The dog had evidently become lost from his owner, and was hot on his trail when he was racing around the corner of the opera house like a streak, and slipped on the wet pavement. The excited pup made no attempt to regain his feet until he had slipped on his back and hind quarters the full width of the street, coming up short on the sidewalk against the other side, when he got on his feet and skipped without looking back.

TWELVE RIOTERS KILLED

Commander Asks for Artillery and Declares He Will Suppress Rioters at Any Cost.

Barcelona, July 27.—Twelve persons were killed and 50 were wounded this afternoon in a clash between the troops and the rioting strikers. The dead include a military captain, three gendarmes and eight rioters. The situation is critical and more bloodshed is expected before night. Hundreds of strikers took possession of the streets today and the troops were ordered out a second time to disperse the mob. As in the earlier clash efforts to clear the streets without force were unavailing and the soldiers were ordered to fire upon the strikers. Several volleys were poured into the ranks of the strikers before they dispersed.

The commander of the troops has demanded that artillery be sent to aid him in keeping order and declared today that he would suppress the rioters at any cost.

SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN OPINIONS

The following opinions were handed down by the supreme court this morning:

O. P. Bowman, plaintiff and respondent, vs. Henry Wade, defendant and appellant; appealed from the circuit court of Umatilla county. H. J. Bean, judge; opinion by Slater; affirmed.

Giant Powder Company, appellants, vs. Oregon Western Railway Company and E. E. Loss Company, respondents; appealed from the circuit court of Douglas county. J. W. Hamilton, judge; petition for rehearing denied per curiam.

H. C. Mahon, respondent, vs. M. B. Rankin, appellant; appealed from the circuit court of Lane county. L. F. Harris, judge; motion for rehearing denied; opinion by Justice Slater.

James Simpson and Anna E. Simpson, respondent, vs. G. M. Harrah, appellant; appealed from the circuit court of Umatilla county. H. J. Bean, judge; decree of the lower court modified; opinion by Justice Eakin.

This is a case in which the respondents were sued for the purpose of enjoining them from interfering with the flow of water from the Little Walla Walla river into the irrigation ditches belonging to the appellant. In the lower court the complainant, Harrah, alleged that the defendants constructed a dam near the head of the ditch, which resulted in the water which was rightfully due him flowing in a different direction, and causing him considerable trouble, and damaging his garden to the extent of \$300. The circuit court decided in favor of the defendants. In the opinion written by Justice Eakin it is stated that there is not a sufficient amount of evidence to show just what the water rights of the two parties involved were, but there was enough to show that the decree of the lower court should be modified, and it was done accordingly, the appellant being awarded \$300 damages and an order enjoining the respondents from further molesting or interfering with the irrigation ditches.

PUNISHMENT MADE TO FIT THE CRIME

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, July 27.—Andrew Thompson is at liberty today, because, although Judge Shortall expressed the opinion that the donor of a rank cigar deserves arrest, he cannot be held on a charge of disturbing the peace.

The trouble started Thursday night when Thompson was followed out of a saloon door by a stream from a seltzer bottle. Seeking sympathy, Thompson told his tale of woe to Patrolman Cavanaugh, attempting to interest the officer in the case by presenting him with a cigar. Cavanaugh accepted the "smoke," and, after carefully inspecting it, placed the donor under arrest.

When Thompson's case was called this forenoon before Judge Shortall the complaining witness handed the cigar to the judge for examination. Cautiously sniffing the weed, the court said:

"There is no doubt in my mind that a man who gave another this cigar ought to be arrested. It is almost loud enough to warrant a charge of disturbing the peace, but as this is the first known offense of the defendant we will not take a chance of reversal by the superior court. The prisoner is discharged."

Baseball Tonight—

What promises to be one of the most interesting and exciting baseball games of the season in the Salem Twilight League will be played on the Willamette field this evening by the strenuous Bookkeepers and the lively Capital team. The occasion for the excitement is due to the fact that the Bookkeepers will appear absolutely for the last time in representation of the Twilight league they having played out their schedule. The Bookkeepers are as yet in the lead by a good majority, but should the Capitals win every one of their games for the rest of their schedule, things will be popping again between the Bookkeepers and the lordly employees of the state house. The Bookkeepers are somewhat crippled at present, their pitcher having a sore arm and a few of the regular men being absent, but nevertheless, they are capable of holding their own and it is expected they will put up a strong fight tonight against the Capitals, who are being backed strongly.

SUTTON CASE IS DELAYED

Judge Advocate's Ruling Puts the Witnesses in the Position of Defendants

[United Press Leased Wire.]

Annapolis, Md., July 27.—Officers and soldiers present at the time of the death of Lieutenant James N. Sutton, the Oregon marine officer, were placed in the position of defendants at the court of inquiry into Sutton's death today by the Judge advocate. The court also ruled that Mrs. James N. Sutton, mother of the dead lieutenant, must assume the position of prosecuting witness. He then postponed further hearing of the case until next week, when Lieutenant Utley, one of the newly designated defendants, will arrive.

This action was taken when a letter, written by Mrs. Sutton, and sent to the navy department, requesting the present inquiry, was introduced in evidence, just after the dead officer's mother had been sworn as a witness. Mrs. Sutton will not be allowed to testify until Utley arrives.

The letter which caused the ruling of the judge advocate reads: "My own investigation convinces me that my son did not commit suicide, but was killed by one of the other officers."

The persons present when Sutton died were Lieutenants Willing, Bevan, Adams, Utley, Osterman and Roelker and Sergeant DeHart.

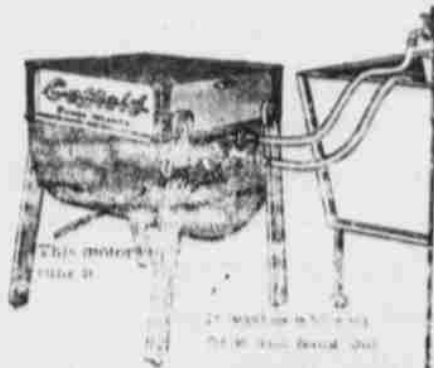
