REFUSED
TO OBEY
ROBBER

Would Neither Give Up Money
Nor Drive on—"Cussed"
Highwayman Till
He Bolted.

While J. J. McDonald, proprietor of the Liberty grocery store, was driving along the road a quarter of a mile beyond the new school house between this city and Liberty about 5:30 last evening, a masked man stepped out of the shrubbery at the side of the road and pointing a gun at him, told him to throw out his money, and after being informed by Mr. McDonald that there was no money for him, the highwayman shot at but missed his would-be victim.

This morning Mr. McDonald gave a description of the hold-up as follows:

"I had passed the school house about a quarter of a mile on my way home from Salem, where I went for some grocery stock, when a man wearing a mask and a long linen duster stepped out of the brush with a gun in his hand. He told me to throw out my money and when I informed him in rather rough language I believe, that I did not have any money for him, he threatened to shoot if I did not comply with his demand, and I then told him to shoot, which he did, but missed me. He then told me again to throw out my money and I gave him my opinion of such a man in language which would not be printable, I presume, and he then told me to drive on if I didn't have any money. I said I wouldn't drive on, and for him to go on, himself, and began calling to three men who were unloading some furniture at a nearby house. The fellow turned about again and told me to go on, and when I refused he fired again at me and missed the second time. I guess he must have got bluffed out then, as he turned and ran back in the brush and disappeared. I could not get the men to come, although I yelled loudly to them. As near as I could tell he had a 22-calibre gun of ordinary make. His face, which was covered with a blue and white handkerchief with two large holes cut in it for eyes, looked fair and his hair was light. Owing to the holes in the handkerchief being extra large I could see his eyes, which were light blue. He was about five feet eight inches tall and weighed about 165 pounds. I think I could identify him if I see him again, although I did not get a good look at his face."

It is evident that Mr. McDonald was real mad at the highwayman's bold attempt to extort money from him with the aid of a gun, and it is probable that the gun man would have been compelled to "scrap" had his victim been armed also. Mr. McDonald showed nerve in telling the man to shoot, and afterwards gave him a good "cussin'" for his careless use of firearms.

It was some time before the sheriff and city police were informed of the hold-up as Mr. McDonald could not get in connection over the telephone, and it is likely that the criminal has made good his escape by this time. Sheriff Minto is inclined to think the highwayman was a rank amateur at the business and that it may be possible that he will show his hand at some future time.

This is the first hold-up to occur on the Liberty road, and a man taking such chances of getting himself in prison in the manner that Mr. McDonald's "friend" did, is surely new at the business.

HUMBOLDT
WANTS A
RAILROAD

Guarantees the Company \$2,-
000,000 Business First
Year After Road
Is Opened.

Eureka, Cal., July 27.—For the purpose of urging the officials of the Northwestern Pacific railroad, jointly owned by the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific systems, to construct a line from the present terminal at Willits to Eureka, the Humboldt railroad promotion committee left this morning for San Francisco.

During the afternoon the committee will discuss the scheme with Manager A. H. Payson, and lay before him facts and figures to prove that the construction of the railroad into Humboldt county would be a profitable investment.

To add weight to the matter, the committee is authorized to guarantee the railroad \$2,000,000 gross business the first year following the construction.

The matter has been brought to the attention of the railroad officials several times before and the result of today's meeting is watched with intense interest in Humboldt county.

Owing to the roughness of the 150 miles of country it would be necessary to build through, it is estimated that the construction of the proposed line from Eureka to Willits, would be \$9,000,000.

At present the principal means of communication with the south from Eureka is by steamer. Should the corporation decide to put the railroad through it would open Humboldt county up and give the farmers a chance to ship their products to San Francisco by rail via Sausalito.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of State Street.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, State street, in said city, from the east line of Twelfth street to the west line of North Mill creek by moving out and establishing the curb lines so the roadway of said portion of State street will be 40 feet in width from curb to curb and by paving the roadway of said portion of said State street full width from curb to curb; provided, however, that those portions of said State street which are intersected by other streets shall be paved for a width of 50 feet along the center of said portions of said State street.
