the damage done there by the storm. From the fact that waves were piled over the high breakwater by the first storm, it is feared that more water was driven into the city's streets by the second. It is not thought, however, that there is any danger of the sea wall having given away, after the way in which it withstood the waves yesterday.

The storm extended north from the Gulf of Mexico. Towns in the Colorado river valley between here and the coast suffered greatly, but no lives were reported lost in any of them, according to early advices received here. Communication with the surrounding country is intermittent, the wires have been wrecked by the gale, and it will probably be some time before details of the damage are known.

Reports already received indicate that much damage was done at Hallettsville, Yoakum, Roseburg and La Grange.

Nine Bodies Recovered.

Galveston, Texas, July 22.—Bodies of nine persons drowned yesterday, when the Bettison pier collapsed in the storm, were recovered today. Galveston did not suffer from the second storm which swept the gulf during the night.

Rapid progress is being made in the repair work on the railroad bridge which connects Galveston with the main land, and it was announced this afternoon that a train would enter the city by 6 o'clock tonight.

Damage Light There.

New Orleans, La., July 22.—Little damage was done along the Mississippi and Louisiana coasts by two storms which swept the country. Some property was destroyed, but no loss of life is reported.

Every Building Demolished.

San Antonio, Texas, July 22.—Every building in Random, Texas, was demolished by the storm last night. Several persons were injured, some possibly fatally, but no deaths have been reported.

East Bernard was also destroyed. No fatalities are reported there. Heavy damage is reported to have been done at Eagle Lake.

The rice crop suffered from the storm, the damage being estimated at more than \$100,000.

Reports from Eagle Lake say that a Southern Pacific passenger train was hit by flying wreckage and a number of passengers hurt near there.

Communication with Corpus Christi has been severed, and the report of a train wreck there cannot be confirmed. No details of the supposed accident have been received. Velasco, Texas, near Galveston, was wrecked last night by a second hurricane, which struck there about midnight. Several persons are reported to have been injured. Advices from there are meager.

In the Guinea diamond mines one life is given up for every 200 carats of diamonds secured, and the men get \$7.20 a day.

MILL MEN ARE GIVEN HARD DEAL

Scrap Among the Railroads
Gives Coast Sawmills the
Worst of the Deal.

Seattle, July 22.—Reductions in the rates on forest products from points in Montana to the consuming markets in North and South Dakota, Western Minnesota, Nebraska and other Middle Western states, with no corresponding reductions from coast shipping points, are contained in the new trans-continental freight bureau lumber and shingle tariff.

The new tariff also shows that the Northern route, the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific, have made sharp reductions on rates to points in the Middle West, to which the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound cut the rates on lumber and shingles.

Lumbermen declared today that the new schedule will be disastrous to coast mills, and are likely to result in the loss of more trade than did the efforts of the trans-continental lines to advance the rates from coast points two years ago, which, after much litigation, the lumbermen were able to head off in a large measure.

OBJECTS TO WAR IN MOROCCO

Madrid, July 22.—Troops rebelling and citizens making demonstrations against the government today show the bitter feeling throughout the country against the war in Morocco. Despatches from Barcelona state that a company of troops rebelled today, as they were about to embark for Melilla to reinforce the Spanish garrison there, which is being besieged by Moors.

There were several clashes here last night between the authorities and the people, who paraded the streets in demonstration of disapproval for the government's course.

BRIDE OF A MONTH IS LEFT A WIDOW

San Diego, Cal., July 22.—Mrs. George Glick-Orr, bride of a month, is prostrated today by the death of her husband in the surf at La Jolla, where the young couple were spending their honeymoon.

Orr, who was from Atchison, Kansas, was overcome by an undertow while bathing late yesterday and was drowned before aid could reach him.

Orr was a son of James W. Orr of Atchison, attorney for the Santa Fe railroad. His marriage a month ago was the social event of the year in the Kansas town.

ARISIDE BRIAN IS APPOINTED PREMIER

Brian announced that he would make few, if any, changes in the cabinet as organized by Premier Clemenceau, who resigned two days ago, after being defeated in a heated argument with M. Former Premier Clemenceau announced today that he would start next Saturday for Carlsbad, Austria.
