## THINKS SON WAS KILLED IN A DUEL

Card Found in Sutton's Pocket Indicates a Challenge Had Been Sent to Lieutenant.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, July 29.—"Sutton, consider all gun play off. I was in the wrong." This is the inscription on a card found in the pocket of Lieutenant James N. Sutton's uniform after his death, according to a statement made today by his sister, Miss Daisy Sutton, who came here from Los Angeles recently.

"My mother has just advised me of the finding of the card," said Miss Sutton, "although it has been in her possession for some time; ever since Jimmy's clothes were sent to her while she was at Portland. She believes that it is an indication that my mother may have been killed in a duel and will introduce it as evidence when the inquiry into Jimmy's death is reopened at Annapolis.

"It is evident from the card that my brother had trouble with one of the officers and that the duel was to be fought. I do not know the identity of the writer of the card but I believe my mother strongly suspects that she does."

Miss Sutton has not heard from her mother since the decision of the judge advocate placing Mrs. Sutton in the position of a complainant and making the officers who were present at the time of the Sutton death defendants. She is inclined to be indignant over the action, however, but is confident that her mother will not abandon her efforts to prove Sutton not a suicide, despite the handicap imposed by the inquiry.

Lieutenant Utley's arrival early next week is anxiously awaited by the Sutton family.

"I am not at liberty to talk much on the subject," said Miss Sutton, "but it is safe to say there will be some very sensational features brought out in the next inquiry."

### CAPTAIN BARTLETT DOES FINE SHOOTING

Captain Bartlett held the interest of his crowd of possibly 50 men yesterday afternoon on the old north mill property by sending lead pellets just about where he wished and shattering anything from a steel plate to a potato or marble.

Captain Bartlett first gave an interesting and valuable talk on the different shooting materials and then began the fancy shooting assisted by Mr. Reid of Portland, who "threw the targets into the bullets as they came out of the gun." First Captain Bartlett reduced a good Salem brick into fine dust with a 30-30 rifle and then proceeded to shatter the tramp's friend—the tomato can—with both rifle and shotgun. A can filled with water was thrown in the air by Mr. Reid and the shooting expert scattered the tin all over the lot with one shot from the 30-30 rifle. A potato wrapped in red, white and blue tissue paper was also thrown in the air and when the 30-30 projectile struck it, natural and fine cut confetti flew over the crowd mixed with mashed potato and finely cut string. This feat was performed to show the extreme power of the ammunition and the demonstration proved successful to the fullest extent. An interesting sample of the Peters cartridge's "stiffin" was also given. The demonstrator cut an oblong hole in the cartridge, peeling the paper back so that the powder, shot and wadding could be seen and holding the piece cut in place, he put it in the gun and tore a hole in a tin can the same as though the shell had not been touched. Pieces of metal no larger than a half dollar, tiny china marbles and bits of bark were all hit square center by the captain and he surprised the crowd by throwing a tin can in the air and keeping it up until five shots had been discharged with a pump gun. Looking-glass work was also given by the shooter, and Captain Bartlett certainly proved himself to be a gun man.

### STEAMSHIP BRINGING THREE TONS OF GOLD

## THE JAPS WANTED HAWAII

Jap Newspaper Editorials Show the Strike on Islands Was Only Step to Seize Them.

Honolulu, July 29.—Editorials translated from Japanese newspapers are the feature of the trial today of M. Makino and other leaders of the strike of the Japanese plantation workers, who are on trial charged with conspiracy. The editorials are striking in character.

One editorial from the Nippon Jiji, organ of the Japanese Higher Wage Association, was translated by Prof. Walter Deening, of the educational department of the Japanese government. The professor testified that it contained statements that those who were opposing the strike were "traitors to their country and are destroying the colonial foundation of the Japanese nation in Hawaii."

Other editorials, as translated by the witness, urged the death of the Japanese who were opposing the strike.

Prof. Deening was brought here specially for the purpose of acting as interpreter at the trial.

## HARRY PULLIAM SUICIDES

New York, July 29.—Harry C. Pulliam, president of the National baseball league, died at 7:30 o'clock this morning from a self-inflicted pistol wound. He died in his room at the New York Athletic Club, where last night he shot himself through the right temple, the bullet coming out on the left side of his head.

Pulliam's act in taking his own life is believed to have been the result of a nervous breakdown caused by illness and the worry incident to his duties as head of the National league. For several months he had been on a vacation, touring the west and attempting to regain his health. When he returned to New York recently and resumed his work it was plain that he was suffering severely. He was morose and nervous.

The baseball magnate was standing in the middle of his room when he fired the shot which ended his life. As he fell, mortally wounded, he knocked over a desk telephone standing on a table near by. The receiver fell off of its hook and flashed a light on the switchboard of the club. No one heard the shot but the constant burning of the switchboard light led to an investigation. A bellboy rushed to Pulliam's room and found him lying on the floor in a pool of his own blood. A smoking revolver lay near by.

The shot rendered the baseball magnate totally blind and although he was semi-conscious when found he was unable to explain his act when his distracted friends implored him to tell them why he had shot himself. Pulliam replied:

"Why, who's shot?"

Physicians were summoned and made a desperate effort to save Pulliam's life. The wound proved fatal and within a short time the baseball magnate lapsed into unconsciousness which ended in death.

### THE IMPROVEMENT OF SOUTH WINTER STREET

The improvement of South Winter street is being pushed along by the contractors, Pugh & Herren, but they are meeting with many obstacles. There is no pile driver to be had to put down the pile bridge across Mill creek that has been ordered, and Street Commissioner Pooler and Chairman Stolz of the Street Committee think it may be necessary to put in a bent bridge. The bridge committee is inclined to put in a reinforced concrete culvert at the next waterway that is crossed, as it is very doubtful if a more concrete arch will stand the pounding of the rapid street car traffic. The improvement of South Winter street will make about eight blocks of very choice residence property.

## GRAND JURY FINDS NINETEEN INDICTMENTS

Chicago, July 29.—Nineteen new indictments were returned against resort keepers in the levee district of South Chicago today by the grand jury no wrobing the allegations that corruption has been existent there for years. With the announcement of the names of those indicted it has become known that the jury is looking into the disappearance of over 30 witnesses wanted by the state in connection with the West Side levee cases. It is expected that additional in-

dictments will be returned against Inspector Edward McCann and Detective Jeremiah Griffin later today. Just where the new bombshell will strike is not known. States Attorney John E. Wayman is very reticent and refuses to talk about the investigations other than remarking on the indictments already made public.

### Let the Democrats Look In.

Washington, July 29.—The democratic conferees were present at the meeting of the conference committee today. This is taken as an indication that the work on the tariff bill is about completed.
