San Francisco, July 28.—The matching of Dick Hyland and Johnny Frayne by the Mission club for its August date was a popular one on the part of the matchmaker, Hester. Johnny is one of the coolest boys in the ring, wastes none of his punches and never refuses the issue, no matter how fast the going may be. He is hardly as rugged as Hyland but is a better boxer.

Following the beautiful panning that came his way because of his sudden shift in the matter of a fight with Johnson, the boys have refused to sanction his proposed six-round go with Dr. Roller and Matchmaker Hester passed him up as one of the possible attractions for the August fiesta.

Philadelphia Jack O'Brien is scheduled to fight Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman, at Denver tomorrow night. They will travel over the six-round route. O'Brien figures on going to Los Angeles after the battle, but it is hardly likely that he will be given anything to do there. THOUSANDS
TO GREET
BLERIOT

Paris Crowds Line the Streets to Welcome the First Man to Fly Across the Channel.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Paris, July 28.—Flushed with the triumph of being the first man in history to fly across the English channel, Louis Bleriot, the aviator, returned to Paris this morning.

When he left the train he was greeted by thousands of people, who congregated at the station to meet him. Cheering madly and in other ways manifesting their delight over the success of their fellow countryman, the Parisians crowded close about him, and for awhile it appeared as though there would be a repetition of the London scenes, when the police were compelled to interfere to keep the excited crowds from crushing Bleriot in their efforts to grasp his hand.

Finally Bleriot, accompanied by friends and a number of important personages, succeeded in reaching a stand hastily erected for the speakers that welcomed him home. There he was accorded honors, and one of the speakers said:

"Bleriot is the most talked of man of Europe, and one whose name is destined to go down in history as one of the famous men of the age."

Other glowing tributes were paid to the aviator, and at every congratulatory phrase the crowd cheered wildly.

Such scenes have rarely been witnessed in Paris.

LAGANUR BREAKS
PITCHERS' RECORD

McPherson, Kan., July 28.—Pitcher Laganur of the McPherson club today holds a national record, according to the belief of local fans.

At yesterday's game between McPherson and Lyons clubs Laganur twirled 17 innings without allowing the semblance of a hit, or giving a batter his base on called balls. At the end of the seventeenth inning he tired, and asked to be relieved.
