**Holdup Man Arrested in Tacoma.**  
Tacoma, July 30.—Andrew Morek and Harry Mitchell were taken to Portland this afternoon by Detectives Day and Snow of that city and will be arraigned on a charge of having held up and robbed four men. The men were arrested in Tacoma last Wednesday evening by Detectives Milone and Miller. Milone recognized Morek as a man who had served three terms in the penitentiary, and when he reported the matter to Captain Fitzgerald he was instructed to bring him to the station. When examined by Fitzgerald, Mitchell weakened. He admitted that he had been implicated in several hold-ups in Portland with Morek as a companion, and this confession was repeated to the Portland officers when they arrived last evening, in the presence of Chief Duley, Captain Fitzgerald and Fackler. In the four hold-ups he said that \$52.85 had been secured.
