SPANIARDS BURYING THEIR DEAD

And Moors Cremate 4000 Bodies, the Price of Their Bloody Victory of Yesterday.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Melilla, July 30.—Virtually declaring a truce, the Spaniards and Moors are engaged today in disposing of the bodies of the soldiers killed in Tuesday's bloody engagement. Pestilence is feared, and but little attention is being paid to fighting.

The Spaniards are burying their dead outside the walls of the city, bodies being dumped indiscriminately into trenches.

The Moors have retired to the rear of Mount Gurgur, where they have cremated 4000 bodies, the cost of their victory Tuesday.

There is some desultory fighting going on, but no general engagement is expected before the arrival of the troops which are on their way to reinforce the Spaniards in the garrison.

WHEAT CROP IS GOOD ONE

It would take a precipitation of considerable duration to have any effect upon the fall grain now, and within two weeks the noise of the thrasher will be heard in the many big wheat fields up and down the valley. Nearly all the fall wheat is in the shock and threshing would commence sooner if the sun came out warmer.

According to several statements overheard among the farmers who make their regular weekly business visits to this city, the wheat output for this year will be on a par with that of last year, and possibly a larger yield will be realized. The weather during the growing life of the wheat has been ideal, the heads have filled out splendidly and very few crops are being visited with any kind of pest. Wheat in filling out must have moderately cool weather, as a sudden change from cool weather to extreme warm closes up the heads before the grain has time in which to fully gain its natural plumpness.

It was thought for a time that the wheat acreage would be very small in this county this year but reports have come in that an extra large acreage has been devoted to it. The implement dealers are also figuring on a busy season this year and the local machine shops are kept busy fitting up the old harvester for its annual summer work.

MAY HAVE CAUGHT SEATTLE MURDERER

Seattle, July 30.—Peter Miller and Roy Williams are under arrest in Seattle today, charged with dozens of burglaries, and the police are said to be in possession of damaging evidence against Miller connecting him with the murder of Hugh McMoran, who was shot down in front of his home in this city on November 26, 1908. A big diamond ring, stripped from the murdered man's finger and a watch, left with McMahon for safe keeping were pawned in Spokane February 19, 1909, and recovered by the police soon afterwards. Miller admits, according to the police, that he pawned the jewelry, but denies that he committed the murder. Chas. Smith and Geo. Rose, he says, handed him the loot. The pair was arrested here last February as highwaymen, but were released and ordered to leave town, as no evidence could be secured against them.
