Must Support Parents—

For the first time in the history of Marion county an order has been issued by the county court compelling a son to support his parents. H. S. Broughton and Anna Broughton being the parents who filed a petition in the county court through Attorneys McNary and Winslow alleging non-support and H. P. Broughton being the son. It was stated in the petition that the petitioners were of extreme advanced age, the father being 81 years old and a Civil war veteran and the mother of the age of 71, both being too old to provide any means of self support, and after giving all their belongings to their son, H. P. Broughton, they are unable to support themselves unaided. It also stated in the petition that the son was believed to have a business in Silverton valued between \$3000 and \$4000 and that he was believed to be a man of means and fully capable of supporting his aged parents. The county judge made an order this morning compelling the son to appear in court within 10 days and show cause why he should not support his parents. Upon the affidavit of Attorney Winslow the regular filing fee was not charged owing to the poverty of the petitioners.

I HAVE NOT SQUEEZED ANYBODY

Great Wheat Plunger Defends His Famous Wheat Corner as Legitimate Business.

"I have no corner in wheat, and never had any. I have merely put through a business deal based on the laws of demand and supply. . . . I have not squeezed anybody, save perhaps a few rich speculators."—James A. Patten.

This is how James A. Patten, the Chicago wheat speculator, describes in the August Unwey the coup by which, last May, he dictated the price of wheat throughout the world.

"Last fall," he continues, "I had information which made me believe that there would be a shortage in wheat."

"Our wheat acreage is diminishing; our population is growing; people must have bread. To diagnose a crop condition successfully and then buy on the strength of it is not running a corner."

"No one has failed. My business is to buy and sell grain at a profit. This is all that I have done. There has been no extortion."

This explanation on the part of Mr. Patten is contained in a remarkable article on "The Perilous Game of Cornering a Crop," by Isaac F. Marcossan.

In it are described the famous "corners" that have made history in the Chicago wheat pit. Mr. Marcossan writes with a deep knowledge of the game, and tells of the millions that have been swept away, the failures, the poverty, the suicides, the jail terms that have followed in the wake of these corners.

The article in August is the first in a series of attempts made to control the supply of staple American commodities.

WAS SILENT 12 YEARS. NOW WANTS DIVORCE

San Francisco, July 29.—Silence—a wooded sephnix-like eternal silence—has existed for ten years between James Wyrell, a Los Angeles real estate dealer, and his wife, according to the testimony of Mrs. Wyrell, in her suit for divorce before Judge Van Nostran today.

During this entire period they have lived in the same house and have not spoken. When one wished to convey a word to the other, the 12-year-old daughter was made the medium of communication.

The silence, however, was broken a year ago when she alleges Wyrell ordered her to leave the house. The couple have been married for fifteen years. She gave no reason why conversation was not carried on between them.

LANGUAGE TOO RICH FOR POLICE JUDGE

San Francisco, July 29.—Robert Zeise, a bellboy for the Bohemian club, who was charged with disturbing the peace, escaped only because the police judge could not comprehend the slang phrases of Special Policeman Fairweather today.

When ordered to state his case against the prisoner, Fairweather successfully explained that young Zeise had been "ragging it; toughing it; creaking it; doing the crawl."

Judge Shortall's brow furrowed deeply. He wanted to know where the prisoner was arrested.

"At the Nickel Dance," replied Fairweather. "I caught him doing the turkey trot."

"Well, I don't know what the 'turkey trot' is, but nevertheless, don't let me hear of you doing it again," said the judge sternly. The case was dismissed.

SOUTHERN OREGON PROTESTS

Is Tired of Taxation Without Representation—Wants Another New State Created.

(Medford Tribune.)

Eastern Oregon newspapers are advocating secession from Oregon creation of a new state by cutting Oregon in two, with the Cascades as a division line.

Southern Oregon would like to secede also. Like Eastern Oregon, it is sick of the short-sighted rule and blight of the Willamette valley moss-back and the Salem hog.

Southern Oregon is sick of being hampered in its efforts towards progress and development, of the dictation of those whose caliber is shown by opposition to higher education and slaughtering of normals.

Southern Oregon is wearied of the restrictions of an obsolete constitution that render good roads an impossibility and prohibits state-built highways, and of the opposition that defeats every bit of development legislation. If the Willamette valley wants to stagnate, let it stagnate by itself.

Southern Oregon is the richest in natural resources of any section of the state, yet receives no aid from the state in its development. It has rich mines, immense timber belts, fine harbors, yet cannot realize upon its assets. Oregon money is sent East for investment, instead of being used to open up the state. Although this entire region pays commercial tribute to Portland, vast areas, like Curry county, are left a virgin wilderness. Never a cent from the capitalists of Portland and Salem and other Willamette valley towns for this section's development.

Southern Oregon is tired of taxation without representation. It has no representation at the national capital, and no state institutions, and when an appropriation is secured to make accessible its great natural wonders, like Crater Lake, and to secure the expenditure of millions by the federal government in a national park, the aid of the courts is invoked to block it.

Southern Oregon has little in common with the rest of the state. It has much in common with Northern California, which is also neglected, and the two regions, similar in resources, climate and geography, combined would make one of the greatest states in the Union.

The commercial interests of Oregon are centered too far north, the commercial interests of California too far south to permit the vast territory between being giving the attention it deserves. Oregon is too unprogressive, California too large, so that neglect is the portion of the richest regions of both states.

Combination of both sections and the creation of a new state, named from some common geographic feature, like "Siskiyou," is the correct solution of the problem. As long as we must work out our own history, we should have the advantage and opportunity that statehood confers.
