

CITY COUNCIL PUTS THROUGH MUCH BUSINESS

SALEM MAY BE ABLE TO EXCLUDE BICYCLES FROM A RESTRICTED DISTRICT.

Application of Fred Carey for license to the old Bill Anderson saloon, referred to committee on parks. Bill to make it unlawful to keep a bawdy house, read twice and referred to committee on ordinances.

Specifications for pile bridge on SouthSouth Winter street, \$950, adopted.

Specifications for improvement of Pine street, at \$783.55, adopted.

Bill for improvement of Kearney street by Herren & Pugh at \$393.50, referred to street committee.

Places for city election to be held August 2, for bond issue, same as heretofore.

Ordinance for paving East State street passed.

Specifications for bitulithic on Liberty from State to Ferry streets. To cost \$5787.64. Adopted.

Assessment ordinance for improvement of Broadway street from Mill creek to Madison, \$6896.

Improvement of Miller street, South Winter street, \$950, adopted, one week.

Liquor license granted to W. J. Davis.

Ordinance to improve Liberty street from State to Ferry.

An ordinance to prohibit bicycles on sidewalks within certain district read twice and referred.

The ordinance provided for exclusion of bicycles, tri-cycles and motor-cycles from all sidewalks between Mission street on the south, Division street on the north and Thirteenth street on the east. Alderman Waters spoke against the bill on third reading as an unjust discrimination against the suburbs.

WHEAT MARKET FREAKISH

Chicago, July 27.—Wheat was sensational to a degree today and fluctuated wildly, advancing with some bullishness and losing under pressure that cost the price several cents. Closing was unchanged for the July and 1/2 to 1 cent lower for the other three options.

The opening of the market was wild with bullish sentiment supreme. At the opening July went to \$1.07% compared with close yesterday at \$1.06%. September \$1.05% compared with \$1.04%, December \$1.03% compared with \$1.03, and May \$1.06% compared with \$1.05%.

Patten was a bear in the wheat pit today while Armour changed places with him and took the bull side.

Spread in the wheat market today was one of the heaviest of recent weeks. In the July the high was \$1.09 and the low \$1.04%, or a spread of 4 1/2 cents. For September the spread was 2 1/2 cents, December 1 1/2 cents, and May 1 1/2 cents a bushel.

Liverpool was weak and lower at the opening but closed unchanged to 1/4 cent higher than yesterday.

St. Louis reported a somewhat better cash wheat situation and the price there was 1 cent higher.

KILLED PLAYMATE WITH A Mallet

Los Angeles, July 27.—Angered because his eight-year-old opponent was beating him at croquet, Jesse Kingley, 10 years of age, struck Levi Irbin on the head with a mallet yesterday afternoon, fracturing the little fellow's skull. The boy died shortly before noon at the county hospital after a surgical operation. The grief-stricken parents of the little victim announced that they would take no steps toward prosecuting the Kingley boy.

The parents of both boys were ordered to appear before the coroner this afternoon and explain the circumstances attending the quarrel that resulted in the little fellow's untimely death. Both families claim that the blow was accidental and followed a childish quarrel. Under these circumstances the authorities say that no prosecution will be made. Both children are negroes.

PAPERS THE BEST MEDIUM

A rather striking demonstration of the supreme value of newspaper advertising over all other kinds for certain classes of publicity is given by the bureau of navigation, which spent last year \$50,000 in advertising for recruits for the navy. A similar sum is to be spent this year, but before letting the contracts the bureau thought it advisable to find out where it had received the best returns for its money. An investigation showed that all magazine and periodical advertising produced from one-fourth to one-sixteenth the return in enlisted men that the newspapers did. The most profitable line of advertising was that under "help wanted." By using the daily newspaper the bureau of navigation got recruits at an advertising cost of \$3.85, against \$15 to \$65 each through the medium of certain magazines and journals. There is in this investigation by the bureau of navigation and its results a most striking lesson for commerce and industry which depend for their profits on being known to the people. It is obvious why the newspaper offers so much more profitable a field than any other medium. Part of the people may read that, but in this day and age the entire population of the county reads the daily newspaper, and goes to it for advice and help—White's Sayings.

POSTMASTER HELD UP AND ROBBED

San Francisco, July 27.—Held up at an early hour this morning, A. A. Liljett, postmaster for Alcatraz island, was relieved of a sealed bag of government papers and \$100 in gold, likewise property of the government.

After robbing him the thugs beat Liljett and he was compelled to go to a hospital. Liljett gave but a vague description of the robbers. He stated that the men apparently had been drinking and were dressed like machinists.

F. B. DeGuire o Silverton.

F. B. DeGuire, a pioneer aged 91 years, died at Silverton Thursday night, July 22. He went to California in 1849, but returned to his native state, but again crossed the plains to California in 1854. With his family he came to Oregon, settling at St. Paul in 1855 and three years later moved to Silverton, where he resided up to the time of his death, 51 years. He was buried in the Miller cemetery at Silverton Saturday afternoon.

TELEPHONE ORDINANCE RE-REFERRED

The telephone ordinance was re-referred to the committee on ordinances to ascertain prices charged for similar service in other cities.

It provides for limiting the charge for use of residence phones on two-party lines to \$1 per month, and is introduced at the request of the Republican City Central Committee, of which Frank B. West is chairman.

The ordinance committee, of which A. N. Moores is chairman, reported favorably on the ordinance bill, and on motion of Alderman Elliott, the bill was referred back to Mr. Moores' committee to ascertain whether Salem was being charged any more by the company than other cities of the same size.

Mr. Moores made an effort to have the ordinance referred to the committee on parks, which seems to be a dumping ground for undesirable measures, but the honor was declined.

Mr. Hofer made a plea that when the matter was adjusted some concession be secured from the telephone company by which its wires would go under ground, at least around our beautiful public square in the heart of the city, which is now surrounded by a fence of unsightly poles.

The telephone company will be given a hearing before the committee on the question of rates in other cities, represented through their local counsel, Carson & Brown.
