OFFICERS
MADE QUICK
CAPTURE

Arstell, the Man Who Held Up McDonald, Caught Near Independence and Is Now in Jail.

Within three hours from the time the sheriff's office was notified by Mail Carrier "Billy" Squires that a man answering the description of the highwayman who held up and shot at J. J. McDonald on the Liberty road last Monday evening, Deputy Sheriff William Esch had the fellow "stuck up" and was searching him near Independence, 12 miles from this city. The man proved to be Louis Arstell, an ex-convict pardoned from the Oregon penitentiary on the 12th of this month, having been sentenced from Tillamook county to serve five years for robbery, and with the exception that his complexion was not fair nor his hair light, he answered identically to the description given by Mr. McDonald yesterday.

It has been some time since the usually quiet little city of Independence has had such an awakening as yesterday when the chase began for the highwayman. After Sheriff Minto had been notified by Squires that a man was seen headed for Independence, answering the description of the hold-up man, he and Deputy Esch secured a team as soon as possible and left for Independence taking the Hall's ferry road. The officers did not catch sight of Arstell until they drove up one of Independence's main streets, when they saw him sitting in front of a livery stable. When Arstell saw the officers coming, accompanied by Marshal Taylor of Independence, he asked a bystander, Charles Williams, who the party was, and upon being informed that it was the sheriff from Salem, Arstell darted out back of the stable and down through the brush toward the river. Sheriff Minto immediately gave chase, while Deputy Esch, who was still in the buggy, went down the road a short distance where he met Sheriff Minto coming out of the thicket, and the sheriff instructed his deputy to drive down the road as fast as possible and head Arstell off if possible.

Esch lost no time in carrying out the plan and sent his team running full tilt down the road, and when about 300 yards ahead of Arstell, he being in sight a few times, the officer jumped out of the rig and joined in the chase, and after performing some good high jumps over three barbed wire fences and running through briars and thistles for some time, Esch came up behind a large patch of thistles and looking over saw Arstell coming his way through a wheat field. Arstell started around the patch toward the deputy, but evidently changed his mind, and when he turned around to go the other way, he caught sight of the officer, who had his big, ugly-looking Colts revolver in plain sight. Arstell then broke and ran toward the fence which he had just crawled through and Deputy Esch told him to come back or be made a present of some hot lead, and the fugitive stopped and threw up his hands at the officer's order. He was then ordered to climb back through the fence and come to where Esch stood, which he did but not with much relish, and from his actions the plucky deputy thought a fight was about to be started, but the fellow crawled through the fence and after he had come close the officer held the gun on him and made a quick search of Arstell's person with the expectation of finding a revolver, but the prisoner had thrown it away in the brush as was found afterwards.

While going through his clothing the deputy held the gun rather close and Arstell's hand was seen to lower toward it by Esch, who put a stop to that trick by jamming the revolver into the man's stomach with such force as to make him think he was going to be shot on the spot, and the lowered hand flew skyward with surprising quickness and the officer completed the search.

In the meantime, Sheriff Minto, accompanied by a hundred citizens of Independence, arrived on the scene after running a long distance through thick brush and wheat four feet high, and Arstell was taken to town. Arstell could not stand the sight of the sheriff and the throng following him when he turned to run from Deputy Esch, as they were in plain sight across the field, and Sheriff Minto also held a big black gun ready for action should the prisoner con-

clude to make further attempt to escape.

The streets were congested with people when the prisoner was brought back. The officers bundled their man into the buggy and brought him to Salem last evening and lodged him in the county jail. When he was searched thoroughly the sheriff discovered that he had shells of a 32-calibre and several notes written in a book, among which was the name of Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, of Eugene, and written below the names was the words "a live one."

Arstell told Sheriff Minto that he could not live like ordinary people, that he would not work and that he did not intend to. He is a comparatively young man but his face shows signs of much worry, his features are hard and he is, altogether, a bad looking character.

The prisoner was taken before Justice Webster this morning, but he stated that he wished to consult an attorney before pleading and was given until tomorrow to do so.

KERN SAYS
"FRIENDS"
THREW HIM

[United Press Leased Wire.] Indianapolis, Ind., July 28.—That he lost the nomination to the United States senate through bribery occurring in a caucus, is the claim of John W. Kern, former Democratic candidate for the vice-presidency that has created unusual interest and discussion here today.

Kern attributed his defeat to the fact that the nomination was made by secret ballot, instead of by the public ballot demanded by his supporters. In this way, he states, several of his pledged supporters were enabled to switch their votes under cover.

When asked to make public the names of the deserters, Kern said:

"Because of the secret ballot, I cannot furnish the kind of evidence that would convict them in court, but as to the perfidy of some of them, I have sufficient evidence for my own purposes."

THREE
MILLION
GRAFT

Chicago, July 28.—Three million dollars is said to be the amount that has been paid in graft to the police by the habitues of the tenderloin districts of the city.

The investigation in the present crusade against graft, it is said, has shown that fully 500 saloons, flats, rooming houses, gambling dens at

dance halls in and near this part of the city pay for protection.

Michael (Hink Dink) Kenna and John (Bath House John) Coughlin, the two aldermen of the First ward, usually do all the heavy work in the way of rounding up the habitues of the levee districts and see to it that they all pay for tickets to attend the annual "First Ward Ball," which is a notorious affair, held in the Coliseum under police protection. The most of the receipts go to the political organizations of which Kenna and Coughlin are leaders.

The ball is held in the small hours of the morning and is a scene of the wildest revelry.
