STRIKERS PARADE STREETS

Fifteen Hundred Foreigners
Terrorizing the Citizens of
Hannibal—Plant at
Mercy of Mob.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Hannibal, Mo., Aug. 3.—Fifteen
hundred foreigners are parading the
streets today, intimidating residents
of the city and assaulting employees
of the Atlas Portland Cement com-
pany, against which they are strik-
ing. There have been a number of
small riots and serious disturbances
are expected to take place before
night.

The cement company's \$4,000,000
plant is at the mercy of the mob.
Officials of the company have re-
quested the authorities to demand
the aid of state troops.

RUNAWAYS STOPPED BY RUNAWAY

C. E. Gandy Arrested for Elop-
ing With Hazel Potter, a
Fifteen-Year-Old
Girl.

C. E. Gandy, a man presumably
35 years of age, is now languishing
behind the bars in the county jail
with a serious charge brought
against him as the result of his
eloping with Hazel Potter, a 15-year-
old girl, who had been employed as a
waitress at the Cottage hotel.

The girl's mother swore to a com-
plaint yesterday afternoon, charg-
ing Gandy with the crime of taking
away her daughter without the pa-
rent's permission, and Constable Ira
Hamilton left last evening at 8
o'clock on the trail of the runaway
couple. The officer traced them
through Gervais, Woodburn and Sil-
vertown without getting in sight of
them, but while in Silvertown, Dr.
Webb, of Mt. Angel, notified the con-
stable that he had been doctoring a
young girl who had been painfully
injured in a runaway while attempt-
ing to jump from the buggy. The
constable went at once to Mt. An-
gel, where he located Gandy and
brought him back to this city.

It appears while the couple were
near Mt. Angel Gandy got out of the
buggy to remove the bridle of the
horse, which was a foolish thing to
do, in order that the animal could
drink, and the horse becoming
frightened ran away. The girl jumped
from the rig and in doing so
painfully bruised her face and body
so seriously that the doctor's care
was necessary.

The case against Gandy is a ser-
ious one, his fate depending on what
the testimony discloses.

been worked out to the satisfaction
of all concerned.

At the conclusion of Clapp's de-
nunciation of the tariff bill, Sher-
man, seeing that apparently nobody
was to speak, put the motion for
the adoption of the conference re-
port. There was a chorus of "ayes"
and a chorus of "noes." Before a
motion requesting a roll call was
made Bailey suggested that the vote
be taken at 2 o'clock Thursday after-
noon. But he significantly remarked
that he wanted it understood that
an agreement did not include any
supplementary proposition. This re-
ferred to the proposed resolution
changing the leather schedule.

Aldrich made a few remarks and
Bailey's motion was adopted unani-
mously. In the course of his re-
marks Bailey suggested that possi-
bly it might take as long a time
to pass a supplementary proposition,
meaning leather or cotton, changes
as it had taken to pass the tariff bill.
This is taken as an intimation that
the Democrats propose to use this
opportunity to compel the restoration
of cotton bagging to the free list.

McCumber of North Dakota, in an
interview, stated that he would sup-
port the bill though many of the du-
ties he did not approve of. He ex-
plained that he had just called upon
President Taft requesting the recom-
mitment of the bill, but that the
president believes it would seriously
endanger the measure to recommit it.

When informed that the senate
would vote on the tariff bill Thurs-
day, Taft said today that he would
probably go to his country home at
Beverly on Friday evening.

tions were allowed by the court but
further instructions suggested by
counsel for the defendant pertaining
to the same matter were refused,
they being as follows: "And the
court must, thereupon, if it deems
his being at large dangerous to the
public peace or safety, order him to
be committed to any lunatic asylum
authorized by the state to receive
and keep such persons until he be-
comes sane, or otherwise be dis-
charged therefrom by authority of
law."

The refusal of this last instruction
by the court is the grounds for the
appeal, but the court holds that the
instructions asked were not consist-
ent with the jury's duties inasmuch
as the jury is compelled to try a
criminal case according to the law
and evidence, and not to take into
consideration what would be the ul-
timate result should the defendant be
acquitted on the grounds of insanity.

The supreme court holds that the
jury has the right to consider the law
and evidence, but the disposition of
the defendant after acquittal is nei-
ther a matter for the jury to con-
sider, or the court, as a person can-
not be held after acquittal. Also the
jury has no right or power to render
further judgment than a verdict, as
the court is vested with the power
of prescribing the punishment upon
the return of the verdict if it be a
verdict of guilty. Taking these
facts and law into consideration, the
judgment of the lower court is af-
firmed.
