HE FACES SEVERAL CHARGES

Arstell Struggles in the Net, But the Evidence Is Such There Is No Chance of Escape.

Louis Arstell, the man who is now locked up in the county jail charged with holding up J. J. McDonald a few miles south of this city and shooting at him twice, has changed his tactics regarding his present predicament and now denies that he was a party to the hold-up and that he was not seen by William Squires on the Hall's Ferry road as stated by the informer to the sheriff, and which practically resulted in Arstell's capture in Independence.

Sheriff Minto has not been hatching however, since Arstell's escape, and there will be testimony forthcoming from different parties who will explain Arstell's whereabouts shortly after he held up McDonald. It is evident that Arstell, after taking to the brush on the Liberty road, directed his course northwest and followed through the timber until he came to a point near the Patterson fruit farm, from where he passed down through the John farm and onto the county road at a point near the head of the slough just south of here. When he reached the road he crossed over and deliberately took a drink in front of a cabin in which a lady and man were living and returned to the road, where he hailed a man driving a team and went south riding with him. After reaching the school house about four and a half miles from Salem the teamster left the county road but Arstell got out of the wagon and from this point footed it into Independence, where the officers found him.

It is apparent that the captured hold-up is trying to lead the officers to believe that Squires has made a mistake in identification and that some other man has been taken for himself, but the route he traveled, and there are witnesses to prove it, signifies that Squires was not far from guessing the correct person when he saw a man answering to the description of Arstell.

Another charge, and more serious, has now sprung up to face Arstell, although there has been no conclusive evidence introduced by the parties making it. Arstell is said to have attempted to assault a young woman on the Chapman ranch in Polk county a few days prior to his recent crime. It is alleged that a man entered the room of a lady in the Chapman residence about midnight and grasped her while she was sleeping and held his hand over her mouth. The lady fought him away and screamed, and the men of the house took after the fellow and ran him around the place but could not capture him. Arstell had been employed on the Chapman ranch and it is thought it was he who attempted the assault and there will probably develop more evidence to that effect.

While employed on the same place it is alleged by a young man also employed there that Arstell attempted to entice him to leave with Arstell and that he (Arstell) knew where they could get \$1000 by "sticking a man up." This will also be looked into by the authorities.

THE CASES WERE ALL DISMISSED

After repeated arrests made on the charges of conducting bawdy houses, selling liquor without a license and vagrancy, in which the women conducting the houses of prostitution were the principals, and prominent figures in religious circles in this city were the complainants, the city attorney, Walter Keyes, made an oral motion in the city recorder's court, ex-Officio justice of the peace, dismissing the charges recently brought against the women for conducting houses where malt liquors were sold.

City Attorney Keyes, who has been prosecuting the women on the various occasions, gave his reasons for dismissing the suits this morning. In the absence of additional testimony, which would be necessary to prosecute the cases against the women for the last charge placed against them, a dismissal was in order, and the absence of further and more convincing testimony is evident owing to the fact the case of Rose Leland, in which she was arrested for selling liquor without a license, was identical the same as the present case against Emma Thomas, Hattie McGinnis and Julia Downie, and that, so far as testimony was concerned, witnesses for the city could not introduce testimony exceeding in further information regarding actual performances of the women charged with the alleged crime than in the case of Rose Leland, who was discharged by a jury on a charge containing the same conditional wording, and, therefore, in order to save expense to the city, the city attorney deemed it advisable for the move for a dismissal, which was granted by Judge Moores.

Unless there can be more substantial evidence found, these women will not be in danger of conviction of selling liquor without a license, vagrancy or of conducting a bawdy house. Attorney Keyes, in the performance of duty, was practically compelled to dismiss the case, as a further pressing of the suits would incur considerable expense on the city, with no chance of conviction.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, Liberty street, in said city,

from the south line of State street to the south curb line of Ferry street, by establishing curb lines and widening the sidewalks so the roadway of said Liberty street will be 59 feet in width from curb to curb, and by paving the road way of said portion of said Liberty street, including its intersection with Ferry street, in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the common council on the 26th day of July, 1909, and now on file in the office
