CAPTAIN CONBOY IS DISMISSED

Celebrating Birth of Grandchild He Got Drunk and Without Cause Shot Bernard Lagan.

San Francisco, July 23.—Police Captain Michael Joseph Conboy, who wound up a quarter of a century of service on the local force by shooting Bernard Lagan, Jr., June 23, while intoxicated, was dismissed officially at 2 o'clock this morning, when the board of police commissioners returned a verdict of guilty on a charge of intoxication. Conboy was represented by counsel at the board's hearing. He declined to discuss the verdict, which was unanimous.

After an evening alleged to have been spent at down-town cafes, celebrating the birth of a grandson, Conboy was found in an alleged helpless condition at 1:30 o'clock in the morning by Lagan and a friend. Lagan, he claimed, assisted the officer to his feet, and, as a reward for his services, was called a vile name.

According to George Greenwood, Lagan's companion, the young man walked back to the officer to demand an apology, whereupon Conboy drew his revolver and fired.

Lagan was taken to a hospital where for several weeks he hovered between life and death. It was feared that if he lived he would be a life-long paralytic. Conboy was arrested later. His hearing by the police commission was preliminary to the hearing of criminal charges pending against him as the result of the shooting.

The testimony of witnesses before the commission last night differed noticeably.

Several witnesses stated on the stand that the police captain was sober when he left Odeon cafe immediately before the shooting.

WILL GIVE LOW RATES FROM EAST

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Portland, July 23.—Acting independently of other lines connecting the Pacific northwest with the east, the Harriman system of railroads announced today that during September and October colonist rates similar to those which brought 63,000 settlers to this part of the country last spring will be in effect.

Local officials of the Great Northern, Canadian Pacific and Northern Pacific declare that as far as they know their roads will not join the Harriman lines in establishing the low rates.

Heretofore colonist rates have been established to western points by agreements entered into by all the transcontinental railroads. The rates will be put in effect September 15; the colonist tickets will be sold every day until October 15. While identical with the spring colonist rates, the fall rates this year will be \$5 lower than the fall rates of last year.

The following rates will be in effect: Chicago, \$33; Omaha, \$25; St. Louis, \$30.50; St. Paul, \$25.

It is surmised that similar rates will be in effect by the other transcontinental lines, applying generally from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Tennessee and Texas terminals.

Seattle, July 23.—At 9 o'clock this morning the editors attending the convention of the National Editorial Association boarded the steamer Hysk and departed for Tacoma where the day will be spent in visiting the points of interest in that city. The delegates will arrive back in Seattle tonight and tomorrow morning they will sail for Alaska on the steamer Northwestern. The trip will occupy 20 days.

At a meeting late yesterday afternoon officers were elected and the final business session of the convention was held. A. Nevins Pomeroy of Chambersburg, Pa., was elected president and J. P. Baumgartner of Santa Ana, Cal., vice president. The place of meeting next year will be decided upon by the executive committee. Chattanooga, Tenn., is the most prominent candidate.

CARNEY REMAINS POOL CHAMPION

San Francisco, July 23.—Joe Carney of San Francisco successfully defended his title as pool champion of the Pacific coast when he finished a 400-ball match with Ed Dowd of Buffalo last night.

Carney won his match with Dowd handily, the final score being 600 to 476. He made a brilliant finish. The match began three days ago, Dowd starting off like a winner. The local crack played steadily, however, and with a final spurt left his opponent far behind.

TO SHUT OUT AMERICAN FISHERMEN

Canadian Fish Commissioner Frankly Admits This Is Why Bait Will Not Be Sold.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Bellingham, Wash., July 23.—Prof. Edward E. Prince, fish commissioner of the Dominion of Canada, who, with President Jordan, of Stanford university, representing the United States, is on tour of investigation, with a view to the formulation of a code of laws looking to the conservation of the fishing industry, in speaking of the recent action of Dominion officials in refusing to allow American halibut fishers to buy bait on the Canadian side, said today:

"The statement that the Dominion officials are trying to drive the American fishermen out of Canadian waters is correct. That is the object of this restriction. The Americans, under a strict interpretation of the international fisheries treaty, as it applies to the Pacific coast, have no right to buy bait, to maintain headquarters or to catch fish on the Canadian side of the line."

The commissioners are here to observe the sockeye salmon run at its height, and to study the method of catching the salmon on the American side.

FORTY KILLED BY FALLING BUILDING

St. Petersburg, July 23.—Forty persons are known to have been killed and many others buried under the ruins of a five-story building which collapsed today. Forty bodies have been recovered and it is expected that others will be found when searchers remove more of the debris.
