THE WOE OF AGES DUE TO WOMAN

Professor Willett Says Luxury-Loving Wives Are Same Now As in Days B. C.

Women who are extravagant in their social desires, even those he granted were "innocent and high minded," were blamed yesterday by Professor Herbert L. Willett, of the University of Chicago, for immorality, oppression of the poor, reckless speculation, loose marital relations, and religious unbelief, which he named as the most unfortunate evils of today.

Professor Willett, who delivered his criticism in the course of a lecture in Haskell hall, also pictured early Biblical times as an exact replica of the present, stating that to read the book of Amos, Hosea, or the other great prophets was like perusing a "document printed yesterday." He spoke of the "reprobation of the womanhood of Israel" by Amos as an example of the great need of social readjustment in olden times.

"The moral levels of a nation never raise higher than that nation's womanhood," said Dr. Willett. "It was so in the days of Amos, and it is true today. We read in that great prophet's work of women spending money they knew to have been obtained by bribery, for as early as then the commonest kind of evil was the accepting of bribes by public officials."

"The women encouraged their husbands to spend money, earned dishonestly, and wanted more. They say that their neighbors were better off than they, and they determined to keep pace. They drove their husbands to secure gold, it did not matter how. They urged them quietly, of course, but none the less effectively. They insisted on living in luxury. Amos denounced this pursuit of luxury, this clamor for palaces of ivory, for summer and winter houses. He called the women cows of pleasure, to crush the poor and the needy."

"Today we see the same situation. We even see innocent and high-minded women instruments in driving the poor into greater distress and the rich into greater recklessness. They spend all the money they can get, though it be obtained out of inquiry."

"No woman will admit that she is the one referred to. No woman would in the Old Testament days. But female extravagance and social desires have driven men to all they may be accused of. It has been to satisfy their wives' desires that husbands do that for which we condemn the social system."

"Every evil of today has a parallel in the time of Amos. We see complaints being made against every form of iniquity. There were adulterations of food, cheating in weights and measures, unfair business combinations of all kinds."

Professor Willett called Amos a prophet against injustice, and turning to the prophet Hosea, extolled him as an enemy of domestic and religious infidelity.

"Hosea made protest against what is still a live subject," declared Professor Willett. "His greatest contribution was his terrible diatribe against immorality, and the particular type mentioned was domestic infidelity, which was common. He was a victim of this himself, and naturally was deeply impressed with the necessity of sacred marital relations. 'The idea of infidelity was carried into religion. The priests were highway robbers, the temples were the shrines of idols, which the people, thinking of God, sought out.'"

"Wives, living of their husbands, went after other men, just as they do today. There was a general decline of morals. Drunkenness was everywhere prevalent, until the corrupt rulers loved unfairness."

"Hosea was the polemic against the divorce evil, loose living and marriage gambling. He was the prophet of domestic purity and national righteousness to whom we should listen today. How he would have voiced social ideals if he had lived in our time.—Chicago Tribune.

PORTLAND PEOPLE WANT MORE PARKS

There is much resentment in various sections of the east side at the position the mayor has taken on the park question. Several push clubs on this side of the river are taking up the question, and it is probable that the new executive will recede somewhat from his so-called economy policy.

Many east siders from districts that have been agitating the question of more public breathing places are not slow in saying that the mayor has no authority to set aside the money voted for this purpose. They argue that the matter has been decided by the people who voted the appropriation and it is the duty of administration to go ahead and make the best bargains it can for the people in securing park lands before the prices become prohibitive.

A committee from the Seventh Ward Improvement club, headed by L. E. Rice, called on his honor at the city hall Monday and asked that an additional park be secured to that part of the city. The mayor promised to investigate the situation before taking any action. Other committees from suburban improvement organizations will visit the city hall during the next few days and try to prevail upon the mayor to recede from the attitude he has assumed on the public park question.—Peoples' Press.

A Tip From Scio.

A number of newspapers throughout the state seem to take particular delight in giving the direct primary, the initiative and referendum and statement No. 1 laws good hard kicks. Well, the people made these laws and a vast majority of the people like them, these kicking newspapers to the contrary notwithstanding, and they will be slow to repeal them. The primary and initiative laws may need fixing in some particulars and which will be done some day, but the laws will never be repealed. While it is true that under the provisions of the primary, men are sometimes elected who are not the real choice of the people, many of us can remember, too, that men were often elected to office under the old convention system who are not the real choice of the people. Reforms rarely go backward, and it will be a very cold day when the people return to the old political boss system.—Santiam News

MYSTERY OF THE PACIFIC OCEAN

Captain Payne, master of the British ship Marion Ingles, in a letter from Chimbote, Peru, tells of a Pacific ocean mystery which suggests the much-talked-of affair of the Marie Celeste. Captain Payne says: "Off the Peruvian coast we passed a boat with one mast standing. The wind was very light. We backed our after yards and put the port boat over. The second mate and five A. B.'s went and picked her up. Finding no aboard we brought her to the ship and towed her astern all night. At daylight I went aboard the boat which we picked up the night before and found her to be the Iturbide, and the number 223 upon her stern, painted white, copper bottom (sheathed) and apparently about 12 to 15 tons burden. Papers found aboard her were all written in Spanish, and it appears from these that she belonged to a fleet of small vessels trading in the vicinity of La Paz, in the Gulf of California. She was loaded with empty casks. She appeared to have been left in a great hurry, as there was both food and water aboard of her, also clothes, and the anchor was still there, so that it would not appear that she had broken away from her moorings. The articles of agreement with the crew of four men showed her to have left La Paz shortly after Christmas day, 1908, and as far as we could make out for a port of the name of Arizona. As she was too heavy for us to take aboard, we threw all the casks out of her and then scuttled her and let her go again."

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of State Street.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, State street, in said city, from the east line of Twelfth street to the west line of North Mill creek by moving out and establishing the curb lines so the roadway of said portion of State street will be 40 feet in width from curb to curb and by paving the roadway of said portion of said State street full width from curb to curb; provided, however, that those portions of said State street which are intersected by other streets shall be paved for a width of 50 feet along the center of said portions of said State street.
