JUMPED FROM CAR AND MADE GET-AWAY

Bellingham, Wash., July 23.—Man seized with a pair of handcuffs, a Japanese, charged with having issued forged checks to the amount of \$1000, outwitted Deputy Sheriff Coleman on the Great Northern "owl" train north of Everett at 2 o'clock this morning, and made his escape.

The Japanese jumped through the window in the toilet room of the coach while the train was running at full speed. The train was stopped as soon as possible, and search instituted along the track, as it was believed that the mangled body of the man would be found, but news brought to the city by the trainmen is to the effect that no trace could be found of the fugitive.

The Japanese was arrested yesterday morning by Deputy Coleman near Port Townsend, and is suspected of being the one who planned and executed the wholesale forgery of the checks against August McLeod, of this city.

The girl is under the juvenile court of Portland, and was allowed to work in Marion and Polk counties, but as soon as she skipped into Linn, she was ordered back. She will be under the supervision of the juvenile court until she become of age, one and a half years.

Visiting Oregon

After an absence of over 26 years, Mr. W. S. Chrisman, of Stockton, Cal., has just returned to this state, where he had spent the greater part of his childhood days, and on the 17th, inst., he visited his sister Mrs. T. M. Munkers, and Mr. and Mrs. Edward Keene, of 692 North Front street, this city. Mr. Chrisman expects to extend his visit among his Oregon relatives for at least two months, and later have a family reunion of his remaining brothers and sisters before his return to California. He received a thorough education in the common and higher grade schools of this state, and at one time was a student of Willamette University, under the presidency of Prof. T. M. Gatch. He chose the profession of teaching at the age of 20, and was engaged in his chosen profession for many years in the public and high schools of this state, Washington and California.

Arrange for Ball Games

The final arrangements have been made by the managers of the local city baseball team, Heyser and Jeruman, and beginning next Sunday a series of three games with Portland Tri-City teams has been scheduled. Next Sunday the Albina aggregation will be in the city, and the Salem Independents will meet them on the Asylum avenue grounds at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and try for honors of the first game played here since the Cherry Fair. Notwithstanding the Tri-City league broke up and disbanded, the teams representing the former organization have not been idle, and are playing all the time. A good game is anticipated by the Salem fans next Sunday, and there will be a good bunch of rooters on the grounds to help the home team win. Sunday after next the St. Johns team will play Salem, and then the team from Vancouver will be here to play. Both of these clubs have been playing excellent ball this season in the Tri-City league. The managers of the local team have not been letting any good men get past lately, and, although what the exact lineup is to be hereafter is not known as yet, it is assured the fast playing teams from Portland and Vancouver will not carry all the honors. After these games have been playing other organizations will be dated by the Salem managers, and an attempt will be made to furnish the fans with continuous ball for the remainder of the season.

Important Cases Next Week

Owing to the attorneys in the Pacific States Telephone Company vs. Marion County case being unprepared to argue it this morning Judge Burnett set it for some time in August, at which time he will probably hold a special or postponed term. Judge Burnett then adjourned court until next Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Next week the cases of the state against the Standard Oil Company and the Wells Fargo Express Company will probably be tried. These two suits are for delinquent incorporation tax alleged to be due the state.

FOUND DEAD IN HOME AT MILL CITY

Coroner Clough received the information this morning from a resident of Mill City that an old lady had been discovered dead in her home in that city, having passed away two or three days ago, evidently from heart disease, as there were no marks or other indications of violence about the body. The informant did not give the dead woman's name, but said she was known to have some money in the bank, and owned a few acres of land in Mill City. She lived alone in a cottage a short distance from Mill City, and no one had been noticed about the residence but herself.

When the body was found, it was lying face downward on the bedroom floor, where she had apparently fallen from the edge of the bed. She was partly dressed, having one shoe on, but not tied, and the other shoe lay close by. Coroner Clough asked the man phoning if there was any possibility of foul play, and, upon being informed to the contrary, he instructed that the remains be buried, and the expenses taken out of the estate.

SORENSEN SUES FOR LAND CERTIFICATES

N. V. Sorenson, through his attorney, John F. Logan of Portland, has instituted proceedings in the circuit court here for the purpose of recovering a number of certificates of sale to 3200 acres of school land situated in Marion, Lane and Linn counties. The defendant in the case is W. L. Brewster of Appleton, Wis., administrator of the estate of George Baldwin, deceased, and Edwin Schwartz, to whom 480 acres of the timber land was previously transferred by Brewster.

S. A. D. Pater purchased from the state land board prior to 1900 the certificates and during the same year, after signed the certificates of sale over to Baldwin, a timber speculator of Wisconsin, and it is claimed by Sorenson as collateral security for a loan of approximately \$7400 to be held in trust for Pater until he could redeem them. In July, 1907, Pater transferred his title to the lands for a valuable consideration to Sorenson, who alleges he tendered to Brewster, administrator, the full amount of cash loaned in the transaction, together with interest aggregating \$7840, and demanded a relinquishment of the certificates in his favor, which was refused, and Sorenson therefore brought this suit.

MANNISH WOMEN BEAT A MASHER

San Francisco, July 23.—Charges of disorderly conduct made against "Miss Helena Castle," divorced wife of Elias Gifford, a Boston broker, and her chum, Miss "Billy" Girard, were dismissed today. The charges arose from the fact that the young women administered a severe beating to two men who accosted them in the streets Wednesday night.

After dismissing the case against the young women, the court instructed an officer to escort them to their hotel.

"If anyone annoys these women, or makes remarks about their attire," instructed the court, "arrest the offender, and I'll send him to jail."

The case was dismissed because of the failure of the prosecuting witnesses to appear.

FEARS GAMBLERS MAY SPOIL BASEBALL

(United Press Licensed Wire.) San Francisco, July 23.—That the national game of baseball stands in danger of being compromised by professional bookmakers is the opinion of Police Judge Shortall, of this city.

Two men arrested Wednesday for alleged bookmaking at the coast league games at Recreation Park were brought before the judge. Though their cases were continued, Shortall expressed his fear that the game would eventually become the medium for the operations of bookmakers and pool rooms.

"Racing and boxing have been perverted and corrupted through gambling, and it is not surprising that gamblers, especially where race track gambling is prohibited, turn to baseball. I think that any such tendency should be nipped in the bud. Baseball has the name of being America's clean sport. It always has been clean in California, and I want to see it remain so."

VICTORIA READY FOR RUN TO CORVALLIS

The steamboat Victoria arrived in Albany last Friday on her initial trip from Independence. The little craft is not yet fully completed but it is just the thing for the river this time of the time of the year. It draws 10 inches of water and will be used in the carrying of freight and passengers from Salem to Corvallis. It is owned by Dr. Parrish of Independence. Seven men came up the river on the first trip. Dr. Parrish stated that trips would be every other day. The boat went up to Corvallis the same evening.

The Victoria will come up the river on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week and will go back as far as Salem on the other days. At Salem the O. C. T. Company will transfer with them to Portland. The little boat is built to carry between 37 and 42 tons of freight.

Al Strong of Monmouth is manager and will endeavor to get up a stock company and give the shippers of this city a chance to join. The little boat had no trouble in getting over the Santiam riffle this side of Buena Vista, thus insuring a water route the whole year around. The Victoria returned to Independence Saturday.—Herald.
