DISGUSTED WITH ITS TREATMENT BY BALANCE OF STATE SOUTHERN OREGON WANTS TO CREATE THE STATE OF SISKIYOU FROM SOUTHERN OREGON AND NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

(Portland Telegram.)

Disgusted with being handicapped, held back and harrassed by Willamette valley people in general and Salem citizens in particular, secession from Oregon and the creation of a new state is being advocated in Southern Oregon. Declaring that the Southern part of Oregon is being neglected, and that the northern part of California is similarly treated, the suggestion is made that Southern Oregon and Northern California pool their interests and carve out a state of their own, and the name offered is the state of Siskiyou.

Agitation for the secession has already made its appearance in print in the territory affected, and the campaign will continue unless the people of Southern Oregon are convinced that their interests can be better subserved by clinging to Oregon rather than in establishing a new commonwealth. The idea of a new state is meeting with favor in the extreme

southern part of the Beaver state, and the people across the line in Northern California are even now discussing the prospect.

Two Sore Spots.

Two events of recent occurrence have precipitated the demand for a new state. The first comes with the slaughter of the normal schools by the legislature. The second sore spot was when a lawyer of Salem blocked the appropriation of \$100,000 for the Crater Lake road.

While Eastern Oregon suffered the loss of a normal school as well as Ashland, Eastern Oregon was well taken care of by the legislature in other respects, so that Eastern Oregon does not feel the sting so severely. Eastern Oregon was given a branch asylum and a scalp bounty law, each valuable to the residents of that section, and there was also an appropriation for the portage road at The Dalles, for State Senator N. J. Sinnot obtained \$75,000 for this pur-

pose. In Southern Oregon, however, nothing but bruises were received.

It is from Salem politicians, however that Southern Oregon has been dealt the blows which have aroused the desire to be divorced from the Willamette valley. State Senator Smith of Marion county a Salem politician, took the lead in wiping out the normal schools when he proposed abolishing the four Oregon was main taining and establish one at Portland. Senator Jay Bowerman was in the forefront of battle against the normals, Bowerman hailing from Eastern Oregon, but Bowerman was given liberal encouragement by Smith, of Marion. Southern Oregon senators, led by L. L. Mult, did their best to protect the normal at Ashland, but without avail, and the fate of the normals was keenly felt in the south.

Balm of Gilead.

As a sort of salve to the Southern Oregon delegation, the appropriation for the Crater Lake road was passed. This appropriation was given after large crowds of boosters from Medford, Ashland and other points assembled at the state house and lobbied day and night for the \$100,000. Two counties interested offered to each appropriate \$50,000, and E. H. Harriman promised \$50,000 and additional sums. The federal government intimated that \$250,000 and more would be appropriated. All that the state requested was a contingent appropriation, and this was eventually promised.

Before he state money was available, a Salem lawyer, at his own initiative, decided to put a spoke in the wheel of Southern Oregon, and brought suit in the name of a Polk county taxpayer. The lawyer attacked the constitutionality of the bill, making the appropriation, and received a decision from Judge Galoway. An appeal is now pending in the supreme court, but the activity of the Salemite was the last straw for the Southern Oregon citizens.

Sick of Being Knocked.

"Southern Oregon is tired of being hampered in its efforts toward progress and development, of the dictation of those whose caliber is shown by the opposition to higher education and slaughtering of normals," say the disaffected southerners, who want to secede. "It is sick of the short-sighted rule and blight of the Willamette valley mossback and the Salem hog. Southern Oregon is wearied of the restrictions of an obsolete constitution that renders good roads an impossibility, and prohibits state-built highways, and of opposition that defeats every bit of development legislation. If the Willamette valley wants to stagnate, let it stagnate alone."

In such manner do they advocate divorce down Medford way, where large crops of first-class fruit have made the citizenry prosperous and anxious to be up to date. They complain of taxation without representation, and say that Southern Oregon has no representation at the national capital, and has no state institutions, and that when an appropriation is secured to make accessible its great natural wonders, like Crater Lake, and to secure the expenditure of millions of dollars by the federal government, the aid of the courts of the Willamette valley is secured to defeat the plan.

Hit at Portland.

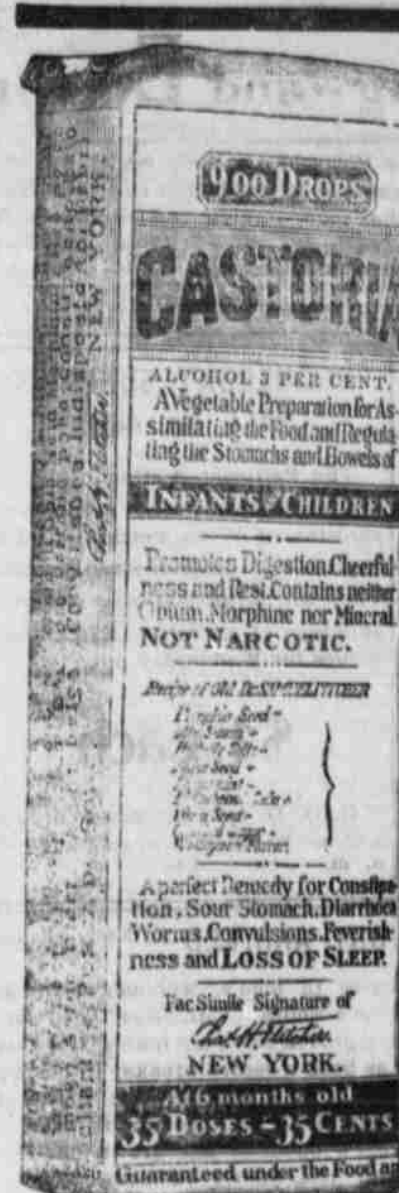
Not alone Salem, but Portland, too, is included in the kick. The capitalists of Portland are charged with neglecting Southern Oregon, although that section pays commercial tribute to the Rose City, and that the Portlanders seeking investment ignore Southern Oregon for the East. In short, Southern Oregon says it can not realize on its assets, while claiming to be the richest in natural resources of any section of the state. In addition, the statement is made that the commercial interests are centered too far north to be of benefit to Southern Oregon.

With this condition of affairs prevailing in Oregon, and a like situation prevalent in Northern California, the cry has gone forth to carve out a new state, to be composed of the southern section of Oregon and the northern part of California.

And the Salem politicians are charged with the chief responsibility for the desire for the new commonwealth.

SENSIBLE PIECE OF TAXATION

would bring millions into the treasury. He believes also that it would add materially to the average length of human life in this country. His scheme is to levy a tax of \$2 and 25 per cent ad valorem on every revolver, dirk, stiletto, Bowie knife or pair of metal knuckles manufactured in or imported into this country. He proposes that there be a tax of one-tenth to one-fifth of a cent on cartridges, according to size. All of which is covered by a bill introduced by Sisson and now pending in Congress.

"I estimate," he says, "that the tax on weapons would produce about \$1,500,000 and on cartridges \$500,000 a year."

"There is no use for a pistol or stiletto but to kill. Those who use them cause the government much expense, and there is no reason why they should not contribute to the treasury. Tobacco, whiskey and cards are subject to taxation, and it would be well enough to add an assessment on the owners of deadly weapons. It would be better to tax pistols and not pious, cartridges and not corn planters."

Notice of Intention to Improve Liberty Street.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of State Street.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve and proposes to improve at the expense of abutting and adjacent property, State street, in said city, from the east line of Twelfth street to the west line of North Mill creek by moving out and establishing the curb lines so the roadway of said portion of State street will be 40 feet in width from curb to curb and by paving the roadway of said portion of said State street full width from curb to curb; provided, however that those portions of said State street which are intersected by other streets shall be paved for a width of 50 feet along the center of said portions of said State street. There is excepted, however, from the proposed improvement a strip seven feet in width extending the full length of the proposed improvement along the center thereof which is to receive the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, and to be improved at the expense of said company.

Attention is called to the plans and specifications adopted by the common council and on file in the office of the city recorder, which shall govern as to the making of said improvement.

Remonstrances may be filed against said improvement in the manner and within the time provided in the charter of said city.
