The Southern Pacific Railroad company has answered the complaint of William Beckett, in which it is stated that the Southern Pacific company left a boxcar standing on their crossing over the highway leading past the penitentiary for three days, interfering with travel. The Southern Pacific company acknowledges the mistake and says in a letter to the commission today that the complainant was fully justified in referring the matter to the commission. The big hoisting derrick used in placing the steel in the new steel structure at the corner of Commercial and State streets, has been taken down and will be shipped away very shortly. The remainder of the steel construction work, which is being finished up now, is much lighter than the lower floor, and a common block and tackle, with the aid of the "derrick," is doing the work. The cement and brick work will be started, probably Monday, and it will not be long before the steel monster makes a noise like a house.

Mr. Hallberg has conducted two stores in other cities, but is closing them out, and has decided to cast his lot with the people of Salem. They are having fine quarters fitted up for themselves at their location on Liberty street, just off the corner of State.

AMERICA FRIENDLY TO CHINA

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, July 22.—That aggressiveness will mark the policy of the United States in the Orient is apparent today from the statements attributed to Charles R. Crane, of Chicago, who has been appointed recently minister to China by President Taft. In an interview with a local banker, Crane is reported to have said:

"This nation does not propose to allow any other power to become a commercial dictator in the Far East. This nation will insist on the strict enforcement of the open door policy, and I am certain that President Taft desires that America shall become a powerful factor in the Orient."

"The interest of the government at Washington and Peking's knowledge that our friendship is not prompted by a desire for financial gain, should certainly have a tendency to add impetus to the campaign that is now being made by the Chinese government to extend and develop the empire's domestic and foreign commerce."

The New Yorker then went on to say: "America has at last awakened to the vast possibilities for investment in the Orient, and the selection of Mr. Crane is the best that could be made for the opening of the campaign we intend to make. Mr. Crane shows great interest in his new work and is alive to the situation. He realizes that the coming year will mark an epoch in China, and in relations of America with that country."

SUTTONS SPRING A SURPRISE

Annapolis, Md., July 22.—Declaring that she has discovered that her son had an appointment to meet a young woman seven hours after the time he died, Mrs. Sutton sprang a sensation prior to the opening of today's session of the inquiry into the death of Lieutenant James M. Sutton, of Oregon.

"I have received a letter from Miss Stewart, of Pittsburg, who is now in Canada," said Mrs. Sutton, "in which she says that she had an appointment to meet my son seven hours later than the time he was shot. I consider this proof that he did not contemplate suicide."

"Miss Stewart and my son had planned to attend he services at the Catholic church on Sunday morning." It is reported here today that former Lieutenant Edward P. Roelker, who is wanted as a witness at the hearing, has been located at Kittanning, Pa. Secret service men are supposed to have gone there to get him. Lieutenant Willing went on the witness stand and testified regarding the quarrel which preceded Sutton's death.

"Yes, I told Bevan to let them alone, so Adams could punch his head off," admitted Willing. Refuting the theory that Sutton died from blows he received during the fight, Surgeon Pickrel went on the witness stand and testified that none of the wounds on the lieutenant's face or body were sufficient to have resulted in his death. He also testified that the revolver shot, which entered the back of the head, could have been fired by Sutton as he lay on the ground.

A HEAVY RAIN IN DULUTH

Duluth, Minn., July 22.—Three persons were drowned here during the night as the result of a terrific rainstorm which swept the city. The property damage as the result of the furious wind and deluge of rain is enormous. Conservative estimates place the damage at fully \$1,500,000 in the city and surrounding territory.

PIN IN HER THROAT MAY KILL HER

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Pasadena, Cal., July 22.—With a pin lodged in her throat in such a position that a slight movement may puncture one of the largest arteries in her body, Lola St. Pierre, the 8-year-old daughter of Mrs. J. St. Pierre, of this city, is in a local hospital today, practically starving to death.

The child swallowed the pin two weeks ago, and it took lodgement in such a way that the surgeons feared to operate to remove. The location of the pin was determined by a sounding rod, which clanked slightly when the intervening metal was touched.

The child fed for two weeks on small fluid portions, but surgeons have ascertained that with each swallow the pin became wedged firmer in the throat.

A consultation was held and an effort will be made to manipulate the windpipe in the hope of working the pin free. Should this fail a capital operation will be performed, which in the present weakened state of the child, will be rendered doubly serious.

RESIGNS, BUT WILL NOT GO TO EUROPE

Prof. LeRoy Gesner, when seen by a Journal reporter today, said the story sent the Oregonian from Eugene to the effect that he had resigned his position as instructor on the violin in the musical department of the University of Oregon and that he would go to Europe to study, is misleading. He has resigned the position in order to accept a more lucrative one, but he will not go to Europe to study. He added that when one had studied as he had so strenuously and for so many years, under Sevcik, the greatest violin master of modern times, he could maintain his musical equilibrium without seeking further instruction.
