

ADDITIONAL RED LIGHT REGULATION ORDINANCE SENT TO THE BONEYARD

Bicycle Ordinance Sent Back to the Committee—Telephone Ordinance Waits a Week—Nearly 200 Blocks of Streets Ordered Improved.

Mr. Elliott was absent on business of the mountain water committee. Thirteen aldermen and the mayor present.

Mr. Moore reported on telephone ordinance, asking more time. The indications are the ordinance will pass. It fixes residence phones at \$1.00 per month.

Mr. Moore reported that he made a minority report on ordinance by Presnell to suppress bawdy houses. Laid on table by vote of 9 to 4.

Messrs Moore and Eldridge submitted favorable report on bicycle ordinance.

Mr. Hofer moved reference to committee for purpose of further amendment, to the effect that riders dismount when passing pedestrians on narrow walks.

Mr. Moffett moved that the Salem Water company be given thirty days to vacate offices in city hall to make room for city treasurer. Lost.

Committee reported favorably for securing alley on block No. 9. Adopted.

Mr. Stockton reported from the special committee on dumping ground proposition of Capital Improvement company for two acres in Polk county for \$500.

Mr. Stols showed that the site was unsuitable for a crematory. If complained of by Polk county people. It would cost \$1,000 for a dumping platform. Lost.

Report of city recorder on balances in separate funds was read and adopted.

Application of Hamilton & Collins for restaurant license at Court-St. Grill referred to committee on license.

Report of viewers on widening Seventeenth street showed damages to property used for street to be \$520.60. Sum was assessed and awarded to respective property owners.

This report was considered a very good piece of work and the viewers were E. W. Powers, Wm. M. Smith and W. Cooley. It is stated that this street when built will be extended through to the state fair grounds by W. Breyman.

Petition for improvement of Pine street from Fremont street to Fourth street, granted and plans and specifications adopted.

Bid of C. F. Royal & Son for pile

bridge on Winter street, \$1,255, to be finished on or before October, 1909, referred to committee on bridges.

Plans and specifications for improvement of Asylum avenue, total estimate of engineer to cost \$5,820.53. Street railway track to be placed in center, 15½ feet on each side, order advertised.

Plans and specifications for reinforced concrete culvert on South Winter street, engineer's estimate, \$1,300, adopted.

John Moyer, John W. Roland and D. D. Keeler were named as viewers to open Pine street and assess damages.

Bid of Stapleton & Minton for improvement of Broadway with crushed boulders, \$6,081.69.

Bid of same parties on same work, with crushed basalt, total, \$7,625.25. Referred to mayor and street committee with power to act.

Ordinances for improvement of 172 blocks of streets were read and passed by unanimous vote.

A liquor license was granted to E. J. Daly for saloon on Commercial street.

Mr. Hofer stated that the committee had granted this license reluctantly, because this place had recently been closed for violating the city ordinances in permitting women on the premises and selling to med in a state of intoxication. The committee was assured that the place would be cleaned up and run as a respectable saloon. Mr. Stols had favored walling up the rear entrance, and the applicant, Mr. Daly, had agreed to close the rear entrance and provide sanitary urinals inside. Mr. Daly had also assured the committee that he had in mind conducting a model place, and Mr. Hofer stated that if there were any infractions of the city ordinances regulating saloons the license would be immediately revoked.

A restaurant license was ordered issued to Hamilton & Collins on State street. On motion of Mr. Hofer the license was taken from the license committee and granted.

The mayor and city engineer were requested to notify the public service corporations to comply with orders for Winter street improvement.

The council, on motion of Mr. Presnell, adjourned to next Monday night.

FAIRMOUNT PARK SITE LOST ON TECHNICALITIES

ONE POLLING PLACE WAS NOT OPEN UNTIL
NOON -- MANY VOTERS EXCLUDED
BY REGISTRATION LAW

Fairmount Park site carried by 226 to 281, but lacks 78 votes of the necessary two-thirds majority.

The vote on refunding \$65,000 bonds was 569 for and 81 against. The people have lost this first opportunity to secure the only remaining beautiful natural park site in the Capital City.

It is probably providential to have had the election go as it did, as the bond issue under such an election would be illegal and another election will have to be held to fund the city bonds that mature in about two months, when the park can be voted upon again.

The "Oregon boot" registration and election laws defeated the Fairmount Park proposition Monday, as enough voters were turned away the polls to have carried the election by the necessary two-thirds majority.

The registration law excluded hundreds of legal voters and many who had changed residence from one ward to another were shut out of voting.

In one ward it was ruled that only freeholders could vote, and in another ward the polls were not opened until noon. In other wards there were not enough blanks to swear in the unregistered voters.
