MAKES**A FINE
FLIGHT**

Berlin, July 31.—Count Zeppelin, accompanied by seven guests, in the airship Zeppelin II, left Friedrichshafen at 4:40 this morning for Frankfurt, on a trial exhibition.

Sailing high he passed over Gellingen shortly after 7 o'clock, then being about 24 miles from his destination. A threatening storm broke at this point in his journey, and Zeppelin directing his dirigible downward was delayed 25 minutes, but at 10:45 passed over Heilbronn.

When flying over Ulm the count dropped a message directed to his wife. In the communication he stated that the wind was strong, but she had no cause for fear.

Near Schwabmünchen the vessel was compelled to descend near earth because two strong counter air currents were encountered.

As the huge cylinder sailed over Cannstatt Captain George dropped note describing the flight.

He Flew Twelve Hours.

Frankfurt, Germany, July 31.—Count Zeppelin landed here at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, having completed his trip in his airship from Friedrichshafen in 12 hours.

The count and the seven guests who accompanied him on his flight were given an ovation when they landed at the aerial exhibition grounds.

Before landing Count Zeppelin maneuvered for an hour above the crowds, causing the airship to make various intricate movements.

**THE CZAR AND FAMILY
ARRIVE AT CHERBOURG**

[United Press Leased Wire.] Cherbourg, July 31.—The czar of Russia and President Fallieres, of France, exchanged visits today, following the arrival of the Russian fleet, escorting the imperial yacht Standart in the harbor.

The first function today will be dinner on board the French cruiser Verite, on which the president is making his headquarters.

The booming of guns off the coast

today announced the arrival of the Russian fleet. The czar, zarina and the imperial family's children are aboard the Standart.

The French channel fleet received the royal visitors, the Verite, with Fallieres and other high officials of the government on board, lying near the shore.

**CALLED FOR MEDICINE,
WOULD NOT TAKE IT**

[United Press Leased Wire.] Roseburg, Or., July 31.—"Help! Help! I'm sick." This strange cry aroused many residents of this city in the early hours of the morning, and as a result a young man giving his name as Otto S. Bourne, is in the county jail awaiting an inquest as to his sanity.

Bourne went to one house, and, after gaining admission, telephoned for a physician. When the doctor arrived, he refused to take the medicine that was offered. When ordered to leave the house, he continued through the residence section, waking up people, and crying for help.

When it was found that he refused aid when offered, he was arrested. He said his home was in St. Paul, Minn., and that he had a brother in Buell, Idaho.

**BREAKS MARRIAGE
RECORD OF OREGON**

An unusual matrimonial difficulty occurred in South Salem last Thursday night when the wife of S. S. Maran, whom he had married but a few hours previous, left him and returned to her home in Yew Park and yesterday called at the office of a lawyer seeking a separation from her husband.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin were married at noon on Thursday and before 12 o'clock that night Mrs. Martin informed her new husband that the noise and confusion caused by the crowd that "shivered" them affected her mind, and that she was going to return to her home and commit suicide.

In speaking to a representative of The Journal this morning regarding the affair, Mr. Martin said that he knew of no reason why his wife should act in such a manner, as he treated her with the utmost respect and kindness during the whole of their married life. He stated that there had not been an unharmonious word spoken between them at any time and he was not aware if there was any ill feeling between them.

Mr. Martin said that he was greatly worried over the case and that he can form no conceivable reason why Mrs. Martin should conduct herself in such a manner. He is inclined to believe, however, that her mind is somewhat unbalanced, but from what cause he did not state.

**ARSTELL'S
STORY IS
TO THIN**

"I don't know McDonald, nor have I ever seen him before in my life," was part of the statement made by Louis Arstell during his examination before Justice of the Peace Webster yesterday afternoon.

After there had been some convincing testimony given by witnesses for the state, including Sheriff Minto, Deputy Esch, J. J. McDonald and others, Arstell made known to the court that he wished to make a statement in his own behalf. He said there was considerable prejudice against him on account of the pardon he was granted by Governor Benson; that he understood there was a serious charge placed against him, and one that he had never before been mixed up in. That last Monday he came over to Salem from the Chapman ranch, where he had been working, and after looking about town during the day he lit for Independence, where he thought work might be procured on some of the ranches. He told of how he stopped at the tent at the head of the slough to get a drink; getting in a wagon and riding as far as the school house on the Hall's Ferry road, where he stayed all night at a farm house and then resumed his trip to Independence on foot, crossing Hall's Ferry about 12 o'clock that day. After arriving at Independence he says he was told of several places where a man was needed to work and stayed about the livery barns of Independence waiting for some of the hopmen, who he was informed, wanted a man. While sitting in front of a livery barn in the south end of the city he saw Sheriff Minto approaching and asked who he was, and upon being informed, he started to run.

Arstell's excuse for running was that owing to his being pardoned upon conditions, he thought maybe he had violated some of the conditions and as the two years he had already spent in the penitentiary were not forgotten he made the attempt to get away.

The gun on his person being termed "a concealed weapon" was enough for him to doubt his exact following of the pardon rules, he says and he just up and ran away, throwing the gun as he went.

It occurred, however, during the examination of witnesses, that Arstell had been seen on the Liberty road about 50 yards beyond where the holdup took place, sitting along side the trail. A young man by the name of Huffman testified that while he was coming to Salem he saw Arstell coming towards him on the trail and when Arstell saw him he (Arstell) went off to the side of the trail and sat down, but spoke to Huffman as he passed by. Huffman gave an accurate description of Arstell on the stand.

The balance of the testimony ran about the same, and Justice Webster bound Arstell over to the grand jury under \$1,000 bonds.

Wright Made Good Flight.

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, July 31.—Official report of the signal corps officers today shows that Orville Wright, in his aeroplane speed test flight at Fort Myer last evening flew at times at a rate of nearly 47½ miles an hour and that his average speed over the whole ten-mile course was at the rate of 42.431 miles an hour.

The flight was made against the wind.

**TO SHOOT AIRSHIPS
WITH ELECTRICITY**

[United Press Leased Wire.] London, July 31.—Official circles are excited today over a statement made on high authority that an army officer at Fort Omaha, Neb., has invented an electric apparatus designed to destroy aerial war craft.

According to the statement today the machine will propel through the air a column of electricity of almost any desired force, and direct it at any desired object within a radius of several hundred yards.

Explosion Wrecks Buildings.

St. Paul, July 31.—Three buildings were partially wrecked, three men and two children are reported to have been killed and two persons are believed to be fatally injured today as the result of an explosion of a hydraulic pump used for experimental purposes. The Central police station was one of the buildings damaged.
